By a vote of three to two, Uptox) County Commissioners Court last Monday went on record as refusing o defend the recent $\$ 410,000$ bond election presently being contested by three McCamey business men. After several weeks of discussion on the matter, Precinct Commis. sioners Tommy Workman and $\mathbf{H}$ Wheeler called for a vote to auth. orize the court to employ an at. torney to defend the election which the court had previously certified carried by 9 votes. Both Workman and Wheeler voted aye Precinct Commissioners E. K. Buford and Joe Conger voted no. This left a tie situation among the precinct commissioners.
County Judge Bud Fisher, voting to break the deadlock, cast a no vote which, in effect, put the court on record as refusing to defend the election against the contest.

HAVE TUESDAY MEET
On Tuesday, Commissioners Workman and Wheeler requested and obtained another meeting of the court. At that time, they pro. posed that the commissioners court authorize any interested person to employ an attorney at no expense to Upton County, and defend the election if they so desired. All five voted in favor of this motion.
In discussions prior to the Mon day vote which took the county out of the contest, it was established that there was no written laws which required the court to defend any election. However, opinions re. ceived from such authorities as the Assistant Attorney General of Tex. as were said to state in part that "to their knowledge, no court in Texas had ever refused to defend an election of this type and that they could not imagine a court refusing to do so.
