LOCAL SANTA FE CAR LOADINGS UP

R. L. Bell, Santa Fe station master in Rankin, reported this week that a sharp increase in car loadings of gas has been recorded at the local depot. Thus far in August, they have shipped some 250 cars of gas.

In May and June, loadings were down to about 2 cars per month. An increase was noted in July with the August shipping expected to go even higher.

Most of the shipments are being made by the refineries in the North eastern part of the county.

ABSENTEE VOTING ENDS TUESDAY 19

Absentee voting for the August 23rd Runoff election will end at midnight, Tuesday, August 19. All ballots postmarked or cast at the office of the county clerk at the courthouse in Rankin prior to that date will be counted in the Second Democratic Primary.

As of noon Wednesday, August 13, some 78 absentee ballots had either been cast or had been mailed out. 167 absentee ballots were cast in the first primary on July 26.

Any qualified voter who will not be in the county or who is physically unable to go to the polls on election day, August 23, may vote by absentee. Ballots can be secured at the county clerks office either by appearing in person or by making written application.

THREE RACES UP

Three races will be decided in the August 23rd Runoff. One will be a state-wide contest for a Supreme Court position while one will decide the State Representative's seat for the 102nd District composed of Midland, Upton, Crane and Pecos counties.

The third race will be the county judge contest in Upton County and is the one presently drawing the most attention.

Voting is expected to be light since only a little more than 1400 Upton ballots were cast in the first round in July with run-off elections usually only drawing about 75 per cent of the votes due to a lack of interest.

STREETS TO BE PAVED

In all, some 63,000 square yards of asphalt paving is called for on the Rankin work. This compares with approximately 60,000 square yards performed on the work last year.

Streets to be paved in the current program are:

Rankin Avenue: from 11th to 12th Street.

Grand Street: from Highway 67 north to 12th street.

Railroad Avenue: from Rankin Avenue to Buckland or from T. L. Stephenson Trucking to the railroad crossing below BJ Service Bulk Plant.

6th Street: from Upton to Severn Street.

7th Street: from Elizabeth to Severn Street.

Kilbourn Street: from Highway 67 to 13th Street.

Buckland Street: from 9th to 10th Street.

10th Street: from Buckland to Haff.

This work is equal to approximately 34 blocks of paving and will see the completion of the paving of a major part of the streets which have been designated as county roads within the City limits. Plans for paving next year are said to be indefinite at this time.

BACK COPY—

Last week we had occasion to be looking through some of our back issues of The News and ran across a bit that might fit in well in this election year even though it is about over. Here 'tis:

"There is need for a change in the office of County Attorney because it is an unwise practice to leave one man in an elective office too long. Politicians too long in office are prone to forget who is boss and to become lax in the performance of their duties. You and I have seen it happen all too often that a man who has been feeding at the public trough for a long time scarcely knows, or seldom sees us until just before election. I shall never seek more than two terms, and you may keep a copy of this announcement as my written guarantee that I will not seek more than a second term. If I prove to be any good, I'll be entitled to a promotion, otherwise I should get out. . . ."

So said Steve Preslar when he ran for county attorney in May of 1954.

We agree with Steve that there

are office holders who forget from one election year to the next who is boss and who seem to become prone to just want to stand at the trough and eat. Upton County has some mighty fine public officials who have held office for a number of years and who always have done and are still doing a good job. The public knows who they are just as well as they should know those who need replacing.

We have always admired Preslar for telling everybody just where he stood on this matter and stating flatly that he would not seek more than two terms—which he has not done. The fact that he has served what will be more than four years is due to the amendment to the State Constitution which extended the office to four-year terms and which was passed after he was elected for a second term.

FRED WINS

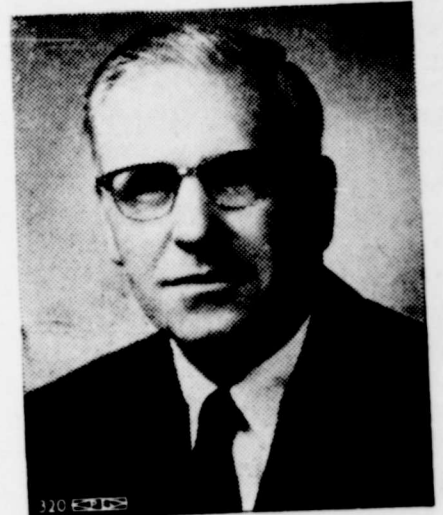

What About Permian?

So they want to talk about that Permian County—that dream county they want to carve out of Pecos and Crockett Counties—filled with oil wells and happy citizens—and leaving the other two counties without one of their major sources of revenue—revenue on which their future had been planned and pledged. Simple honesty and integrity will not permit him to do so. It's simply a situation where good judgment and experience must prevail over easily dropped promises and pledges to attract a few votes and please a small group. Andy Anderson promises and pledges only to continue to honestly, and with increasing influence in Austin, represent the good people he has served so well during the last four years.

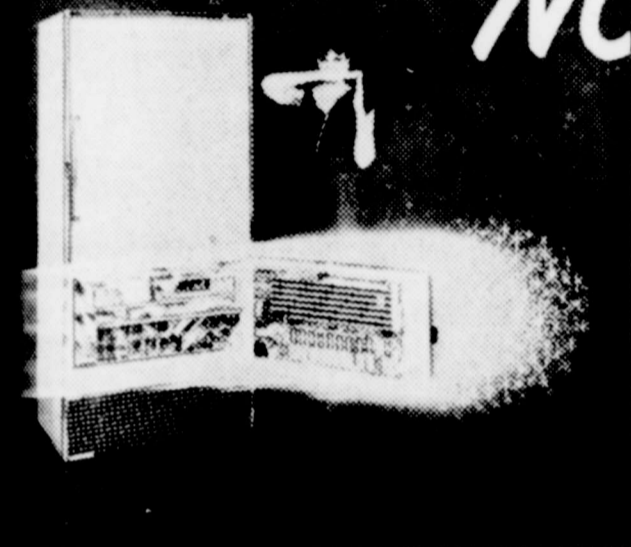

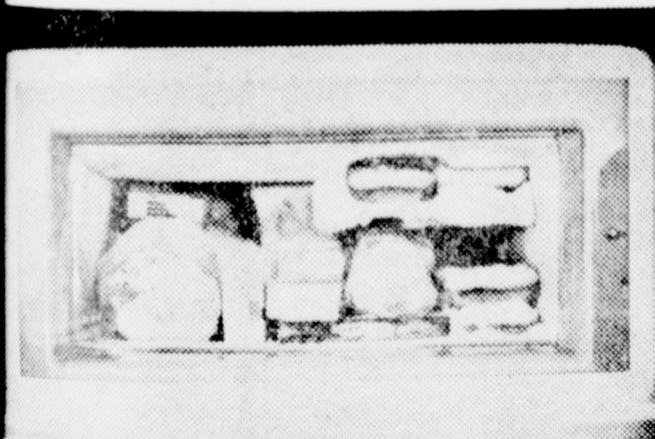

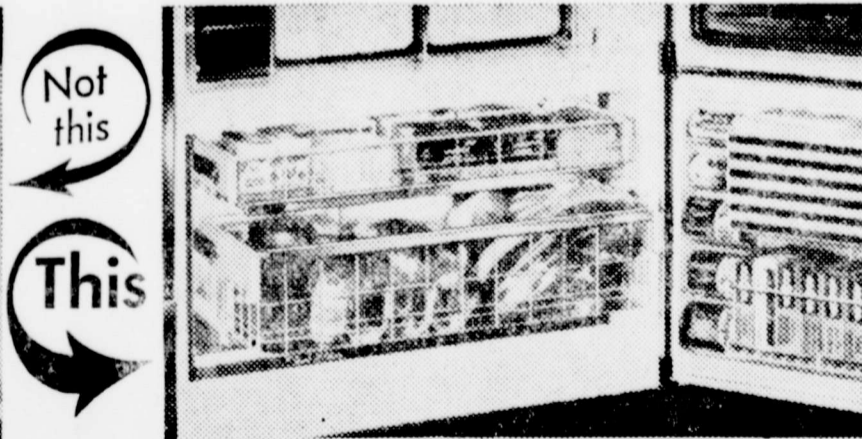
