largements, etc. The ordinance provides that a bond of $\$ 500$ must be posted by the person doing the selling with the Mayor of the City of Rankin and that a license of $\$ 10.00$ per year must be paid to the city.
Failure to comply with this or der will result in the guilty parties being subject to a fine of not less than $\$ 10$ nor more than $\$ 100$. The second ordinance controls peddlers and defines them as persons who go from door-to-doo offering merchandise for sale. A license is also required for this group ranging from $\$ 2.50$ if by foot up to $\$ 15.00$ per year for use of vehicles. Fines of $\$ 5$ to $\$ 100$ are provided for offenders.
Under this category, the ordinance points out that persons who produce the products they are selling are not subject to the requirements. This would include homegrown vegetables, poultry and poul try products, meats, animals, etc

## CALL CITY HALL

All of the above people covered by the two ordinances must have complied with the regulations set forth before they will be allowed to do business in Rankin. They will be given a license covering their particular phase of business and may be required by the homeowner to display such license. If they do not have one and the property owner wishes, he may call the city hall and report the offended. The peddler will then be aprehended and if found to be in violation of the ordinances, fined or compelled to cease doing business in Rankin.

THERE'S PROSPECTS

If your so-called lawn has brown spots in it which refuses to grow grass or in which the grass has died-the chances are you have grub worms. Several lawns -including our own-has gone down for the count to these pests. County Agent, Dub "All Girls" Day recommends a poison of Ch lordane for treatment, followed by lots of water and possibly some fertilizer. We doctored ours and it seems to help although the patient was far gone before treatment was begun.

## Hard To Shake Loose

Postmaster General Summerfield, one of the members of the "new team" that claimed to be in favor of "free enterprise" and now in control in Washington, also heads a department that sold $884,594,500$ printed envelopes in direct competition with privately owned printing firms last year.
