SCOUT FUND DRIVE **GETS UNDERWAY**

With a kick-off breakfast last Tuesday morning at Highland Cafe, the 1957 Concho Valley Boy Scout fund drive was launched in Rankin. Along with the breakfast was a discussion on local problems and goals by Boy Scouts, selection of prospects for the fund drive and a showing of slides taken by Scout A. C. Rawlins of his trip to the national encampment at Valley Forge last summer.

This year's budget for the Concho Valley Council has been set at \$92,214.08 for the 221/2 counties represented in the area. This compares with \$90,976.44 for the 1957 budget on which the Council is presently operating.

Largest item will be executive salaries of which approximately one-third of the money will be spent or \$34,300. Next largest item will be Long Term Camping which gets \$14,934.25 of the total.

Sam Fitzhugh is chairman of the drive this year and has asked that all workers make their contacts as early as possible.

"We know that the people of Rankin are behind the scouts and that they support the program with their donation", he said. "We have an important job and it needs to be done properly."


