But then again-what's all the yakking about? There has always been those who would break the law as adults and adults are little more than kids who have picked up a few years experience. If parents are determined to rear their kids in a manner that will tend to give them the idea that they can do no wrong and escape punishment, then it follows that those kids will someday grow up and will carry along with them the same idea.
This offers no answer to the problem but perhaps puts some light on just where the problem is lo-cated-At home.

The best thing that parents can spend on their children is time, not money.
