Near Fatal Accident Occurs Here July 4

Probably one of the luckiest people in Upton County on July 4 was J. L. Cook, 29, of Ballenger who was involved in a one-car auto accident just West of the Rankin City limits.

Cook, driving a 1957 Mercury at what witnesses described as well over 100 miles per hour, hit the East end of the bridge over the draw without ever applying his brakes. The car was totally demolished with the engine and transmission being torn out and the body of the car ripped from the frame. Cook was thrown out of the car and suffered a broken right leg and some internal injuries. However, it has been learned that he has been taken off the critical list at a San Angelo hospital and is expected to recover fully.

Following the accident, he was first taken to the McCamey Hospital in the Rankin Volunteer Fire Department ambulance and later moved to San Angelo. He told investigating officers that he fell asleep at the wheel. Several cans of beer were picked up around the wreckage of the car.

Had Cook been killed, he would have been the first Upton County highway death since May 3, 1956. Two auto deaths have occurred within the city limits of McCamey since that time but are not counted in determining on-the-highway fatalities.

ELECTION INTEREST

Interest in the coming election on July 26 is rapidly picking up with considerable attention going to the county judge's race with Bud Fisher the incumbent, seeking to hold the office against Norman Elrod, Horace Slaughter and Emmitt Matejowsky. Elrod, a Rankin resident, is the first local man to seek the office in a number of years.

Other contests in which interest will be centered are the county and district clerk's race with Nancy K. Daugherty seeking re-election and Jim Herrington opposing. In the JP race in Precinct Two, J. W. "Curley" Cowen is running for re-election with Charlie Campbell out as his opponent.

Three candidates: Brown Bailey, Bob Montgomery and Andy Anderson are trying for the seat of Representative in the 102nd District. Anderson presently holds the post.

In the 83rd Judge's race, Bill Granger of Rankin is seeking to unseat Pat Patterson of Alpine. No great amount of interest is being shown in the state races with all the candidates for the office putting their efforts into campaigning in other parts of Texas. (The second largest state in the Union)

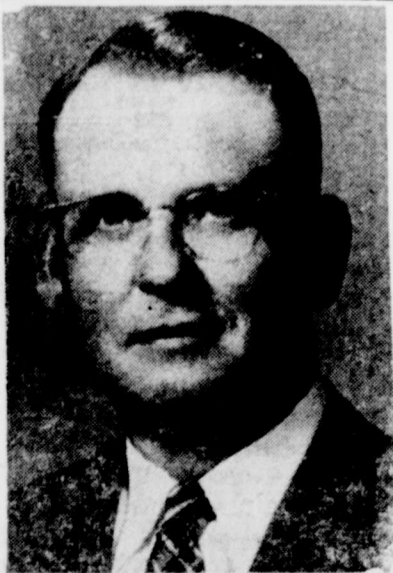

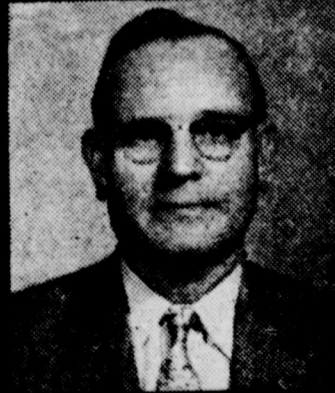

SUMMER SCHOOL

We have just returned from the Extension Regional Summer School held at Fort Collins, Colorado. Yes, it was cool most of the time and some snow, and a couple of hail storms mixed in. We had taken summer clothes, winter clothes, coat raincoat and a fan, so we were ready for it.

We took two courses, one in Family Financial Planning and one in Psychology. Both of our professors were from the Federal Extension Office and both were excellent, so we felt that we got a lot from the courses. We'll be using information gleaned from both as we go along. We had four hours class each day, had much committee work, library assignments, and term papers. It was sorta fun to be a classroom student again and see just how we could get along on a study routine.

But it wasn't all study. Weekends and some evenings found the group of about 300 engaged in mountain tours, fish fry, picnic—and what a wonderful place they have for such events. It was fun taking pictures from a 12,000 foot pass even if it was raining, snowing and wind blowing all at the same time. We brought back four rolls of colored slides, so when you get hungry for mountains, come over and we will let you see them on the screen.

Movies and slides shown by foreign students were also part of the evening entertainment. Most of the extension agents stayed in a large dormitory reserved for them. Part of the fun as well as the education came from exchanging ideas with agents from all over the country and several foreign countries. Most of the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and fourteen foreign countries were represented in the group there for the courses. Texas with 35 agents was the largest delegation. Incidentally, no one from Texas had to do any bragging, everyone else did it for us.

The Texas agents took plenty of ribbing when the news reached us that Alaska had been taken into the union. There were all sorts of references to the "second largest state in the union." The agent from Alaska came in for his share too being presented with a rattle (a sack containing pennies) from Arizona since they were no longer the baby.

We traveled by bus (cheaper that way). The bus trip was also responsible for one of the most heart warming experiences of the three weeks. Along about midnight near Raton, New Mexico we came upon two huge rocks that had rolled down onto the highway. The bus driver stopped with the remark that someone might get hurt there, turned his spotlight on the rocks and got out to put out a flare. It rained every step of the way from Colo-

rado Springs to Andress, and was cold. While the driver was having a little difficulty lighting the flare a young fellow got off our bus and the two of them managed to move the smaller rock from the road. The drivers of three cars that had passed saw what was happening, stopped and came back to help. It took about all the five men could do to move the larger rock but they got it past the edge of the pavement and then left a flare on it, all of the time they were working without coats in the driving wind and rain. How kind and helpful people mean to be and how far they'll go when someone is thought-

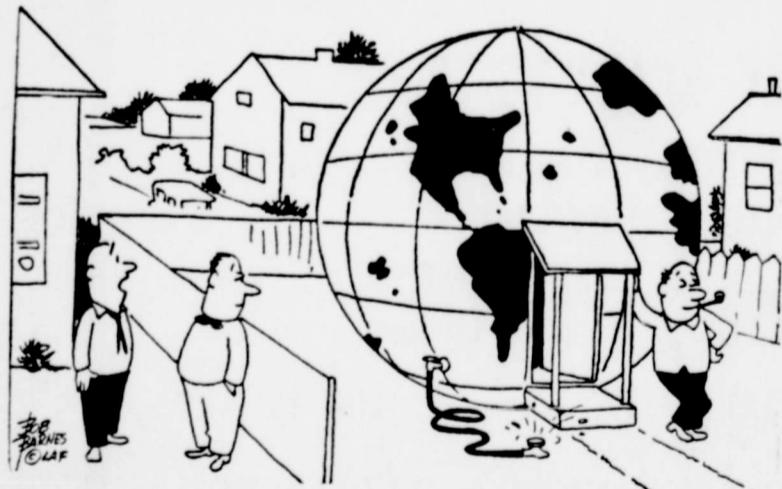

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

CHIEF FIELDS OF THE CHEROKEES

The Warrior Who Lived and Died for Peace

Not all of the champions of freedom honored in Texas history were Anglo-Americans. One whose ideals of liberty led to his death at the hands of his own people was a Cherokee chief... Richard Fields. From the east Fields led his tribe into Texas in 1820, to find a country where they could live peacefully. Attempting to secure land for the tribe, he appealed to the Mexican Governor at San Antonio de Bexar. From there he made his way to Mexico City, to beg for land from the Viceroy. Unsuccessful, despairing and without funds, he returned to fight for his cause. At Nacogdoches Fields joined the Anglo-Texans who were forming the ill-fated Fredonian Republic.

Under the flag of Fredonia, Texas was to be divided between the Anglos and the Indians, share and share alike. But the Republic of Fredonia lasted just

45 days, the flag was lowered on January 31, 1827. Then Chief Fields' unhappy and confused Cherokee people held him responsible for this new misfortune. The old chief, the dedicated freedom-fighter, was executed on the following May 8th.

Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live. In this vigorous and freedom-minded homeland...
