The postmaster said you should not take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with a strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents.

"Careful addressing of your Christmas cards is equally important," the Postmaster said. Bring your Christmas card mailing list up-todate and be certain that you have the complete name, address, zone number, city and state for every-



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The Freedom Fighter Who Wore No Man's Brand

The name "Maverick" symbolizes the color and adventure of the old Southwest. For a century and a quarter there have been Mavericks in Texas, and no one of them has ever lacked the courage of his convictions..that freedom is well worth fighting for. In 1835 Samuel Augustus Maverick, a lawyer of distinction in South Carolina, came to Texas because he could not submit to the nullification doctrine of John C. Calhoun. There he signed the new republic's Declaration of Independence. In 1842, still active in public life, Maverick was captured and imprisoned by a Mexican force.

But even in prison the forceful per-sonality of this first Texas Maverick

made itself felt. Freed a year later, he returned to serve Texas as a law-maker until 1862. He died in 1870, leaving a name that will always be associated with fearless courage and unbranded freedom.
