The Concho Valley Council will open its finance campaign on October 8 for extending Scouting in this area with a 7:00 a.m. breakfast to be held at Highland Cafe, it was announced today by Sam Fitzhugh who is boy scout finance chairman of the Rankin drive.

Assisting in achieving the objectives of Scouting within the Concho Valley Council are over 2,000 adults giving volunteer service in the 212 units and on the local council lever. To better serve youth, over 500 of these leaders took training last year in Scouting techniques and boy leadership.

Political "Tickets" For '58 Now On Sale

"Tickets" to the 1958 political race are now on sale in the form of poll taxes. Sale of the right-tovote slips opened at the Tax Assessor-Collector's office in the county courthouse Tuesday morning, October 1, without any noticeable rush by prospective voters.

1958 is expected to be one of the more "interesting" political years both locally and state-wide. Throughout the nation, observers will be watching for any trends that may develop to indicate the political thinking of Joe Doe Public.

In Upton County, officials who will be "making the race" are the County Judge, County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Commissioners 2 and 4 and all Justices of the Peace. In addition to these, a number of district offices will also be up for election.

H. E. "Gene" Eckols, tax assessor and collector, has asked that everyone who can possibly do so, purchase their poll tax early. Each year there has been last minute rushes that has resulted in waiting lines and much delay.
