ORDERS CHANGES IN REMODELING PLANS—

FIRM IS LOW BIDDER MONDAY RANKIN STREET PAVING PROJECT

Construction Company of Rankin, Texas, has been awarded a street paving contract with a low bid of \$10,000 on awarding of bids by the Upton County Court in their regular session last Monday, July 14.

In McCamey, the contract went to Carr & Howard Construction Company of Box 247, Monahans, with a low bid of \$6,365.52. Work in both towns is scheduled to get underway before the end of the month.

In the call for bids issued by the county some three weeks ago, it was specified that 56,000 square yards of double surface and 7,400 square yards of single surface asphalt treatment would be applied to county roads in Rankin and vicinity while an unspecified amount was to be put into the McCamey work.

Engineer for the Rankin work is W. W. Greif and Associates, formerly of McCamey and now operating out of Snyder, while a new set of engineers, Edwin S. Martin Co. of Odessa, is being used on the McCamey work.

ORDER COURTHOUSE CHANGE

In other business transacted by the court, an order to the engineer on the remodeling of the courthouse authorized him to change the specifications concerning the plastering of certain walls and the type of door jamb to be used. The order calls for all interior partitions in the new structure to be plastered. All new door jambs are to be steel and all inside surfaces of exterior walls are to be plastered.

Cost for this additional work was set at \$3,667.00. Original bid on the remodeling job was \$109,850.00. Present construction on the new addition was all but halted this week as a mix-up in the prefabrication of certain parts of the steel frame work developed.

Rankin Chosen As Site For Little League Ball Playoffs

Once again Rankin has been selected as the site for some of the more important playoff games in the Little League Baseball program. At least two games will be played at the local diamond during the coming week that will see some of the best All-Star players in the various leagues in action.

On Monday night, July 21, Area 3 will open their play-offs to determine the winner who will represent them in District meet. Beginning at 7:00 p.m. the Rankin All-Stars will meet a similar team from the Midkiff Little League, this year operating four Little League teams.

Immediately following this game, the All-Star squads from Crane and Big Lake will stage a contest.

McCAMEY PLAY—

On Tuesday night, the winner of the Rankin-Midkiff game will go to McCamey where they will play a one-game series with the McCamey "Stars". Winner of this event will then play the winner of the Crane-Big Lake game on Wednesday night. Site for this final game in Area 3 will be determined by the flip of a coin.

The team that emerges with the Area three crown will meet the Area 4 champs on Thursday night. Location of this contest will also be determined at a later date but will be held in either Fort Stockton, Wink, Pecos or Monahans, the towns having teams in Area 4.

BACK TO RANKIN—

On Friday night, July 25, action will return to Rankin where the Bi-District Championship game is to be played. Gametime will be at 8:00 p.m. This encounter will be between the district champions from Areas 3 and 4 and the district winners in the area from San Angelo to Del Rio.

Most Little League fans have expressed the opinion that—since the teams that advance to the Bi-District play-offs will have been in action for five nights in a row—the squad having the strongest pitching staff will likely emerge the winner. Crane carried the banner for the area teams into the finals in Bi-District last year but is not expected to be quite as strong this season.

BAD CHECKS SHOW INCREASE IN STATE

Some forty persons from Rankin and McCamey were on hand last Tuesday night at the Rankin Park Building to hear a battery of speakers in a Bad-Check Clinic sponsored by the First State Bank and the local law enforcement agencies. Speakers were from Austin, Midland, Fort Stockton and McCamey.

Joel Tisedale, chief of the Texas Identification Bureau in Austin, led off the evening's program by showing a number of slides on various types of bad checks. He also pointed out that 3,279 cases of fraud were handled by the department last year with a total value of \$300,088-80. Indicating that this type of swindling was on the rise is the fact that the department has already handled 3,187 cases in 1958.

HELP NEEDED

All of the speakers emphasized the fact that cooperation between the public and the law enforcement agencies, both local and state-wide, is necessary to effectively combat the hot checkers. Frank Probst, captain of Company E Texas Rangers, pointed out that an estimated \$18 to \$25 million per year is

IT'LL COST MORE—

Now the news is out that next year it will cost more to insure the family bus—about 15 to 17 percent more or around \$15 per new car in a family. This ought to be encouraging to everyone.

The excuse given by the insurance companies and the regulatory agencies of the State is that the rising number of auto accidents makes the raise a necessity. We have little doubt but what that is correct.

But, who is to blame for the rising accident rates. We say that it is the fault of the general public. Three weeks ago a jury turned a DWI suspect loose here in Upton County. Not much longer than that a chap was found along side the road near one of the larger town carrying a big sign and warning all motorists to slow down—that there was a radar check-point just down the road. In general, the attitude of

the public is for the breakers of traffic regulations and against the officers who must enforce them. So, if you get a bill for about 20 bucks more insurance next year, remember that whenever you have an opportunity to cooperate with the law officers in enforcing traffic laws—instead of making it easy on violators, we'd do well to crack down for when we let them off light, we're just adding to our own financial burdens.
