ODD-SIZE

Odd-size pieces of a minimum two ounces will rise from three to six cents on August 1, and book mailing rates will be nine cents for the first pound plus five cents each for additional pounds.

Annual bulk mailing fees, paid each calendar year, will be raised from \$10 to \$20, effective Jan., 1,

The act also provindes a weight limit on third class mail, up to but not including 16 ounces, to be three cents for the first two ouncer plus one and one-half cents for each additional ounce.

"This is an oddity in the new law." said Miss Roach. " It will actually provide a decrease in third class rates due to size limits."

ADJUSTMENTS

Circulars, merchandise and miscellaneous mail will rise from two to three cents an ounce. This does not include bulk mailing. Bulk mailing postal rates will not be changed until Jan., 1, 1959, Miss Roach explained.

The popular three cent stamp will be no longer, and a maroon-colored four cent stamp picturing Abraham Lincoln will step in to claim the demanding needs in the first class mail division.


