She said today, "The biggest single factor in getting all the mail delivered before Christmas is the full cooperation of the public in early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts."
With Christmas only a month away, the Postmaster says it's not s bit too soon to start following these three simple rules to insure delivery of your gifts before the delivery of your gifts before the
December 25 date: 1. Wrap them December 25 date: 1. Wrap them
securely, 2. Address them correctly; and 3. MAIL THEM EARLY
The postmaster said you should not take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with a that every package is tied with a strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packares should be stuffed with tissue or old news papers to cushion the contents. "Careful addressing of your Chris tmas cards is equally important, the Postmaster said. Bring your Christmas card mailing list up-to date and be certain that you have the complete name, address, zone number, city and state for everyone on your list.
Always send your Christmas cards by First Class mail. They will be processed and delivered quicker and they'll be forwarded or returned, if they'll be forwarded
