is fast becoming a major attraction of its kind for both sportsmen and spectators alike, has been set for this week end, Nov. 8 and 9 according to Dub Day, County Agent.

Site for the shoot will be the Rankin dump grounds just off the Midland highway on the right as one leaves Rankin. There is no charge for admission to the grounds.

Shooting will begin at 8:00 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 8 and continue until dark. On Sunday, Nov. 9, the ranges will open for action at 1:00 p. m. and continue operating until dark.

Open to the public, amateurs and semi-professionals, there will be groups for men, women and teenagers as well as beginners in skeet. Ranges in operation will include the popular skeet shoot, shotgun targets, pistol and rifle matches.

Shooters are asked to furnish their own firearms with the exception of the shotgun targets at which both ammunition and shotgun will be supplied. Those who plan to attend are asked to take every precaution when handling their firearms, both on and off the target stands. Thus far, there has never been an accident or an unintentionally discharged gun at the Upton shoot.

Both spectators and shooters are asked not to bring field glasses onto the range for the purpose of reading targets. Such will not be allowed. Neither will shooters be permitted to inspect targets until the entire group has been shot.

Concessions will be on sale at the site both days and will include coffee, cakes, pies, do-nuts and sandwiches. All proceeds from the shoot go to the Upton County 4-H Club and are used in their program.

"We are expecting a fine turnout and have some mighty good turkey this year," Day has said.

"Everybody is welcome to come out and shoot and to help out the 4-H boys and girls at the same time," he said.

MRS. MCCAIN WINS IN WRITE-IN VOTE

Mrs. Murray McCain, running on a late write-in campaign, apparently defeated W. J. "Curley" Cowen, the incumbent and Democratic nominee, by 9 votes in the contest for Justice of the Peace in Precinct Two. Returns must be canvassed by the Commissioner's Court before they are termed official.

Voting was 86 for Mrs. McCain and 77 for Cowen.

In winning the write-in, Mrs. McCain upset the candidate who had defeated her for the same office in 1954. She has served two previous terms as Justice of the Peace in Precinct Two. Cowen has served one four-year term and had been chosen the Democratic nominee in a close race last July.

In voting that saw fairly heavy turnouts in Boxes 2 and 4 and light balloting in the remaining boxes, an unofficial 892 Upton voters went to the polls last Tuesday to go along with the state and national trend in electing a full slate of Democrats. Republican candidates did not run as well as they had in previous contests in the county.

In the amendment to the State Constitution voting, Upton County again followed the State trend in turning down Number 1 by a heavy majority and three others by lesser margins.

In the only closely contested race between a Democrat and a Republican, Upton County favored Andy Anderson over Tom Devine for Representative of the 102nd District. Anderson received 635 votes to 145 for Devine. Anderson was the winner overall in the four-county district by a margin of some 1000 votes. Other races were:

JP RACES CLOSE

Two contests for Justices of the Peace proved to be the most important in drawing voters to the polls as Precinct Two balloters favored Mrs. Murray McCain on a write-in vote by 86 to 77 over W. J. Cowen. In Precinct Three in McCamey, an unusual situation developed when Joe Hendrickson, running as an independent following his unsuccessful bid on a write in in July, tied at 150 to 150 with the Democratic nominee, F. E. Carter. Hendrickson received 150 votes in Box 4 while Carter had 149. However, Carter had received 1 vote in the Absentee Balloting while his opponent had a 0 in this voting, giving each a total of 150.

THE REPORT—

As quite a number of readers evidently noticed, the Rankin Independent School ran its annual financial report in last week's issue of the News. For those who didn't read it, you can't go around now saying you wonder where the money goes. It was all right there in black and white for your inspection.

One wonders when, if ever again, a similar report will be made to the people by Upton County—the last one having been published about two years ago. And such publications are not made just to satisfy the editor. They are required by law but laws are not always complied with.

There are about three things in the school statement that are of particular interest. One is the fact that \$213,778.54 was spent on instruction, \$43,210.82 on administration and goodly amounts on other phases of operation such as operation of plant—all of which makes Rankin Independent School District one of the biggest employers and largest payrolls in Rankin. A better and bigger enrollment means a better city.

Another item that is often "suspected and discussed" is the amount of money spent on the athletic program in Rankin schools. According to this statement, \$4,812.16 was used to finance athletics for the year ending August 31, 1958. At the same time, \$4,907.41 was received from this program in the form of admissions, etc., showing that the school actually made \$95.25.

Now that's going to throw a crimp in some folks arguments against the athletic program.

Still another item is the \$5,021.55 received by Rankin Schools for Federal Lunch Aid. This particular program has been getting a good deal of publicity lately with the Hale-Aiken Committee in Austin first going on record to do away with it and later reversing itself in favor of the program. Without a doubt, public sentiment in favor of the aid was the factor which forced the committee to change its think-

ing on this matter.

We checked with the superintendent's office this week to find out what sort of regulations went with this \$5,000 worth of Federal aid to Rankin schools and find that there is hardly any other than the requirement that the school certifies

that it is due so much money for its participation in the program and that this money is due in the form of a rebate on school lunches. This seems reasonable enough and we fail to see where there is any harm in accepting this amount. Of course there is no telling how much mon-

ey it costs the Federal government to administer the program and therein most likely is where the taxpayer is taking a beating.

Local taxes paid \$309,928.39 of the entire \$373,197.99 spent on the operating part of the school budget and that makes Rankin Schools a

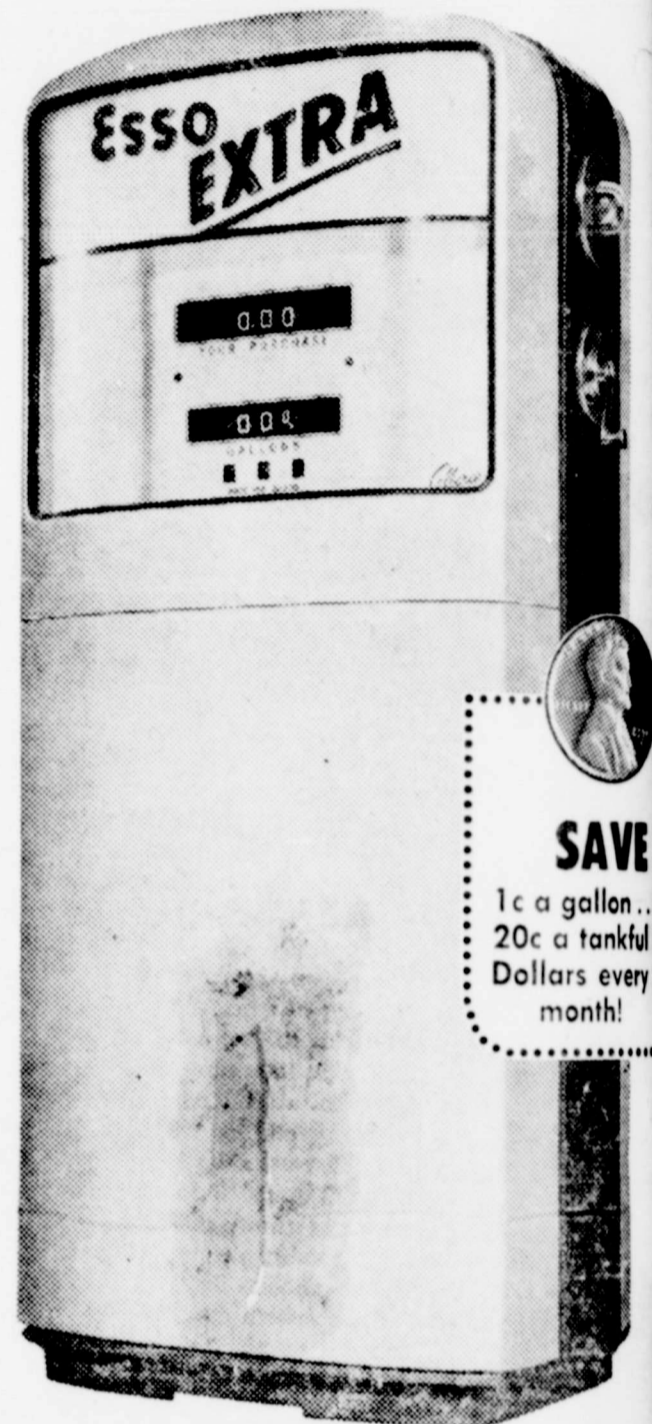

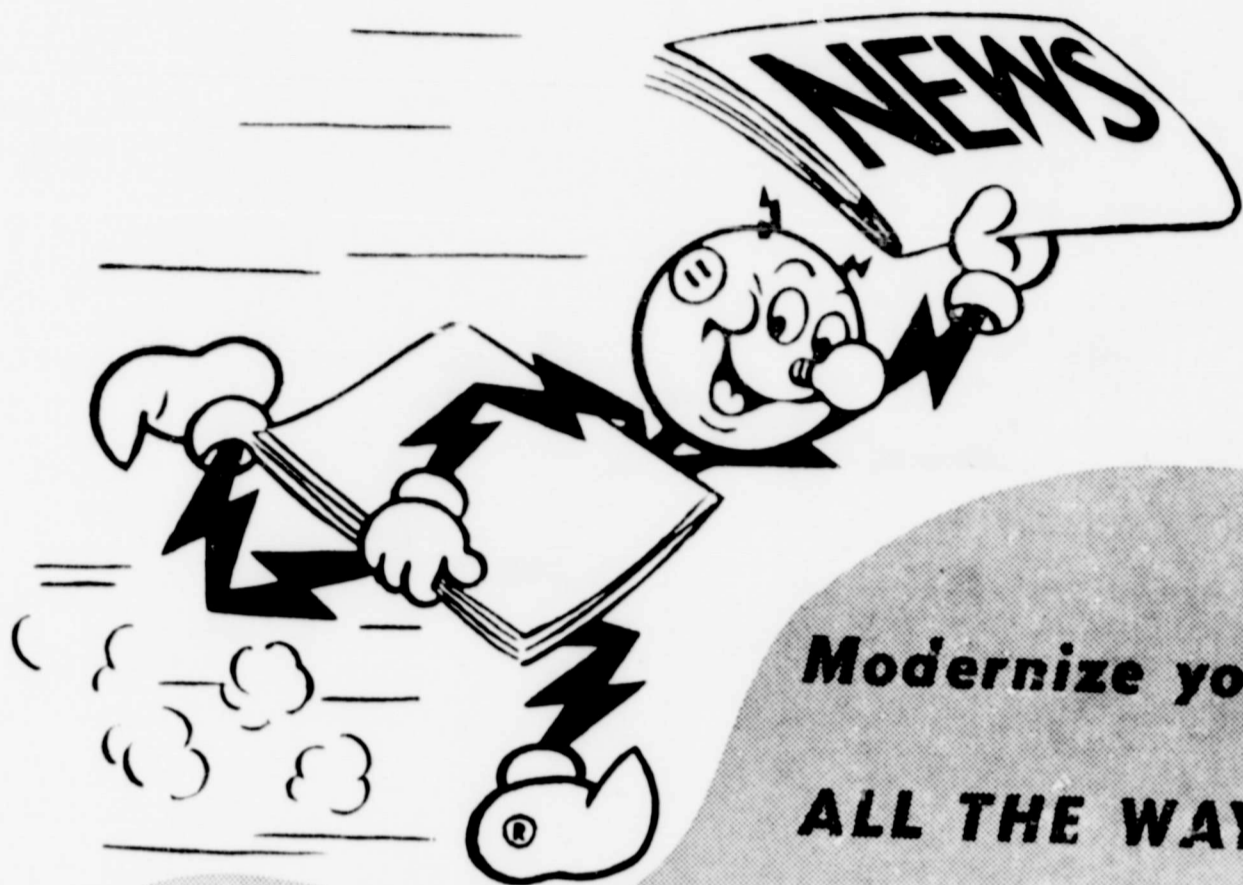

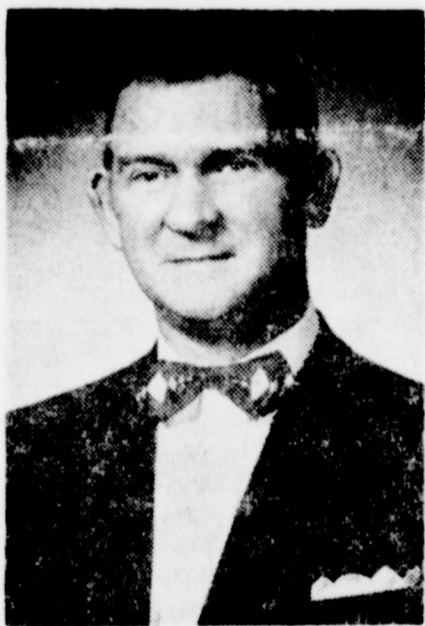
