



Cain, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Cain, Langtry, Tex., entered the Army in October 1956.


Cain was employed by the Texas Natural Gasoline Corporation, Rankin, before entering the Army. He attended Sul Ross State College.

Back To The Bible

The fundamental error of protestantism lies in the theory that man can build religious institutions and worship God acceptably therein. Christ built a church (Matt 1618-20) upon the foundation of His Deity. Built by Deity, it must be perfect. A flaw to be found in His work would constitute a flaw in Christ and a flaw in Christ would constitute a refutation of His Deity. Any institution built by man designed to do the work of the church constitutes the arrogant assumption that man can improve upon Christ-that Deity is incapable of building an organization to meet the spiritual needs of man without the aid of human wisdom. Protestantism is built around the idea that each man should shop around for a religious institution that will please him (man) and if he cannot find one that will permit him to act and worship as he pleases that he should build one to suit himself. Errors concerning creed, organization, worship, name, and law of induction spring forth from this one great error. Brethren, let's go back to Bible standards.

RANKIN REBEKAH LODGE | Victim of Shooting Last August Dead

J. S. Mooney, 47, who was wounded by a gunshot in an incident on an oil rig some seven miles southeast of Rankin last August, was found dead in his car last week. He was shot by George L. Branton, a fellow worker, who was later committed to the Big Spring Mental Hospital as being insane by an Upton County jury.

Mooney was wounded in the left shoulder by Branton and was treated in the Rankin Hospital. It was believed that he had fully recovered. However, the day of his death, it is reported that he complained of a pain in the wound and left his job to go to his car and rest. Fellow workers found him dead shortly thereafter.

An autopsy has been ordered but results have not yet been learned.


