The political die for the July Democratic Primary has been cast in Upton County. Only two new candidates made public announcements as to their intentions to make races as the deadline passed on May 5.

Entering the race for County and District Clerk was J. G. Herrington, Mayor of McCamey, and F. E. Carter, rancher, who announced for Justice of the Peace opposing Mrs. Ailene Jo Gibson who has held that office for a number of years in McCamey.

Unopposed county races will see T. D. "Tommy" Workman, Jr. and

Joe Conger, commissioners of precincts two and four respectively, make the ballot without opponents. Elizabeth Rains, county treasurer, and Omar Warren, J. P. in Precinct 1, will also be unopposed for re-election.

CONTESTED RACES

In the State Representative slot for the 102nd District, Louis Anderson, seeking re-election, is opposed by Brown Bailey and Robert E. Montgomery.

For county judge, J. H. "Bud" Fisher is contested by Norman Elrod, Emmett Matejowsky and Horace Slaughter.

For County and District Clerk, Nancy Daugherty is opposed by Herrington while W. J. "Curley" Cowen, J. P. in Precinct 2 has Charlie Campbell and Mrs. Elsie Turner as opponents.

These candidates are the ones who have made public their intentions to seek the various offices. Several have filed for such offices as district judge who have yet to make public announcements as to their quest for the positions.

Absentee voting in the primary begins July 6 and runs through the 22nd of July. The primary itself will be on July 26.

POLITICKING

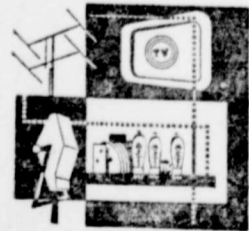

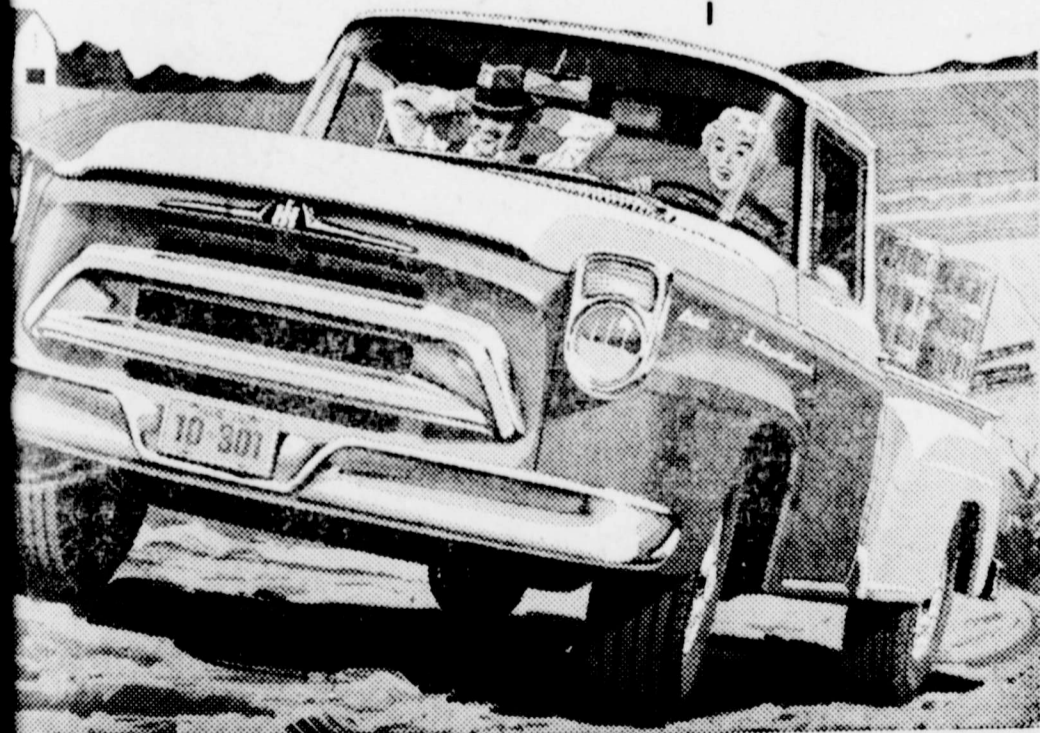
