CHILDREN AND MILK

In a recent survey made in Home Demonstration Clubs of the state it was found that only 25 percent of the children in these nearly 1200 homes drank as much as four glasses of milk a day. Our Texas Food Standard lists one quart of milk a day as the amount needed for a safe diet. Five percent of the children drank no milk, 15 percent drank one glass, 22 percent, two glasses and 29 percent three glasses. Milk and milk products are the only sources of calcium in large quantities. In fact it is most difficult to get the daily calcium requirement without milk.

The same study shows that 28 percent of the women and 23 percent of the men drank no milk and that only 39 percent of the wo-


