Commissioners Set Rate At \$1.26

At their last meeting, members of the Upton County Commissioners formally set the tax rate for the coming tax year at \$1.26, the same as the past two years. A breakdown of the rates shows as follows:

County Bond	.00
County Bridge	.08
County Special	.15
County Improvement	.12
County Sinking	.31
Total	\$1.26

Compared with last year's rate of the \$1.26 tax, the rate gets the most attention with its raise from 45 cents to 54 cents. Biggest cut was in percentage improvements which was 12 cents last year and 12 for this year.

PLAY SCHOOL OPENING SET FOR SEPTEMBER 3

Mrs. Lynn McAden has announced that the Rankin Kindergarten and Play school will open on September 3 in the Methodist Church educational building. Classes will be held from 8:30 to 11:15 a.m., Monday through Fridays.

Consisting of two classes, the school is open to youngsters from 3 to 6 years old. Training features physical co-ordination through coloring and organized play as well as instruction in numbers and penmanship.

Students To Report 2 Days To Register For Courses

The old school bell is about to ring.

Beginning August 27, freshmen and sophomore students who will enter Rankin High School this year, should be on hand at the high school building to register. On August 28, juniors and seniors will be registered.

All high school students are asked

to keep these dates in mind.

Also, on Wednesday, August 28, Bill Hood, principal of the Rankin Junior High School, has asked that students in the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades, who will be entering Junior High School in Rankin for the first time this year, be at the Junior High office to register.

Hood stated that they should bring their report cards from the last school they attended. Time for registrations has been designated at 9:00-12:00 a.m. and 1:00-4:00 p.m.

Enrollment in Rankin Schools is expected to reach an all-time high when school opens officially on September 3. Emergency class rooms are being prepared in the junior high building to handle an expected overflow from elementary classes.

Two new school buses will be in operation this year. However, Supt. Scrivner has said that crowded conditions are still expected in this department also.

In their last regular meeting, members of the Rankin School Board officially hired A. C. Copeland as girls' athletic coach, replacing D. E. Jones who resigned to take a principal's post in Alpine.

Copeland, 28-year-old, is married and the father of two small children. He and Mrs. Copeland and family will move to Rankin this week.

A graduate of Sul Ross College in Alpine, he was an outstanding basketball player during his school days and for the past two years has coached both boys' and girls' basketball at Mozelle in Coleman County. He had winning teams both years.

In addition to his coaching duties, Copeland will teach science and social science in high school.

WTU IS SERVING LARGE TERRITORY

From Twitty to Presidio it's a long, long line. Just how long the line is the folks at West Texas Utilities Company can best tell, for they maintain the 2,652 miles of high voltage transmission lines connecting the two towns.

WTU serves a long, narrow segment extending across Texas from Twitty, in Wheeler County near the Oklahoma border north of Shamrock, Texas, down through Abilene and San Angelo on out to Alpine, Marfa and to Presidio on the banks of the Rio Grande.

By highway this route is 628 miles long or just a little farther than from Chicago to Washington D. C.

Actually the area WTU serves doesn't end at the Rio Grande. While the highline actually ends at a two pole structure on the banks of the Rio Grande, power from the WTU system is fed across the Rio Grande to the Compania de Luz y Fuerza de Ojinaga, S. A. The Mexican electric company serves the town of Ojinaga, population about 5,000.

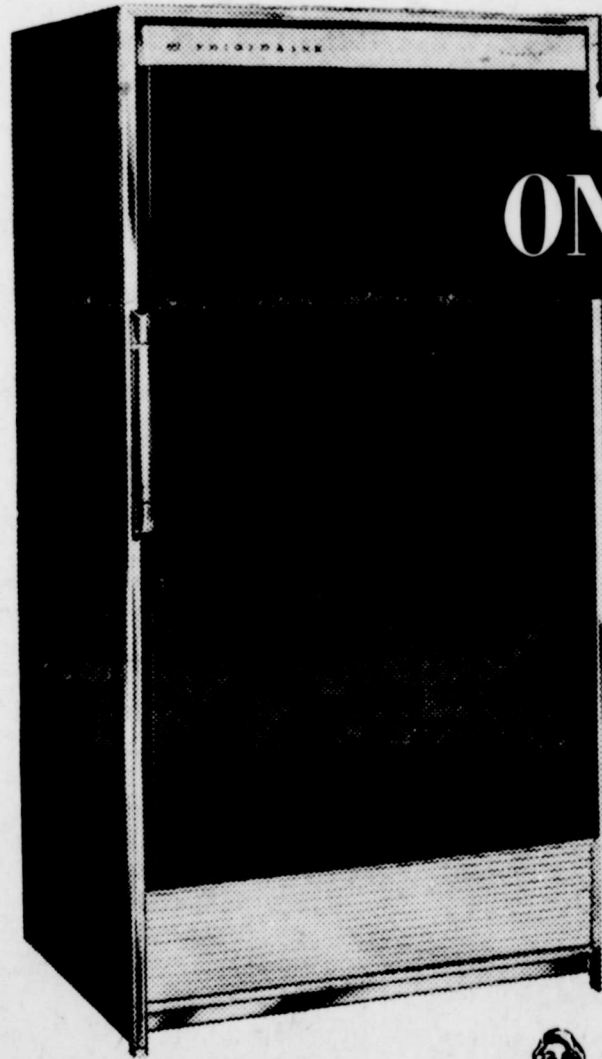

ves is larger than the aggregate area of seven eastern states, WTU officials point out that the company is a relatively small operating company.

On the basis of the number of customers served and electric sales, WTU is the fourth smallest of the twelve major privately owned electric utility companies operating in Texas.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows: "Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law. "The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds,' shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes for the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods. "Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law. "While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board. "From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1962 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and for the same terms and conditions as prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No amount of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this section after December 31, 1962, and all thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that the amount as may be required for the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited in the General Revenue Fund. "All bonds issued hereunder shall be subject to the provisions of the Act for the registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas and delivery to the purchaser and delivery to the purchaser of the same shall be subject to the incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. "Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the expiration of this amendment, such laws shall not be void by reason of their retroactive nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, at 10 o'clock the 1st Tuesday after the 1st of November, 1957, at which time each ballot shall have thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State." "AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the proclamation for said election in the same form published in the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and the expense of publication shall be for such amendment shall be for the proper appropriation of law.

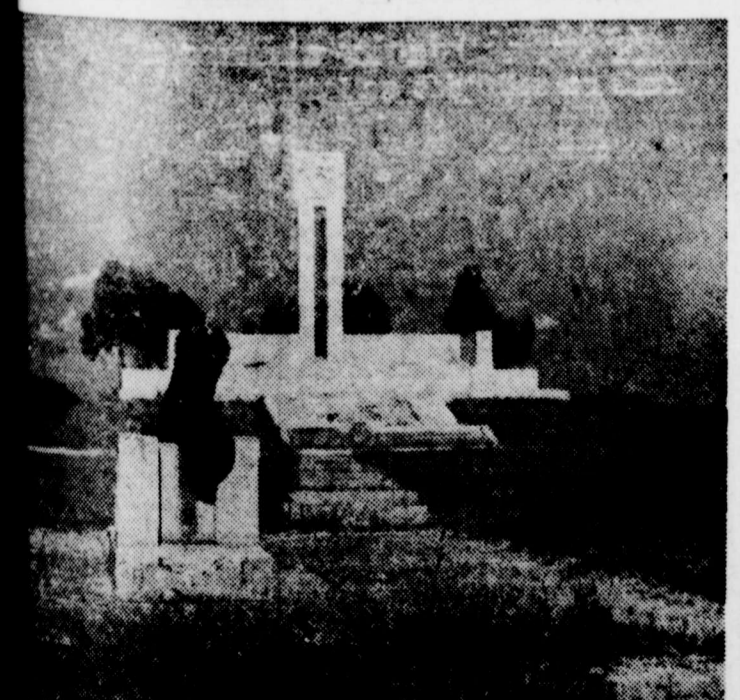

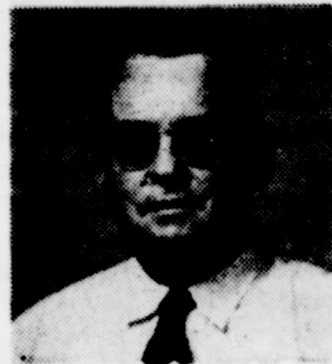
