BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:
"Section 66. Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:
