
Formerly regularly employed workers, who are at least 50 years old, who have been disabled for at least 6 months, and have not been able to work because of their disabled condition may lose disability insurance if they do not file an application by December 31, 1957. The loss of payments could very easily run into hundreds of dollars depending upon the length of time the person has been disabled, his former social security income, and how long he delays filing his application.

Persons who have already spoken to a representative from the office do not need to see the representative again, as their cases are being handled or have already been processed. The deadline of December 31, applies only to those

who think they meet the general requirements mentioned above, and who have not yet made inquiry about their disability.

Thomas stated that more detailed information on disability insurance benefits and the disability freeze can be obtained by writing the Social Security Office.
