Upton Voters To Polls Next Tuesday

Three Issues Involved; Heavy Turnout Possible

Three issues will face the voters as they go to the polls Tuesday, April 2, for their first voting in 1957.

On a county-wide basis, and of principal interest, will be the \$410,000 permanent improvement bond issue for improvements to the Upton County Courthouse and county jail. Of this amount, some \$315,000 has been earmarked for approximately doubling the floor space

of the present building providing and remodeled district court room, jury quarters for women and other improvements. \$75,000 is to be used on enlarging the county jail and providing facilities for handling juveniles, women and felony and misdemeanor prisoners.

A simple majority of votes will be needed in order for the bond issue to carry. In past bond elections an average of approximately 500 have cast votes, with 707 being the largest number ever counted. A larger than usual turnout is anticipated Tuesday.

STATE ELECTION

At the same time, and voting in the same places, will be the decision as to who fills the unexpired term of Gov. Daniels in Congress. Twenty-three names will appear on the ballot, although one, Dr. Frank Connally withdrew from the race after ballots were printed.

Among those who are expected to draw the largest number of votes in Upton County will be John C. White, Martin Dies, Ralph Yarborough and Thad Hutchenson, Republican.

Voting on the bond election and the Senatorial race will be held together with the usual polling places being open. Precinct 1 will be in the courthouse, Precinct 2 at the Rankin Park Building, and Precinct 3 at the Phillips Pembroke Gasoline Plant.

Voters qualified to vote on the bond issue will be those having a poll tax or exemption and having property rendered on the county tax rolls. Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

ABSENTEE VOTE LIGHT

Absentee voting, as of Monday noon, stood at only 4 ballots cast. This is in sharp contrast to the usual large number of absentee ballots usually cast on elections of similar importance.

CITY ELECTION

On the same date, qualified voters living within the City of Rankin will cast their ballots for one city commissioner. Two names, E. C. Higday and J. B. Pettit Jr., will appear on this ballot. Pettit is seeking re-election while Higday is making his first bid for public office.

Voting will be held in the City Hall with Lelia Scarborough as judge and Mrs. Billy Rankin and Edith James as clerks. Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

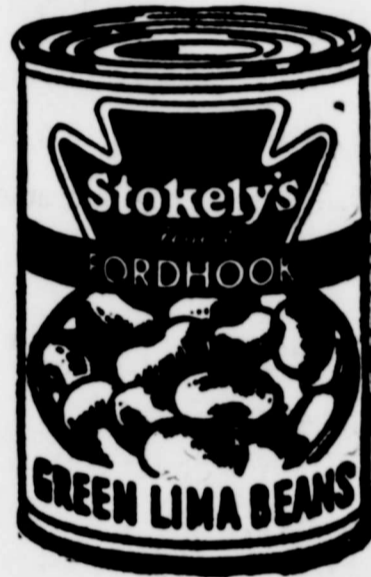

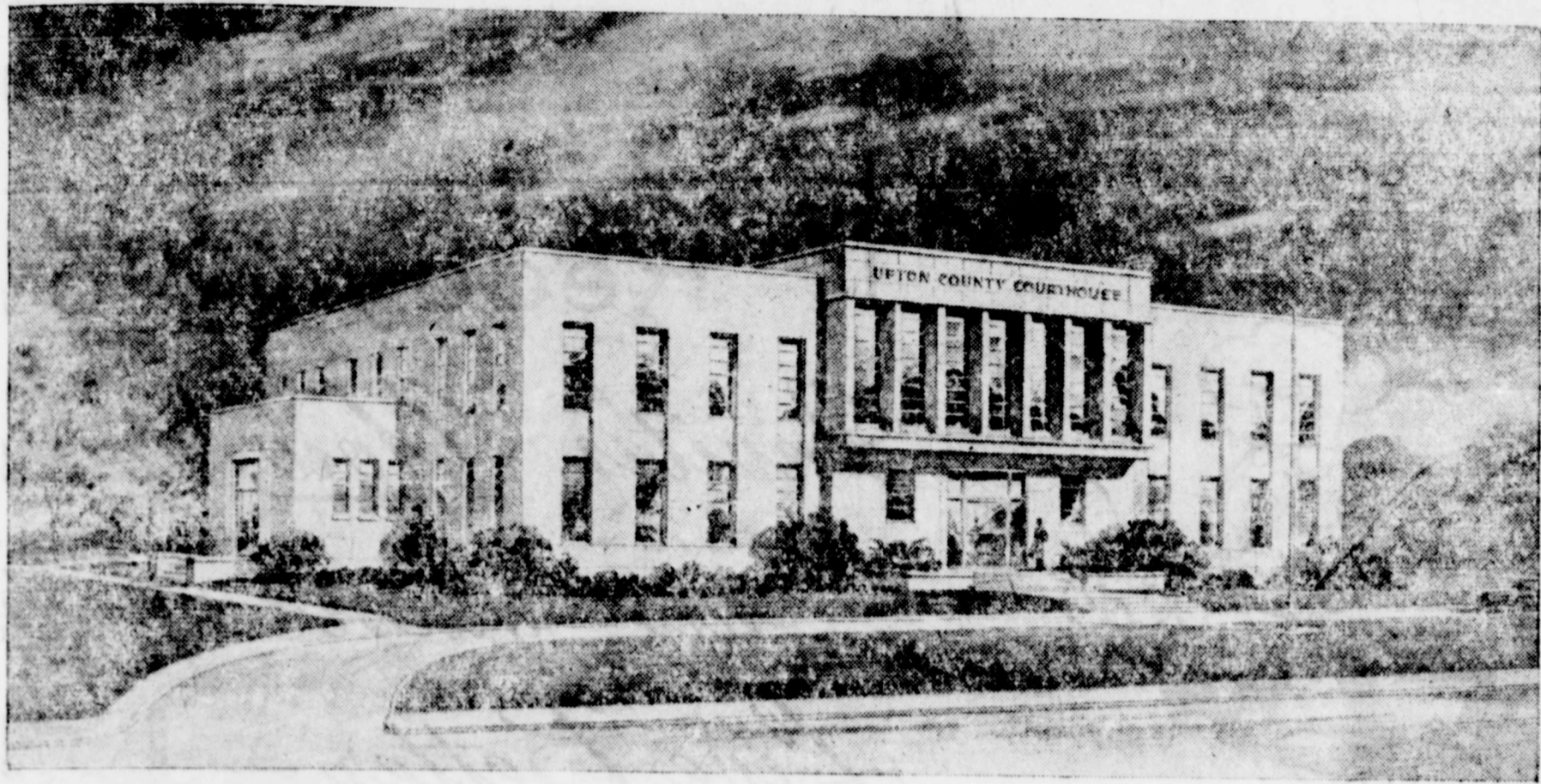

**COLLEGE PROFESSOR
ADDRESSES LOCAL GROUP**

The Omicron Tau Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi has just concluded a series of two programs on "Art."

The first program was of utmost importance. Mr. Robert L. Lancaster, with the San Angelo College, presented a very impressive lecture and discussion on the "Elementary Facts of Art".

Under the heading of creative

art, he explained the five phases of the various types of painting. They were: (1) Copy—a photograph or chart; (2) Imitation (naturalism)—an exact replica of photograph or chart; (3) Imitative (realism)—a replica with slight variation in lines and colors; (4) Abstract (distortion)—simple design and color distortion; and (5) Symbol—non objective.

Mr. Lancaster showed the group prints by the old masters and pointed out the different types or art.

In connection with the study of art, the chapter set up an art exhibit and was honored that members of the San Angelo Art Club sent many paintings. The local group was particularly proud of the paintings displayed by some of the local citizens.

The second program in the series used the same paintings displayed in the exhibit. Each member selected the painting she liked best and became a critic—pointing out both the good and bad aspects of the picture she liked. Jackie Polard and Ann Phillips, who conducted the program, headed the very lively discussion.

Through these two programs, the club members feel that, even though few will become artists, all will become more appreciative of art.

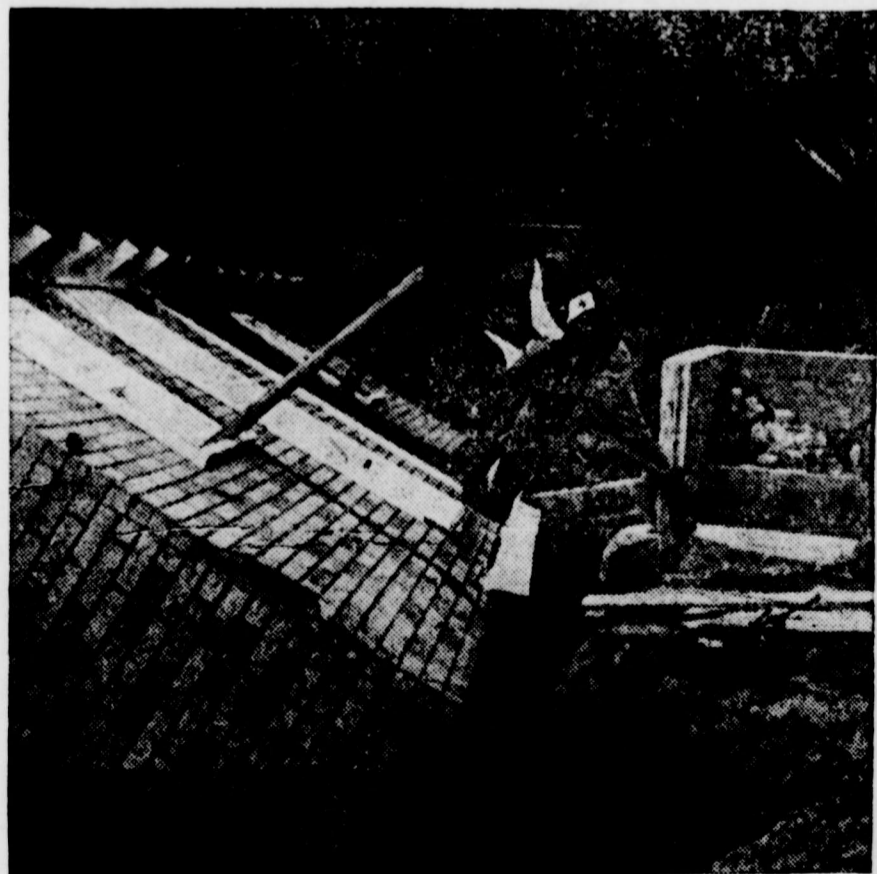

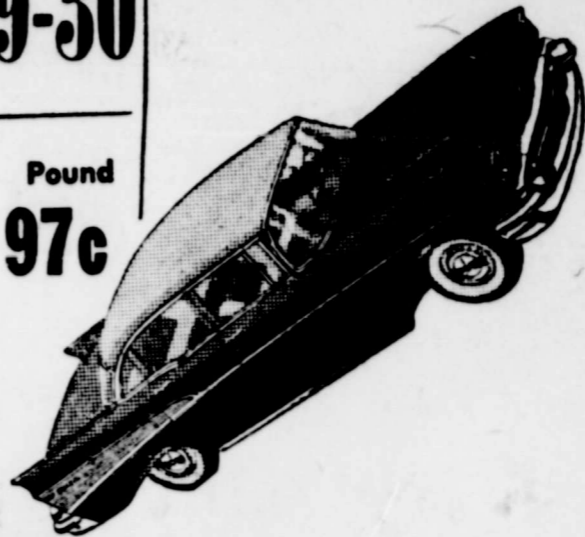
