In a little better than average turn-out, 183 voters went to the polls in last Tuesday's city election, and voted another term for A. E. Ivy as Mayor and Ray Boggs as councilman.

Final tabulations show that Ivy received 113 votes to 70 for E. C. Higday in the Mayor's race. Boggs had 103 to A. J. McDonald's 79 in the councilman contest. These results leave the city commission with the same office holders as have served for the past several years with J. B. Pettit making up the third party as a councilman. His term expires next April.

Ivy will begin his fifth term as Mayor while Boggs has been a councilman for three terms and will be serving his fourth hitch on the council. Both were re-elected for two more years.

Seven Candidates In Race --

Voters Will Elect Two In Saturday School Balloting

Balloting in the Rankin Independent School District election will begin at 8:00 a.m. Saturday, April 5. The polls will remain open until 7:00 p.m.

Two polling places will be in operation this year with one box in

the lobby of the high school building and another at the Phillips Pembroke Gasoline Plant in the recreation hall.

Election Judge will be Boyd Cox with Mesdames H. Wheeler, Hamp Carter, Sam Holmes and Boyd Cox assisting at the Rankin box. Alvin Bushong will be in charge at the Phillips box and will be assisted by three others.

SEVEN IN RACE

Seven candidates will be in the race for the two seats open. Given in the order in which the names appear on the ballot, they are: Allen Moore, Dwayne Schnaubert, Troy T. Langford, E. G. Branch, Frank E. Thomas, C. J. Shaffer and Dr. James D. Gossett. Langford and Thomas are from the Midkiff area while the rest of the group all live in Rankin.

The two elected will serve for three years. Other board members now serving are Norman Elrod, D. O. McEwen, Walton Poage, Walton Harrah, Joe Simpson, Bruce McGill and Floyd Everett. Elrod and McEwen are retiring at the end of their present terms.

INTEREST RUNS HIGH

Local interest in the school election is believed to be higher than for any similar round of voting in a number of years. One indication of the possibility that a record vote may be polled is the fact that twenty-nine absentee ballots had been cast as of noon Tuesday.

In past years, few if any, have voted by absentee in school election.

Robert E. Montgomery, Midland attorney, announced to The News this week he is a candidate for state representative from the 102nd District, which includes Midland, Upton, Crane and Pecos Counties.

Montgomery, who is 26-years of age, has been a Midland resident since 1951. He graduated from Kermit High School in 1948 and received his BA degree from Texas Tech, with a major in government. He received his law degree from Baylor University in 1953. While at Baylor, he served on the Law School board of governors; was president of the Mid-law Class; president of the Baylor Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta, national legal fraternity, and editor of the Baylor Law Review.

Upon graduation from Baylor, Montgomery received a fellowship from the Southwestern Legal Foundation for a year's advance study toward a Master of Laws degree in the field of taxation at Southern Methodist University.

He entered the Air Force in May, 1954, and served two years in the office of the Staff Judge Advocate. He was released from active duty with the rank of first lieutenant in May, 1956. Since that time, he has been engaged in private law practice. He is active in civic, church and professional associations. At the present time, he is vice-president of the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce.

He was married to Lou Mims of Waco Dec. 29, 1951; they have a son, David, age three.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p.m. in the First Methodist Church in Rankin Tuesday, April 1, for W. E. "Bill" Yates, long-time resident.

Rev. Lynn McAden, pastor of the Methodist Church, officiated and was assisted by Rev. R. L. Shannon, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Bill, 62-years-old, died at 4:20 p.m. Sunday in the Veterans Hospital at Big Spring where he had been confined for over a month. A veteran of World War I, he had been in poor health for a number of years.

He was born February 12, 1896, at Belton, Texas. In 1927 he moved to Iraan and in 1931, to Rankin. During this time he operated a cafe. In 1934, he was elected as a County Commissioner and served at that capacity for 12 years.

Survivors include his father, Ed Yates of Rankin, and two sisters, Mrs. Albert McKay of Rankin and Mrs. Jake Cochran of Monahans.

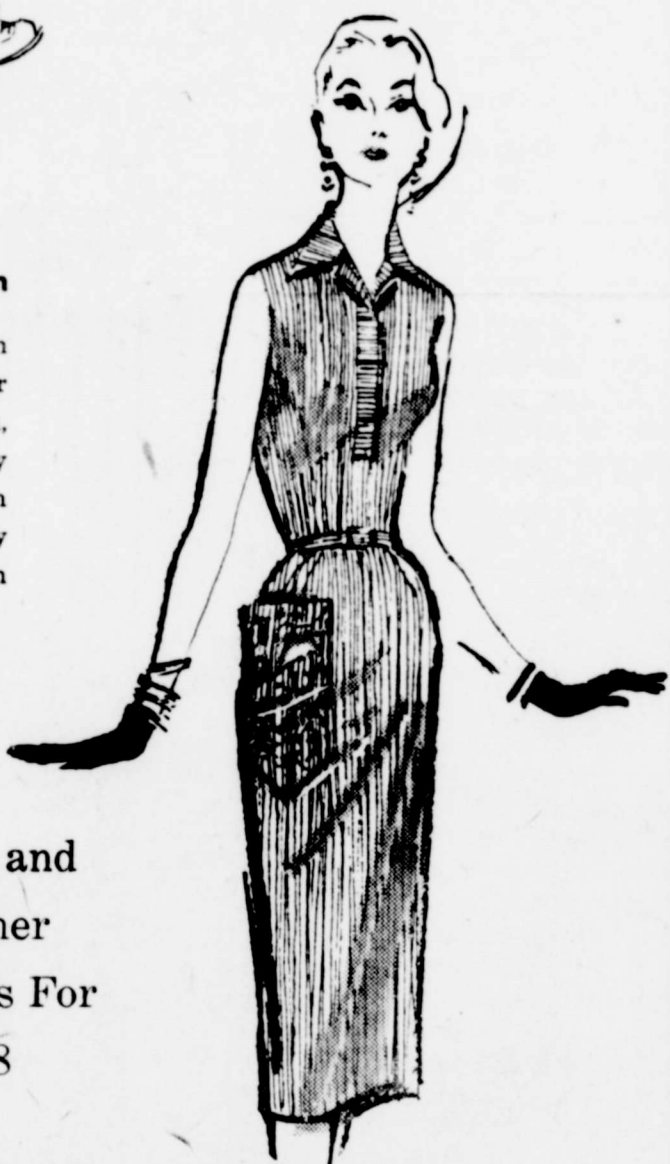
