## Sure-footed Man Serves Texas

The colorful language of the ranch and trail seems to fit Bill Blakley, who made his start in life as a working cowhand. He still rides and ropes with the hands on his ranch at roundup

Speaking of Blakley's service as U. S. Senator in 1957, the Dallas News said: "... If he was as unassuming as an old boot, it was nevertheless a well polished boot that never wobbled or wandered from its purposeful path. For this man Blakley is a surefooted man who knows exactly where he stands and what he believes.


