LEST WE FORGET

May 25th will be the first "Poppy Day" of peace. We now have time to remember, and may Americans never forget those who gave their lives to bring victory and peace to this land of ours. Wearing the Memorial Poppy on Poppy Day is the way every individual American can show that he does remember and honor the sacrifices of those who died on the battlefields.

It is the privilege of the American Legion and Auxiliary to bring the poppy to Americans on Poppy Day. Girls of the Auxiliary, let us bring to every American the opportunity to pay individual tribute to the boys who make our poppies.

The coming of peace had brought no release from suffering for many of the men who won the victory. Thousands are still in the military hospitals and other thousands discharged from the service are in the Veterans' Hospitals, side by side with veterans of the first World War, making Memorial Poppies for Poppy Day.

Here is the history that we should all know about our poppy program. That the American Legion was the first organization to adopt the poppy as its memorial flower, Sept. 1920.

The Legion's Auxiliary adopted it in October 1921, and pledged the profits from the sales, 100 percent, to welfare service to veterans and their families. That we do not allow the sale of poppies to be commercialized.

That 25,000,000,000 poppies were sold on the streets last year. That \$100,000 is paid annually to needy and disabled veterans for making poppies.

So, friends, buy a poppy, wear it with pride and give generously for it, for it all goes to keep those, who gave the best they had that we can still have America and all its freedoms.

CITY AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS IN PROGRESS

The City, during the past week has had a force of men at work placing caliche on that part of Main Street, north of the highway through the McMillan-Pergus Addition, and grading to afford sufficient drainage during heavy rains.

With this drainage and the application of the caliche, the surface of the street in that part of the city should be high enough to prevent flooding.

Euclid has also been opened and is being graded from the highway, or Eleventh Street, north to the city limits, and the Friona Lions Club has assumed the work of beautifying the public park, by getting a good start of Bermuda grass over the entire surface.

Work on the new building on Block No. 12, on the south side of the highway, is also progressing, the walls being erected and the floor being poured this week and will soon be ready for the roof. This building, which, according to rumor, will house the new steam laundry.

The two-story apartment house now being built by J. C. Wilkison, on Euclid Ave. on the south side of his residence, is also nearing the state of completion.

Two of the six new residence buildings being erected by F. S. Truitt on Block No. 48, just south of the Grade School building, have been so far completed that families have moved into them. One is occupied by the McDaniel and family, and the other is occupied by Mr. Foster, proprietor of the Foster Dry Goods store, and his family.

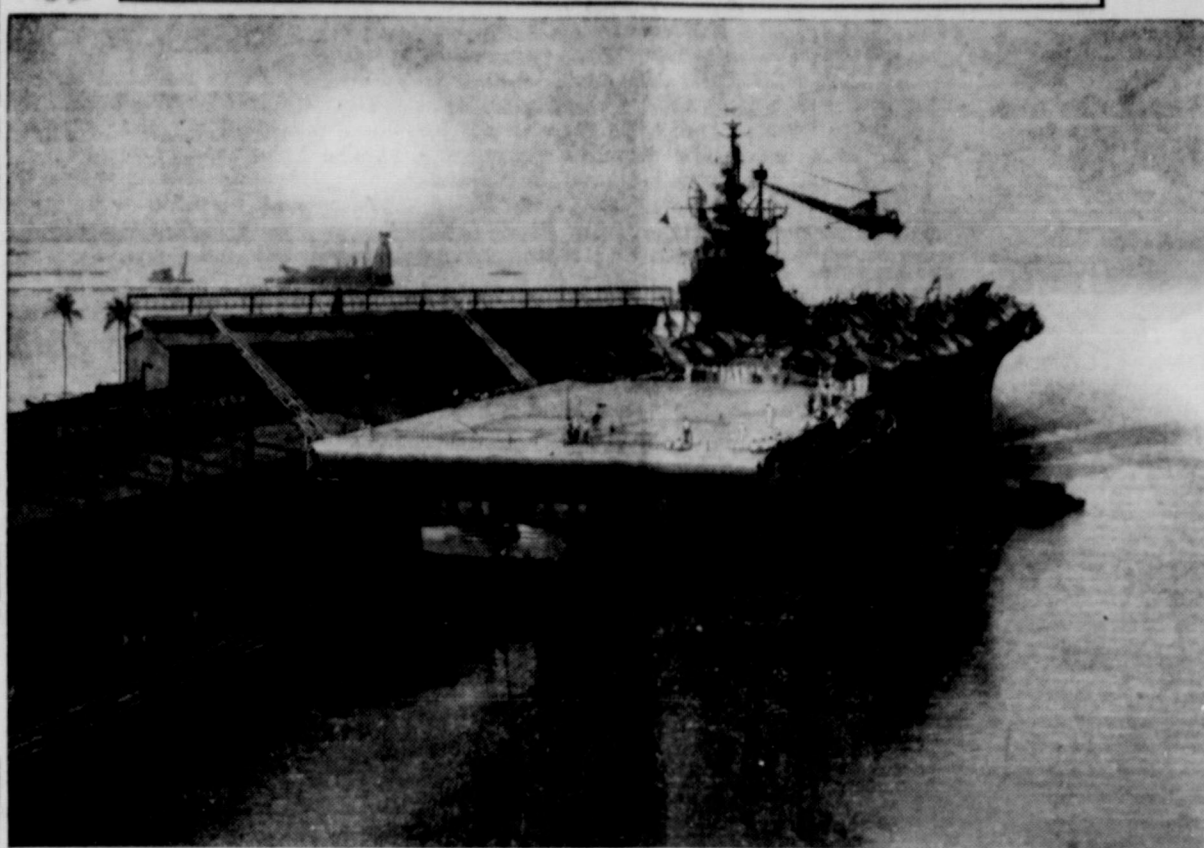

School Inspector Has Good Report Of Local School

Mr. E. H. Boulter, deputy state superintendent, made his visit to the schools Monday, and the following is the report that was made to the State Department of Education:

Credits added: Texas History, Physics and Physiology.

Credits dropped: None.

Philosophy: This school has a definite philosophy and it is on file in the superintendent's office.

Commendations: 1. The school program has progressed in a splendid manner this year. This is the consensus of opinion among people that are in a position to know.

2. This school recognizes the value of a music program, especially is this true in the field of band music.

3. Exhibits were filed in official manner, and the English exhibits were especially good.

4. A broad physical education program is stressed and as evidence of this idea a new tennis court has been constructed, athletic field improved and gym reconditioned.

5. The grade school seems to be getting along in splendid fashion and the physical education program at this level is a good average.

6. The curriculum is liberal and varied with the view of serving the boys and girls of this particular community.

7. Thanks are extended to Supt. Holmes and Prin. Williams for their cooperation.

The following are recommendations that were made by Mr. Boulter:

1. Added emphasis should be given to safety education.

2. The elementary school faculty should continue to give thought and study to the criteria for evaluating elementary schools.

GOOD WHEAT HERE YET

In spite of the severe drought of the past winter and spring in this locality, it appears that there is still lots of fields of good wheat here that, at present appearances, should make a good average yield.

True, it will probably not make a bumper crop such as we had two years ago, but should make a good yearly average.

T. J. Crawford has a bunch of wheat in the show window of his store, which was taken from one of his farms, and judging by this sample people are estimating the yield in that field as high as forty bushels an acre.

The writer would not care to say that any of the fields that came under his observation would rate that high, but one quarter section should make twenty-five or, perhaps thirty bushels per acre. Other fields will rate from eight to fifteen bushel yields.

True, there are some fields that will not rate that high, and some fields have already been plowed, and in the event of a near future rain will evidently be used for row crops or for summer tilling.

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**Government Will
Take 25 Percent
Of 1946 Wheat**

The Government will requisition 25 percent of the 1946 wheat crop as it is delivered to the elevators this summer, the Department of Agriculture announced in Washington Tuesday.

The wheat will not be requisitioned directly from the farmers, but will be taken at the elevator.

Farmers will be required to sell 50 percent of the wheat delivered to the elevator immediately, the department has ordered. This means that farmers will not be able to store more than 50 percent of their crop at the elevator for future sale.

The announcement represented the most drastic action taken to date by the government

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in an effort to solve the problem of providing wheat for export to famine-struck countries overseas.

At the same time, announcement was made that the war food order prohibiting use of wheat products in the manufacture of beer and alcohol would be continued until next summer.

Off-white bread will be continued for at least another year.

The Department of Agriculture estimates of Texas wheat

crop this summer dropped from an estimated 59,940,000 bushels on April 1 to 35,066,000 bushels on the May 1 estimates which was released this week.

This would be the shortest wheat crop produced in Texas since 1941.

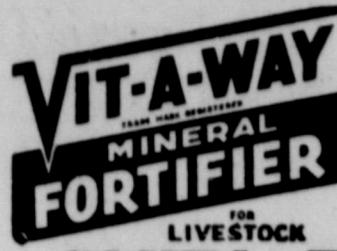
