Annual Kid Rodeo Plans Point To June 13-14 Show

THEY HOOKED THE CROOKS

The old saying that the law has a long arm proves to be the truth right here in Upton County. Last week "the long arm" reached out all the way to La Grange on the coast and nabbed three suspects who had carted off a safe from the home of L. R. Grigsby in McCamey.

Taken into custody by the La Grange police and now cooling their heels as guests of Upton County are James Wayne Walker, 18, Alton Wayne Smith, 16, and Lee Walker, 41, all of San Angelo. Smith was released earlier in the week on a juvenile parole.

He is also on probation from the Gatesville school for boys. Lee Walker has served two terms in the state prison and was also wanted by San Angelo police.

LIFT SAFE

On April 11, the three made a trip from San Angelo to this area and after spending some time "casing" the home of Grigsby, they loaded the safe into the back of a car and took it to a spot near the North Concho Lake where they forced it open and took some \$100 in change and a container of old coins and bills. According to their statements, they located the safe after talking to a negro who was driving a Texaco gasoline truck. Grigsby is the Texaco distributor for Upton County in addition to having several other businesses.

Lee Walker stated that the driver of the truck said that he knew of a man in McCamey who kept a large amount of money in a safe at his home and that it was often unguarded.

TAKE A TRIP

After opening the safe, the men stated that they left San Angelo and went to Buchanan Lake and from there to Houston. From there they went to La Grange where they were arrested. It was the container of old coins which proved to be their undoing since it has the name "L. R. Grigsby, Sanderson, Texas" stamped on it. Grigsby had lived in Sanderson prior to moving to McCamey.

Sheriff H. E. "Gene" Eckols said this week that the two adults are being held for the grand jury under \$3,000 bail and face burglary charges. The juvenile was paroled to San Angelo juvenile authorities.

THE BIG RED STORY

Somewhere down the line, though,
 somebody didn't ignore the issue.
 Last week we received an item from
 the Small Business Administration
 that points out a few matters pre-
 taining to the so-called Co-operatives
 that operate throughout the
 nation. It might be noted that the

Russians have a very similar gadget
 which they call a "collective."

Co-op competition today affects
 practically every line of business.
 Paying little or no income tax,
 co-ops market and process farm
 products (their first venture) and
 sell farm supplies; they manufac-
 ture or distribute hardware, farm
 machinery, building materials, auto-
 mobile and tractor tires, batteries
 and equipment, household electric
 appliances, cosmetics, tooth brushes,
 cigars and cigarettes and hundreds
 of other items.

Co-ops drill oil wells, operate ref-
 ineries and sell gasoline at filling
 stations. They are in banking, in-
 surance, mining, lumbering, publish-
 ing, papermaking and home build-
 ing. They run electric systems, tele-
 phone lines and radio stations. They
 operate hospitals, summer camps
 and funeral parlors. They are de-
 veloping chain stores and their slo-
 gan is "Co-ops must get bigger!"
 All without the necessity of paying
 income tax or helping in any way to
 support the country in which they
 thrive.

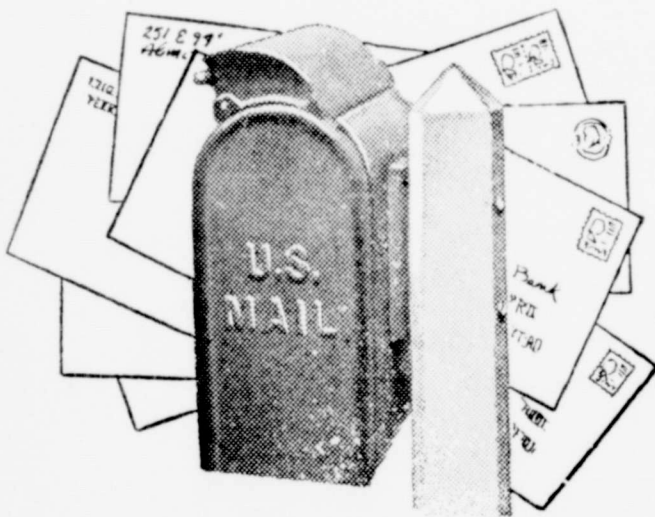

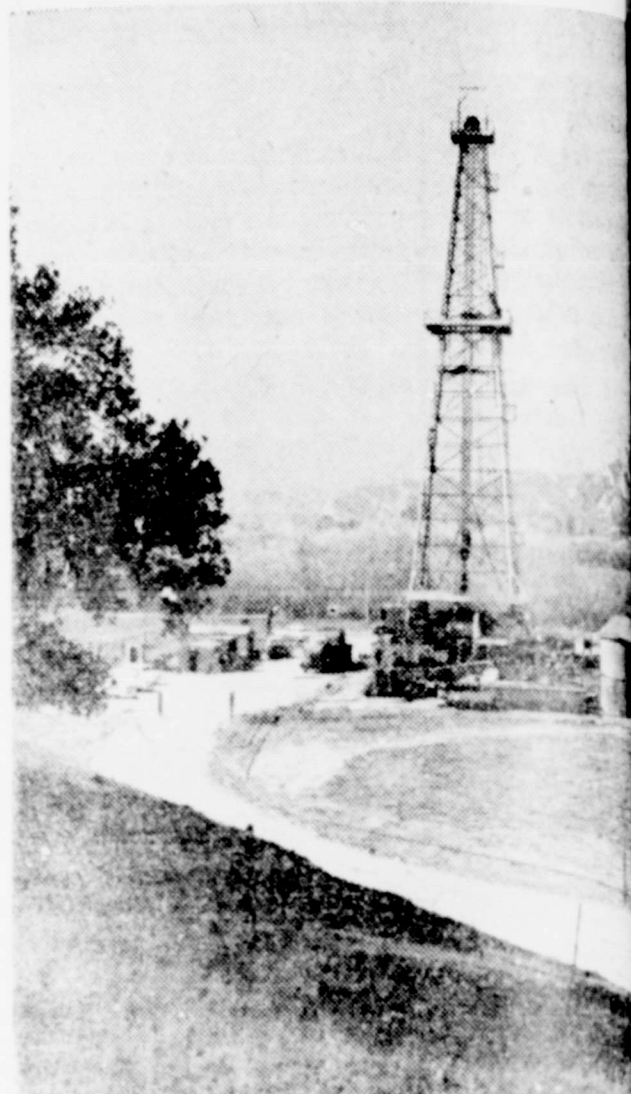

JANE HERBERT WILKINSON LONG

"Mother of Lone Star Independence"

When pretty young Jane Herbert Wilkinson Long chose to follow her husband into Nacogdoches in the summer of 1819, a life of high adventure, incredible hardship and independence was well begun. The first known Anglo-American woman to enter turbulent Texas, she bore the first known child of such parentage in the state. The husband she followed, Dr. James Long, was one of those crusading Americans dedicated to freeing Texas and Mexico from Spanish rule. While he was at Galveston to enlist the aid of pirate Jean Lafitte, Jane was forced to flee Nacogdoches. As her husband's band of hardy fighters harassed the presidios through the bitter winter of 1821, she took refuge in a rude fort at Point Bolivar. Alone there, except for her 5-year-old daughter and a negro girl, she bore a daughter in mid-winter... Mary

James, the first native Anglo-Texan. Jane was rescued months later, only to find that Dr. Long was dead. But she lived many full and exciting years, until 1880, to see Texas under Mexican rule, as a Republic and as a State.

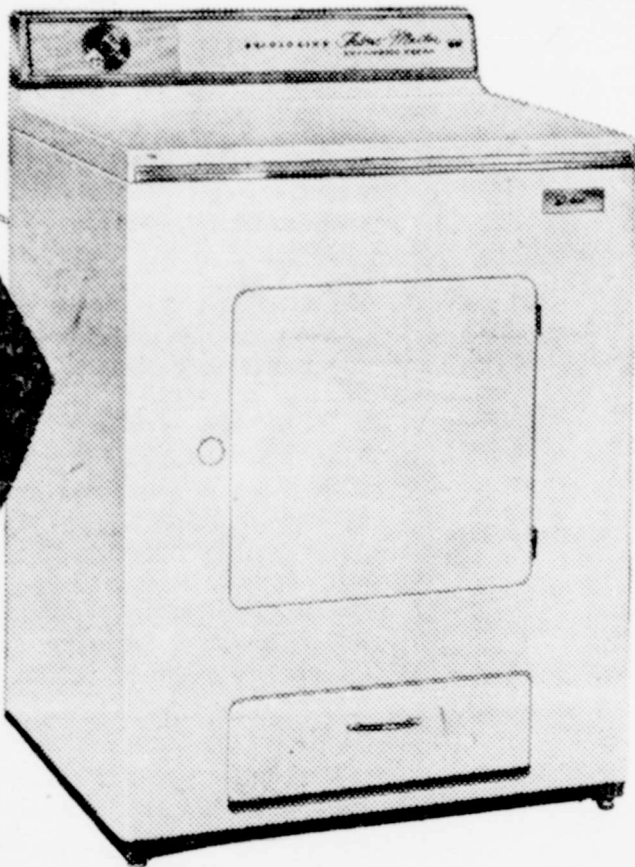
