W. J. "Curley" Cowen Asks For Re-Election As JP, Precinct Two

W. J. "Curley" Cowen announced today that he is seeking re-election as Justice of the Peace in Precinct 2, subject to action in the July 26 Democratic Primary.

Cowen is now serving his first four-year term as Justice in Precinct Two. He is the father of four children, the youngest being 9-months-old. He has been a resident of Rankin for 19 years and has worked as a cowboy and an oil field employee. At the present time, he is dispatcher of BJ Well Servicing Company.

Mr. Cowen states that he plans to make an active bid for the votes in his precinct and will see as many of the voters as possible.

"I sincerely solicit the vote and influence of the folks in Precinct Two and will devote the time and effort necessary to fulfill the duties of the job as I have in the past," he stated.

NORMAN ELROD For County Judge

NORMAN ELROD IN JUDGE RACE

Norman Elrod, 36-year-old Upton County rancher and insurance businessman, has authorized the News to announce that he is a candidate for the office of County Judge subject to the Democratic Primary on July 26th.

Elrod filed his name with Bill Ramsey, Democratic county chairman, Monday; thus becoming the second candidate for the office. Bud Fisher is seeking re-election.

A graduate of San Angelo High School, Elrod attended San Angelo College and the University of Texas. He is married to the former Betty Baily of San Angelo. They have one daughter, Judy, 9-years-old and a student in Rankin schools.

LONGTIME RESIDENT

Originally the Elrod family began ranching in Upton County in 1932 when Norman's father leased the Noelke Estate. In 1942 Norman moved to his present home where he has been actively engaged in ranching since that time. He has operated his insurance business since 1946.

The Elrods are members of the First Methodist Church in Rankin where he is now serving as chairman of the board of stewards. He has been a member of the Rankin School Board since December 1956 and has announced his intentions to retire from this position at the end of his present term.

Elrod is also an active member of the Rankin Lions Club, a member of the Upton County Hospital board, Chairman of the Hale-Akin School Committee, and holds numerous other civic positions on scout groups, fund raising projects and community programs. Mrs. Elrod is an active member of church and civic affairs and is past president of the Beta Sigma Phi.

MAKES STATEMENT

In talking to the News, Elrod

took a climb this week as four new names were entered in three political contests. Norman Elrod, local rancher and insurance man, withdrew from his previously announced candidacy for the school board and filed for county judge. W. J. Cowen, present JP in Precinct 2, announced for re-election and drew Charlie Campbell, local barber, as an opponent.

Carl Shaffer, owner of Red Bluff Lumber Company, filed this week for a place on the ballot for election to the Rankin school board. There are now four in this contest which will see two elected. Deadline for filing in the school race is March 5.

In announcing his withdrawal from the school race, Elrod stated that he was doing so in order that he might devote his full time toward his bid for the county judge seat.

Charlie Campbell Enters JP Race

Charlie Campbell, local barber at Lee's Barber Shop, has announced this week to the News that he is a candidate for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, subject to action in the Democratic Primary July 26th.

Campbell, a long time resident of this area having lived in Rankin and McCamey, is well known to local residents. He has indicated that he will make an active bid for the office and plans to contact as many voters in precinct two as possible.

"I know all of the law enforcement officials in Upton County and thoroughly understand the duties of the office of Justice of the Peace," Campbell stated.

"I want to try to see everybody in connection with my race and solicit their vote and assistance," he said.

"I certainly want the people to know that I want the office of County Judge and that I am willing to work hard to get it. If they should see fit to honor me with this office, I will do everything I can to carry out the duties of County Judge in a manner that will truly represent the majority of the people," Elrod said.

encountered a little of what they can likely expect a great deal of before they finish the improvement program on the courthouse. In calling for bids on the McCamey sub station, they found that they lacked some \$5,000 having enough money to do the job as planned.

Originally, plans were to spend something like \$29,000 on the McCamey job but in the election contest settlement, it was decided to cut this figure to approximately \$25,000. Now some more money is going to have to come from some place or plans are going to have to be reduced.

It will be sad, indeed, if the people of McCamey are to be denied the benefits they are entitled to in the sub station — not to mention the skimping and cutting that will likely have to be done on the courthouse—just because a small handful of men were able to throw out the approved vote of a majority and cut the original amount of money set up for this work in half. Time will tell a better story, we hope.

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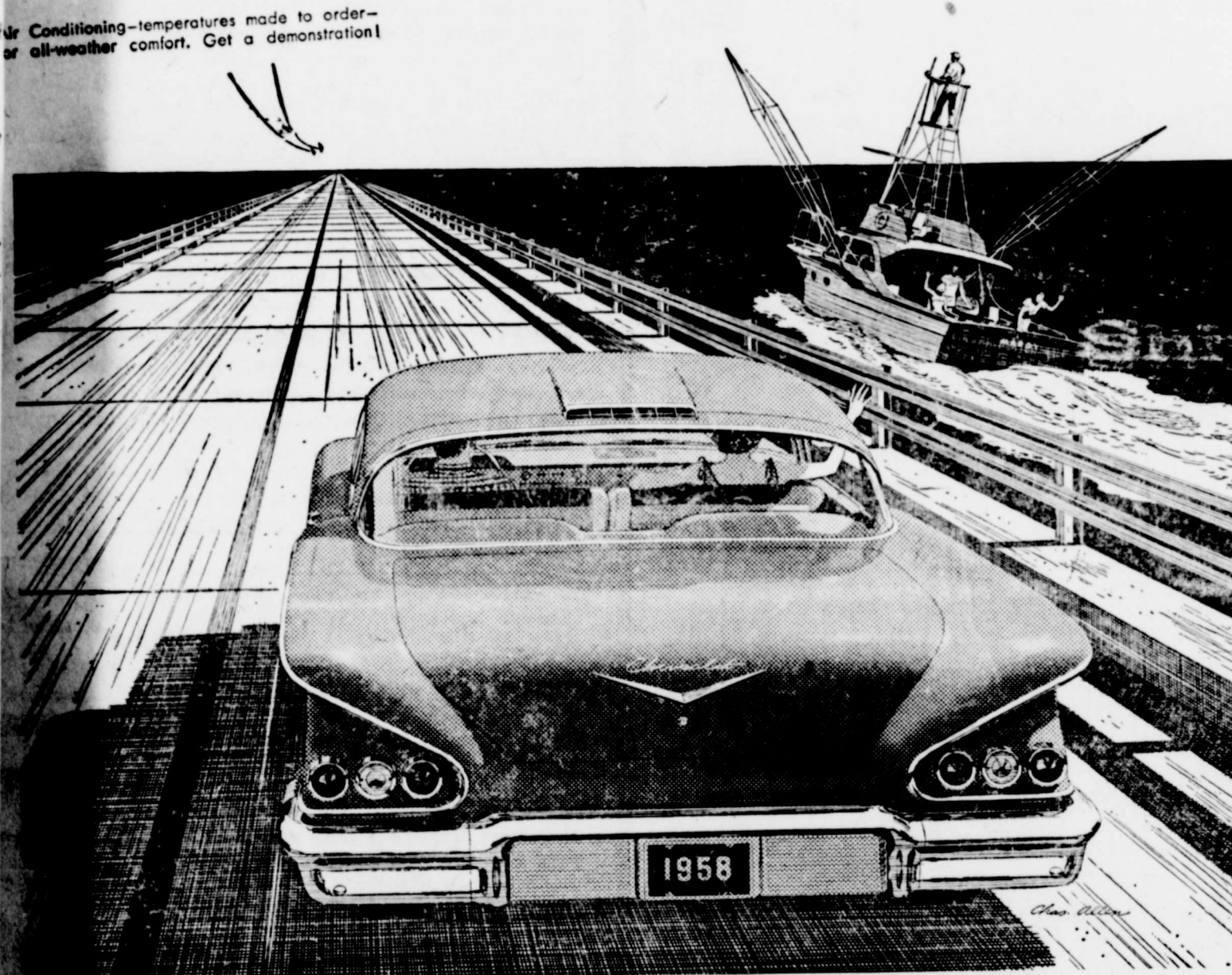
