Pettit Wins City Post In Close Race

J. B. Pettit, Jr., incumbent, won re-election to the Rankin City Council by 14 votes over E. C. Higday in Tuesday's election.

Total vote cast was 220, one of the larger city votes for some time. Pettit received 117 to 103 for Higday.

Pettit will now begin his third term as councilman. For Higday, this was his first political contest. Ray Boggs is the second councilman while A. E. Ivy fills the mayor's chair.

YARBOROUGH WINS

In the senatorial election, Ralph Yarborough carried Upton County with a total of 380 votes. Martin Dies was second with 365 while Republican Thad Hutchenson polled

In Rankin, Dies was the favorite with 153 votes to 147 for Yarborough and 50 for Hutchenson. A total of 990 votes were cast in the county in the Senatorial election out of a possible qualified vote of 1968.

COURTHOUSE WORK

Now that the sale of the improvement bonds have been approved by the voters, it is expected that the next steps toward actual remodeling of the courthouse and other work called for will get underway in the Commissioners Court soon. Definite plans will be drawn and revised to meet the specific needs of the various offices involved, bonds will be sold and contracts let.

No definite completion date has been set for the work which engineers have estimated will take 16 months to complete. However, it is anticipated that work will possibly begin sometime this summer.

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

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Annual Range Inventory Good Ranching Practice

make an annual inventory of your range vegetation. We are all familiar with the classification of livestock, meats, equipment and innumerable other items. The most important classification to the rancher, however, is the classification of his range. This is a relatively new idea to some, but it has come to be an essential part of the ranching industry. Over a period of years we have come to the conclusion that there are two very important factors in this business of producing grass. The first factor is the condition of the range or the kind of vegetation that is to be found in relation to what used to be there, at the height of its development. The second factor is rainfall, which has proved to be a thing of radical fluctuation in this area. We have no control over the rainfall, but we do have control over the management we apply to vegetation. A look at history shows us that the type of vegetation has fluctuated radically also. However, this fluctuation has been a result of man's management.

In classifying your range, according to condition, it is more important to determine what kind of grasses and forbs are present, than it is to determine how much vegetation is present as a result of to meat and wool, depends on the two major factors again; type of vegetation, and rainfall. To keep

> rainfall. Because annuals grow fast and make a big showing for a short time after rains, we are prone to give the annuals undue credit. Actually they would not even be there if the higher producing perennials had not been grazed out. The perennials such as sideoats grama, the bluestems, green sprangletop, Texas cupgrass, Arizona cottontop, plains bristlegrass, bush sunflower, the guara's velvet bundleflower, and shrubs such as the ephedras and daleas, made the Edwards Plateau the "Sheep Country," so these are the ones to check close on your inventory.

When the perennials are gone, annual vegetation will make money as long as it keeps raining, but when it stops raining the only alternatives are the feed bill or starvation of the livestock.

The most economic investment that can be made on any ranch improvement is in grass. By investing in better grass, such pests as the mesquite and cedar are also stopped or slowed down in their persistent invasion of bare areas.

The whole aim of your Middle Concho Soil Conservation District program is to get a better understanding of the many problems rain. Pounds of grass converted existing on the various types of every acre of land according to its country and to help each individual meet those problems by encouraging the use of the proper conservation practice to the end of, 'Using every acre of land accord-



Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state director of the draft system, ex. pressed public appreciation of the services of Mrs. Mitchell.

"People of the Rankin area should appreciate the services she renders to them," Colonel Schwartz said, "as she is doing this work without pay as a public service to her country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter. Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register are \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.
