All of the winning teams together with their agents and adult leaders appeared on a thirty minute TV program at 5:00 Saturday afternoon. Those not winning were a part of the viewing audience.

The district contest included representatives from some 23 counties, thirteen of which have home demonstration agents.

## Red Devil Band "Upset" In Regional Meet Contest

Rankin High School's Red Devil Band will not make their trip to Enid, Oklahoma, this year. In accordance to a school policy, the local band group must win a sweepstake at Regional level before making the trip to the tri-state band festival, an event in which they have won two sweepstakes in their two appearances.

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Last week in regional competition in Odessa, the Red Devil Band failed by slight margin to capture their fourth sweepstake in five years of competition when they drew a second division rating in concert playing. At the same time, the group won a first division in sight reading.

However, there was considerable consolation to the local organization in the fact that a number of other bands which have been heavy winners in the regional contests over the past years also failed to make the sweepstake spot with only Crane and Wink of all the West Texas entries moving into that position.

"We have no excuses for our second division rating in the concert phase of the contest," Fred Prentice, band director said this week. "We believe that the judging was very good and that we played what amounted to a second division rating."

"We will, however, be back next year with every intention of improving in that department and going on to win a sweepstake," he said.

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**THE BIG CROOKS**

Frank Boyd tells the story of the group of city-slicker counterfeiters who were having a great deal of luck with their \$5's, \$10's and \$20's. There seemed to be no flaws in their workmanship. One day while killing a bit of

time, one of the more industrious of the gang printed up a \$15 bill. His work was also adjudged to be superb and rather than waste the job it was decided to pass it off some place where the folks were not too sharp on their trading.

"Let's take it to Rankin and spend it . . . that's a country bunch out there," one suggested and so they did.

The counterfeiter walked into one of the local stores and bought a 65c item and handed the merchant the \$15 bill. The storekeeper examined the bill, took it to the cash register and rang up the sale. He counted out the change and gave it back to the man who by this time was getting a little uneasy and just grabbed all the money handed him and rushed back to his car.

There, he counted his change: one 35c peice and two \$7 bills.

**WHY IS IT**

It is not the intention of the editor in these columns to continually point out only the things that he considers to be wrong with the operation of the federal government . . . there are many good things about it and we will always uphold it as being one of the best in the world under which the individual may live. However, it is because of the belief in these individual rights that there is always made in this column an effort to

point out anything that has a tendency to take away or restrain these rights. It is for this reason that criticism is often pointed toward federal policies and federal politics, for we do not think we will ever loose our rights by means of force, such as an armed revolution within the nation led by communists or some other such group. Rather, if we lose our rights . . . and some have already slipped away . . . it will be by creation of a sort of "Frankenstein" of our own making—originally designed for good but gradually getting out of hand.

With this in mind, attention is called to a recent ruling of the Internal Revenue Service which disallows as a business expense for tax purposes amounts paid to an organization which, through advertising, attempts to influence legislation or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate. This ruling, which in itself would seem justified, has now been extended by IRS to refuse deduction of \$23,000 contributed by a gas and electric company to finance an advertising campaign against a government backed power project.

In other words, individuals or companys can no longer speak out against the federal government programs without expecting some sort of penalty. Right here at home the local power company cannot point out the faults of REA electrical programs as compared to that

of free enterprise without having a penalty slapped on them in form of tax squeezes.

The Internal Revenue Service has now stepped into the business of censorship. They have knocked one little peg from under the foundation of freedom of speech.

But, on the other hand, the same federal agency has ruled that advertising contributions made to the "Foundation for Education on International Economic Relations" are tax deductible. This particular fund is being used to influence U. S. tax payers . . . Rankin Citizens . . . to support foreign aid.

So, if an advertiser gives to a fund for advertising to explain why legislation will be harmful to his business, the contribution may not be deducted for tax purposes. But the amount is deductible if it is used for advertising to explain why taxpayers should be jolly well pleased over billions of their dollars being given away to foreign countries, many of them dripping red in Communist paganism. As Wray Flemming of the Hoosier State Press Association says: "Makes sense, doesn't it? Or does it!"

**WATCH IT**

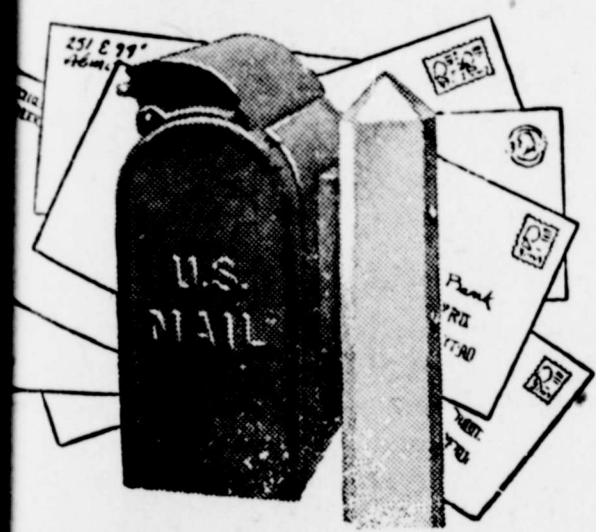

**BASIN BOY SCOUTS TO HOLD CAMPOREE**

## RMA GROUP SEES NEED FOR BETTER LAWS, LESS TAXES

A study of ways to reduce State expenditures to meet a State government deficit rather than seek additional revenue by imposing new taxes has been recommended by the Retail Merchants Association of Texas as the best solution to the State's money ills, Myrtle Brown, owner of the Credit Bureau of Rankin, said today.

"The RMA is recommending to the two groups and the governor that such a study include possible consolidations of departments and agencies, the elimination of useless and unnecessary services and a closer scrutiny of all state expenses," Mrs. Brown said.

The RMA has noted that the two groups studying the money problems have been devoting most of their attention on hearing arguments pro and con on various types of new taxes that might be imposed, including sales tax, income tax and gross receipts taxes.

The tax study is being made because the State faces a possible deficit of \$50 to \$100 million.

"It is the opinion of RMA members that the tax load on consumers and businessmen alike are already excessive, and what is needed now more than anything else is a reduction in taxes that will increase the purchasing power of

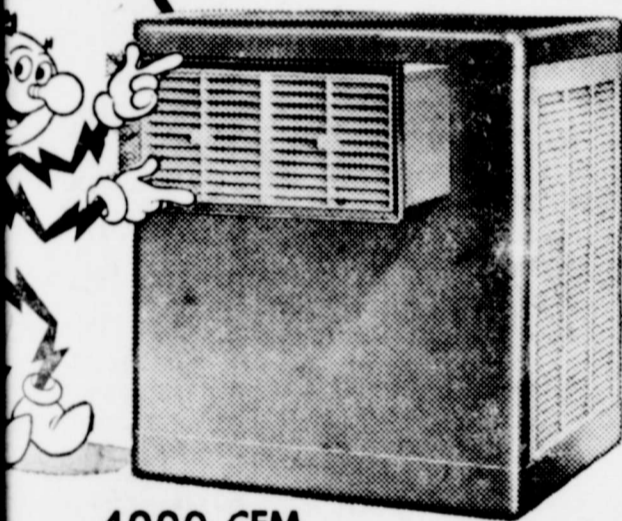

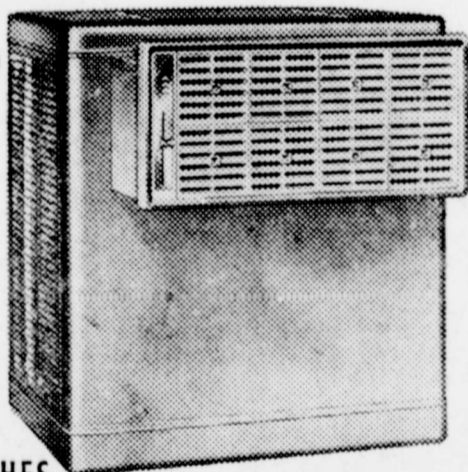

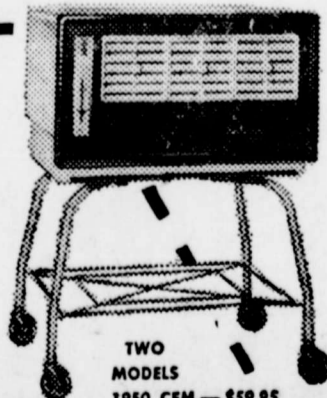
