## WTU IS SERVING

LARGE TERRITORY
From Twitty to Presidio it's a long, long line. Just how long the
line is the folks at West Texas Utili. ties Company can best tell, for they maintain the 2,652 miles of high voltage transmission lines connect. ing the two towns.
WTU serves a long, narrow segment extending across Texas from Twitty, in Wheeler County near the Oklahoma border north of Sham. rock, Texas, down through Abilene and San Angelo on out to Alpine, Marfa and to Presidio on the banks of the Rio Grande.
By highway this route is 628 miles long or just a little farther than from Chicago to Washington D. C. Actually the area WTU serves doesn't end at the Rio Grande. While the highline actually ends at a two pole structure on the banks of the Rio Grande, power from the WIU system is fed across the Rio Grande to the Compania de Luz y Fuerza de Ojinaga, 8. A. The Mexican electric company serves the town of Oflaga, population about 5,000 .
