Hamilton Bailey And Fisher Carry Heavy Upton Voting

In what was probably a record Upton County voters went to the turn-out for a run-off election, 1235 polls last Saturday to settle the county judge's race and participate in the election of Andy Anderson as State Representative in the 102nd District and Robert Hamilton as Associate Justice. In the Judge contest, Bud Fisher polled 719 votes to 555 for Norman Elrod, a victory margin of 164 votes or the exact figure by which Fisher led the ticket over Elrod in July. A total of 1415 votes were cast in the First Primary.

In the other two contests, Upton County favored Brown Bailey over Anderson by a vote of 750 to 488. In July Bailey had 550 votes to Anderson's 490. The third candidate in the race at that time, Bob Montgomery, drew 239, indicating that a majority of his votes switched to Bailey.

In the race between Hamilton and Smith, Upton County followed the state trend in going with Hamilton 1073 votes to 152 for Smith. Upton County.

COUNTY CALLS FOR BIDS ON PARK BUILDING

Upton County Commissioners Court has called for bids on an addition to be made to the Rankin Park Building. Bids are to be opened on September 19 at the commissioners courtroom.

The proposed addition will be some 30 feet wide and 48 feet long and will be added to the present building on the South side. It will enclose and slightly enlarge the present existing offset on that side of the building.

To be constructed of brick matching the present structure, estimated time for completion of the work puts it sometime near the first of the year.

"KILLERS" IN YOUR HOME

If you made a list of the "killers" around your home, you would be amazed. Insecticides and other poisonous chemicals stored within a child's reach can bring tragedy. Statistics prove this point. Two out of every 100 persons die each year from accidental poisoning. Of this number, every fourth person is between the age of 1 and 5 years.

Check your home now to make sure that all "killers" are stored well out of reach of the children. Extension home management specialists suggest some important check points:

Start with the medicine chest. Keep it locked or make certain that it is high enough to keep children out. Label all bottles and material

stored there.

Keep cosmetics, soaps, bleaches, polishes and cleaning agents out of reach of small children.

Avoid throwing partially filled containers into wastebaskets or trash barrels where children could test for taste.

Keep matches and all inflammable materials well out of reach.

\$105,344 A Year Paid To Upton Residents On Social Benefits

Old age, survivors' and disability insurance benefits were being paid in Upton County at the rate of \$105,344.00 a year as of January 1, 1958, according to Bob King, Field Representative of the Odessa Social Security District Office. "This is an increase of about 6% over 1956," King said.

"Our studies have shown that many of these aged people, widows,

and orphans have little or no other resources," he pointed out. "For a large number, social security benefits, received as an earned right, are the only cash income."

King also stressed that while the benefits primarily as a basis for individual economic security, the payment of social security benefits at the rate of \$8,787.00 a month in Upton County helps business generally, because most of the money is spent immediately on food, clothing and other necessities.

Payments to a retired worker average \$65.00 per month, King said.

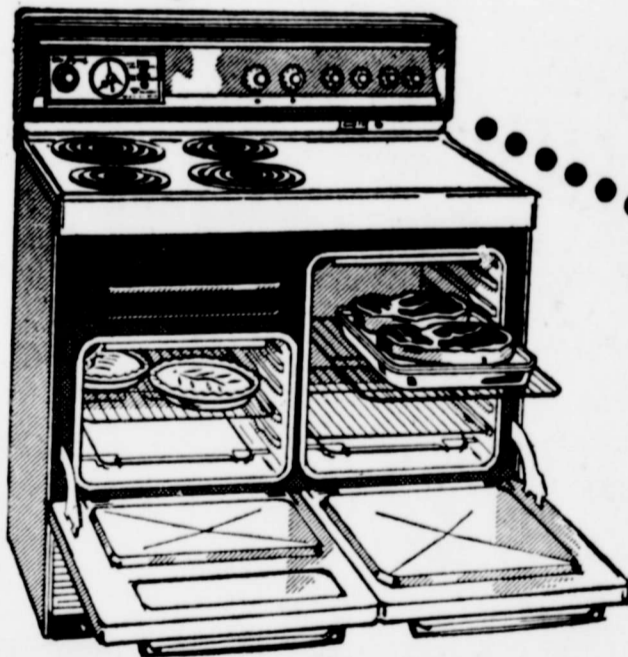
