TWO OUT OF THREE

Rankin's Red Devils have now won two out of three football games and things are looking up. However, it ought to be pointed out—and remembered—that the boys won their first three games last year and wound up with a season record of 4 wins and 5 losses.

In their little tussel with Sander-son last Friday night, the Devils did not have to exert themselves too much with the result that they did not play as good a game as their two previous encounters. At least, that's the opinion of most of the onlookers.

Nevertheless, for a bunch of lads who were picked to win not more than 1 game all year, the Red

Devils have already had a successful season. It still looks like district will go to the team that wants to work the hardest to win the honors.

For this week when we all go down to Eldorado for another non-conference game, it looks like one of those affairs where anybody could win. At the present time, the two teams have won 1 game each off each other with Eldorado giving Rankin a rather bad time last year in winning 20-13.

Rankin is sure to lose some more ball games, chiefly because the boys do not have the reserves nor the experience to win 'em all. This could be one of those losses. However, there's no point in getting cold feet until you're in the water, so we take Rankin again this week by 18 points.

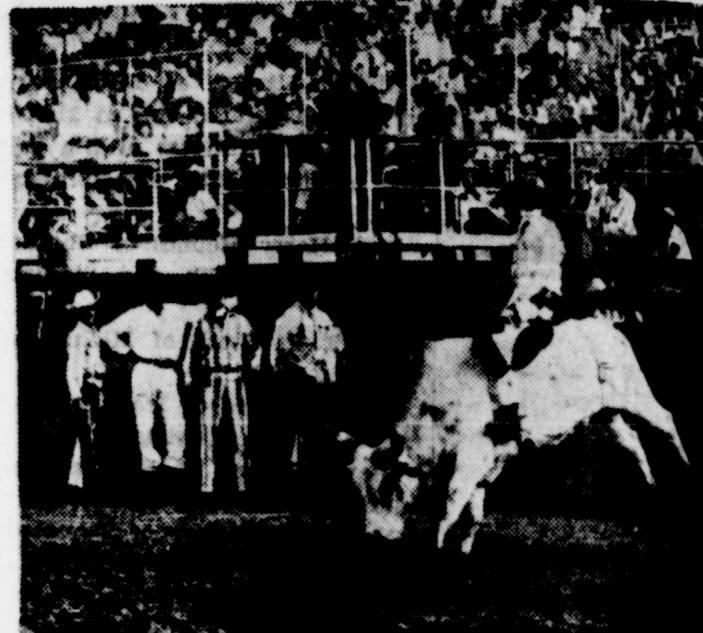
