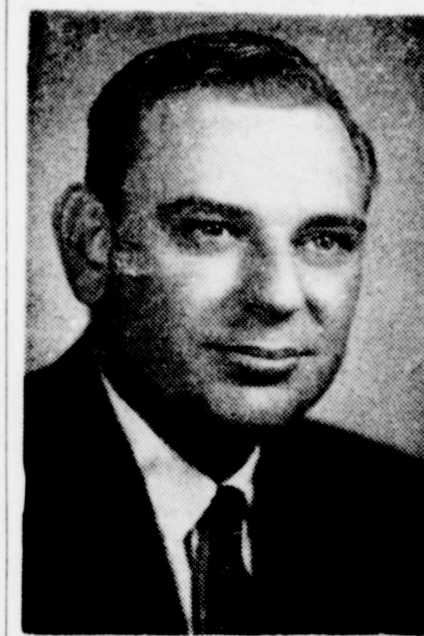

## BROWN BAILEY IS LION SPEAKER

Brown Bailey, candidate for Representative in the 102nd District which includes Upton County, was a guest and speaker at the regular Monday night meeting of the Rankin Lions Club June 2. Bailey is a cousin of Lynn McAden, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Rankin.

Speaking briefly to the members of the organization following the business session, Bailey told them that he "wanted to be a representative to all the people—regardless of how many votes were in a community."

He further promised to introduce to the legislature any measure brought to him by a group representing a majority in a given community and let the state governing body decide what should be done next.

"I will not be a judge and jury on measures brought to me by the people of the district," he said.

In the question and answer session following his speech, it was brought out that he did not favor a sales tax at this time as a means of raising more money for state operations. He did express the opinion that some state spending could be curtailed.

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**POLITICKING TIME**

Last Monday night, the Lions  
heard Brown Bailey, candidate for  
state representative in the 102nd  
district of Texas—a seat presently  
held by Andy Anderson—say that  
he wanted to represent ALL the  
people—that he wanted to give their  
wishes and desires a chance before  
the law making bodies of the state.

If Mr. Baily is sincere in this—  
and we have every reason to believe  
that he is— then he is the type of  
man who should be given an oppor-  
tunity to represent the people  
of district 102. Not only that, he  
is the type of man—assuming that  
he will continue with his present  
attitude—that is needed in every  
office in Texas from that of US  
Senator on down to school board  
member.

Right at this time we have a  
whole pack of senators, representa-  
tives and assorted office holders  
who make trips out into the pasture  
to see how the peasants are doing

and what they want. They listen  
to the complaints and the sugges-  
tions and almost without exception  
extend their agreement. Then they  
return to Washington or Austin  
and do as they bloody well please  
and in 99 per cent of the cases  
pay no more attention to what  
the public wanted than a news-  
paper man does the bills he owes.

And why shouldn't they do as  
they please. We, the voters seldom  
if ever bother to check on what  
they are doing or how they vote  
on various bills . . . in other words  
. . . we don't like to be bothered  
with politics. Therefore, we get of-  
fice holders who will listen to our  
complaints when they are among  
us but who apparently throw them  
out the window on their way to  
the next town.

A prime example of disregard  
to what people in a given area  
want and what they get is seen  
in the present Statehood Bill for  
Alaska. We read that almost 100  
per cent of the people in Alaska  
want to join the Union and that  
some 34 per cent of the population  
of Alaska is composed of former  
Texans. Yet, the man in Congress  
who is doing the most to scotch  
the Statehood bill is a Texas Con-  
gressman.

He says that lots of times, the  
people do not understand a problem  
such as the Statehood Bill. Maybe  
they don't but the people are a  
pretty good judge of what they  
want and it is our understanding  
that congressmen and such are el-  
ected to represent the people—not  
to judge what they should or  
should not want done.

Brown Bailey says that he is for  
trying to reduce some of the spend-  
ing in Texas rather than adding  
more taxes to cover bigger outlays  
of money. Again, we believe that he  
is sincere and if he is, everyone  
seems to be in agreement that  
that is what ought to be done.

A business or a family—whenever  
they can't cover their expenses—  
makes an effort to cut back some-  
where on their spending. Why can't  
government bodies do the same . . .  
or beter still . . . why won't the

**ANTS, THIS TIME**

Oh yes, the false chinch bug is very much still with us. Even with the chlordane put on very generously we've been winning only skirmishes. If they don't decide to depart before long. We're very much in danger of losing the battle. We understand that there are a good many places so far that have missed the infestation. If that is true with you, count it among your blessings. Then keep an eye open in case you have any plants you value. We saw them crossing Main street in down town Rankin Saturday in droves, so you may receive a visit yet. (The ones migrating through town weren't ours, they are still with us.)

But we started out to talk about ants. A number have been concerned about ants on their plants. There are several varieties of cut ants that will damage plants but most

of the small ants crawling around over your plants are after the honey dew secreted by aphids and scale rather than the plant itself. So if you have trouble with the ants, look for aphids on scale.

As for the ants themselves, apply 10% chlordane generously around the ant hills and you'll get them.

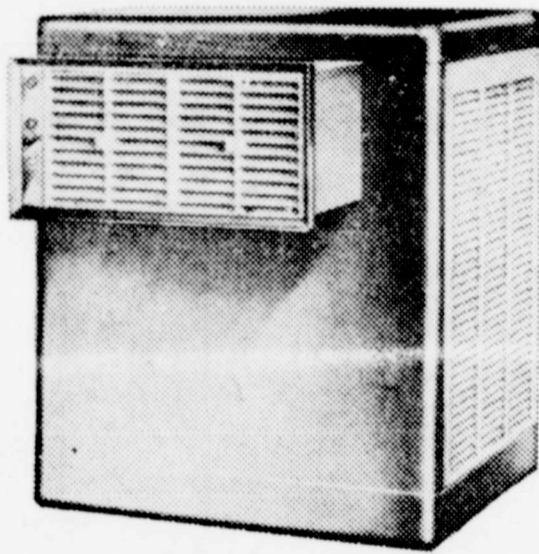

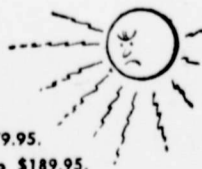

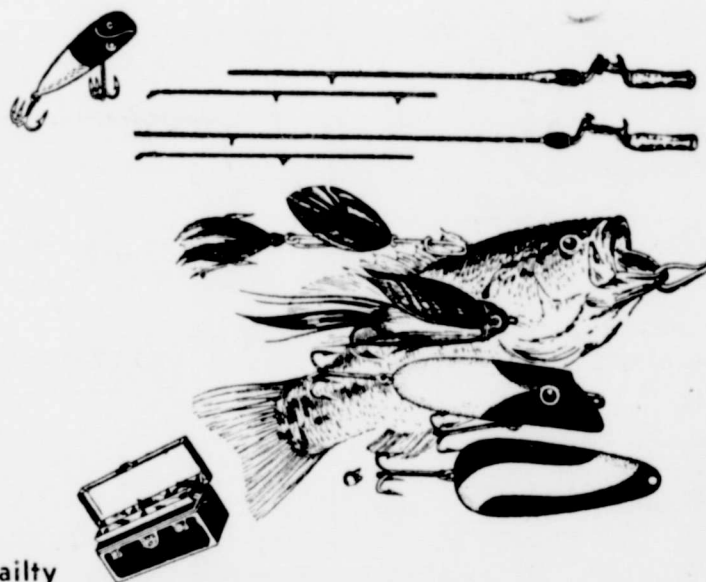
