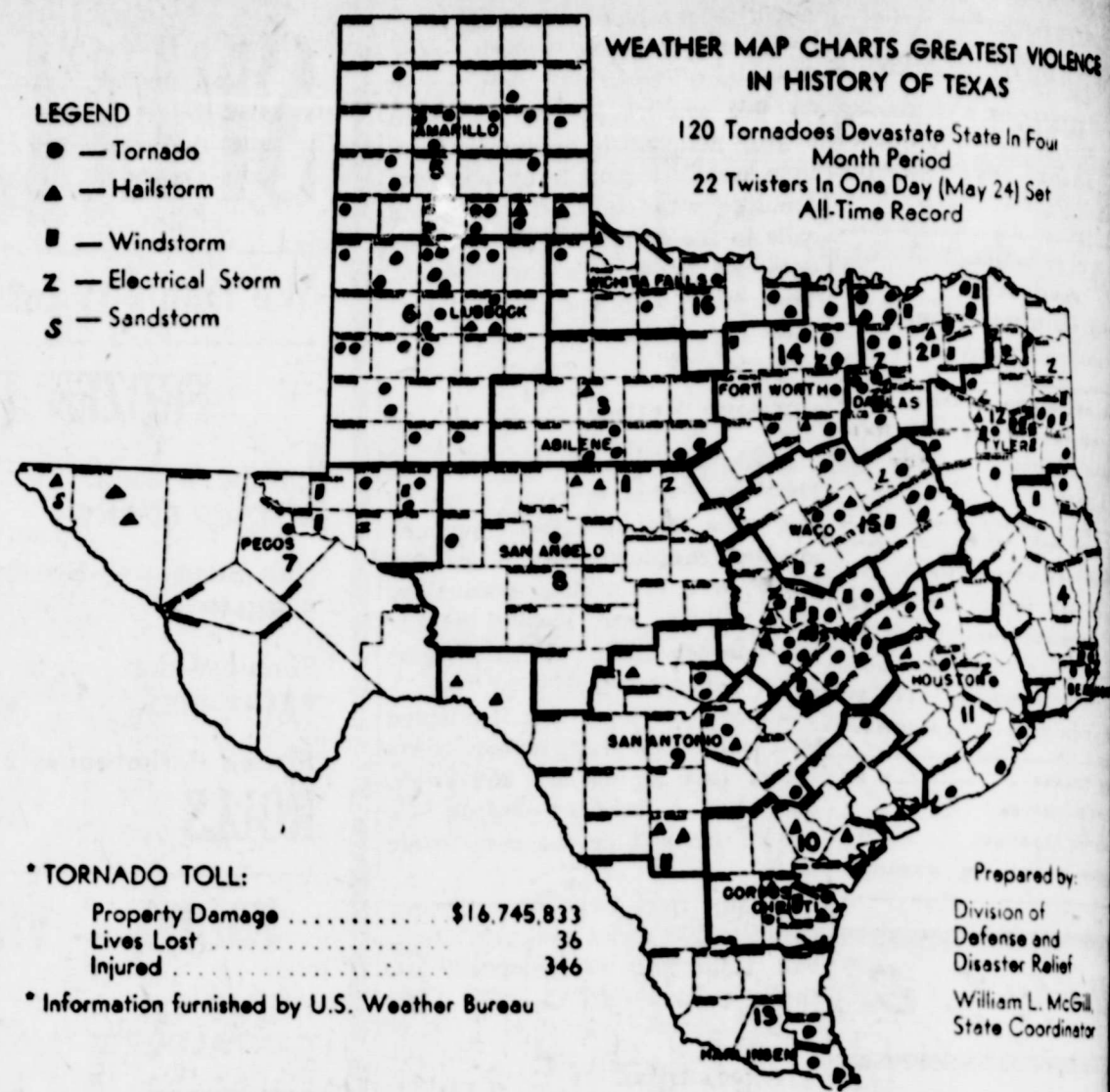

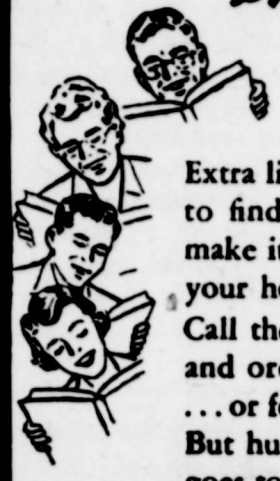

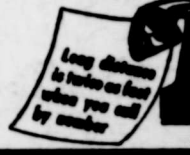

## PLAY SET SUNDAY

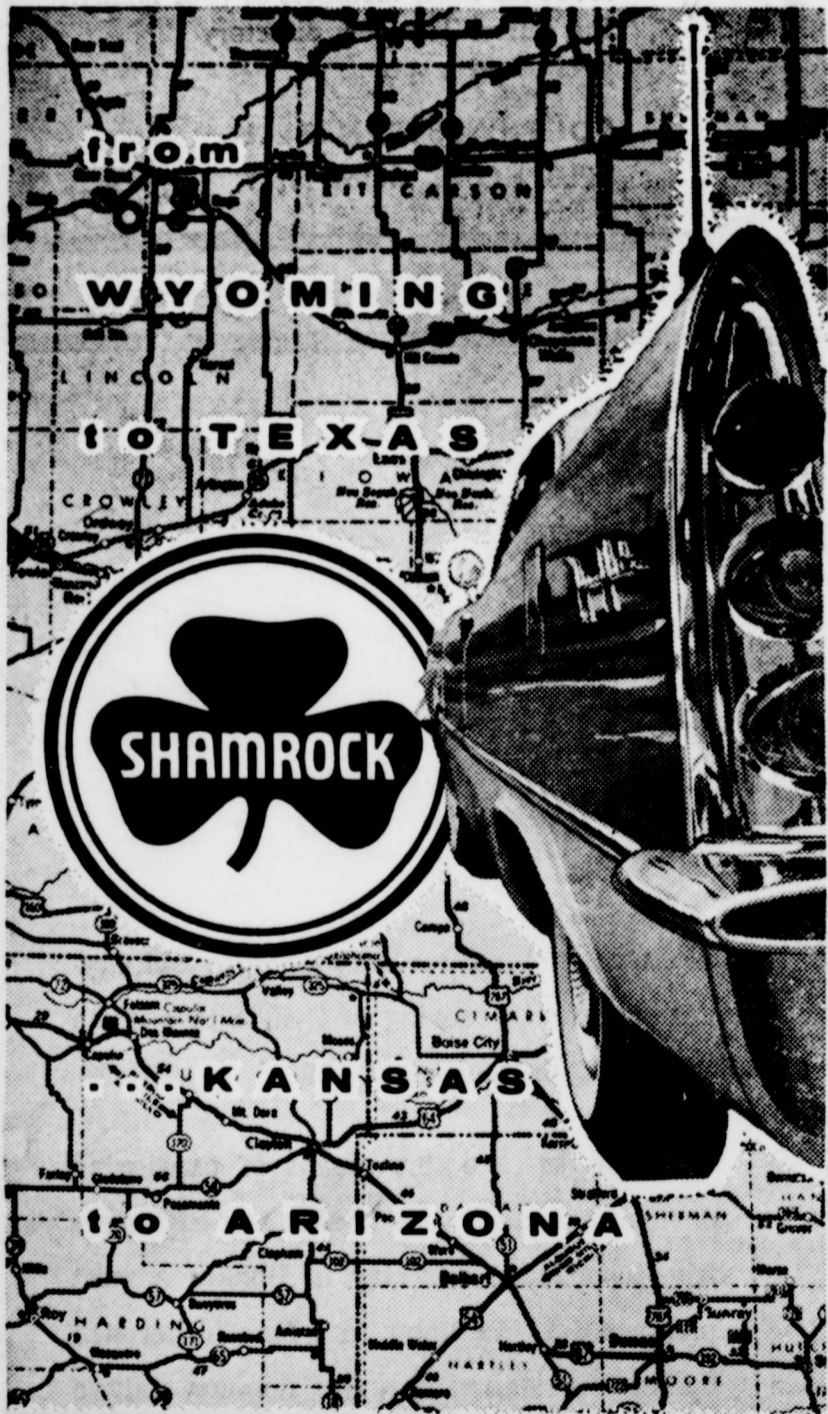

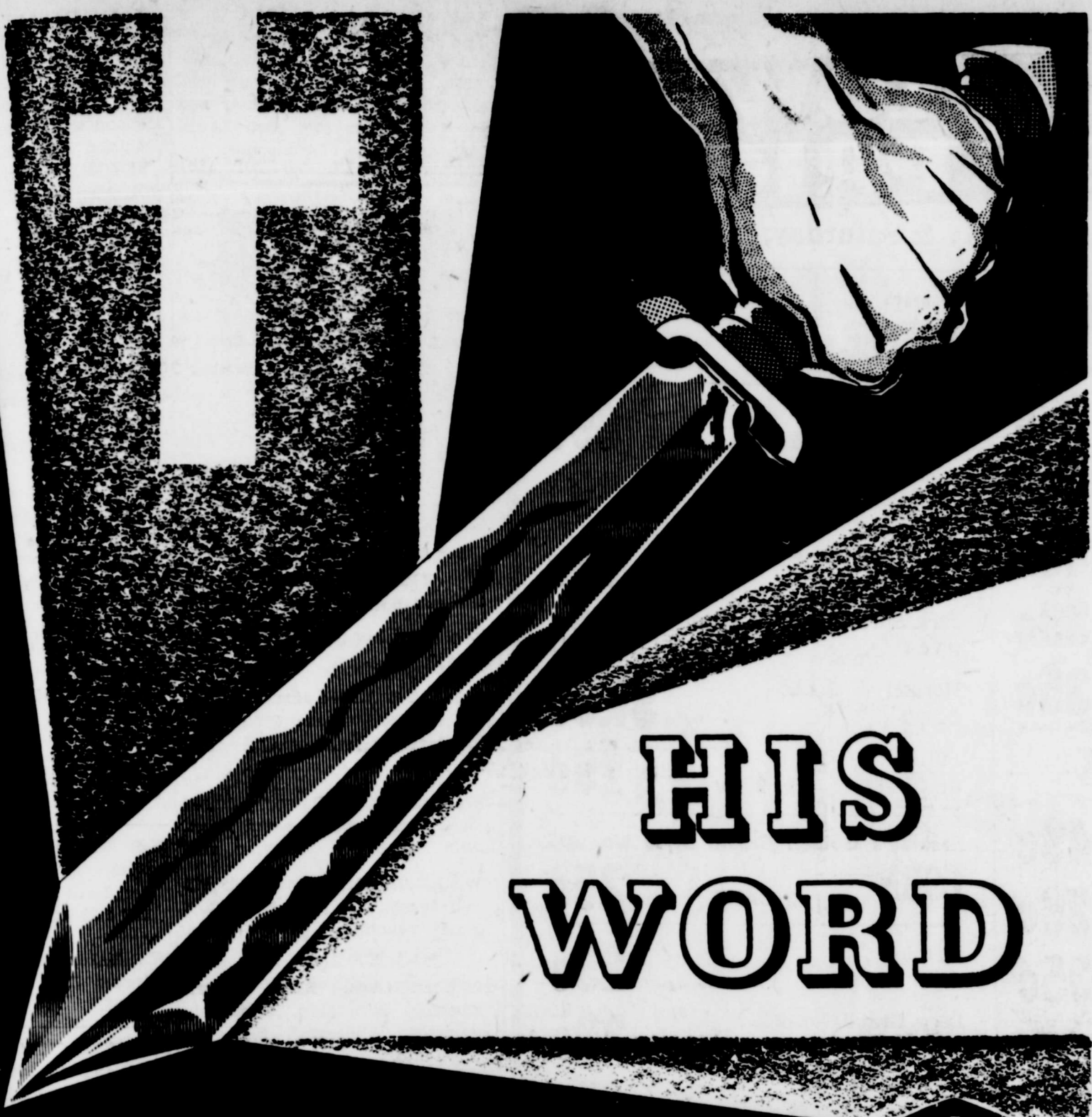
