COUNTY TO ISSUE \$45,000 IN WARRANTS

Minutes of the Commissioner's Court state that a motion has been made and passed by that body to issue \$45,000 in Warrants. The vote on the motion was unanimous.

This money will be spent, as set forth in the minutes of the court, for completion of the remodeling work on the courthouse and the purchasing of furniture and fixtures for the building.

Since the work was started some six months ago, it has been decided by the court to make some changes in the original specifications for the remodeling work. Funds for this additional work were not available in the original sum agreed upon in the contested bond election which would have seen \$410,000 put into the work but was cut to \$225,000 by the settlement on the contest.

Work on remodeling the old part of the courthouse is now underway and is expected to be completed by Spring.

Work is also well along on the addition to the Rankin Park Building. A large room is being added to the south side and is expected to be ready for use within the next 60 days or so.

A TWO MILLION DOLLAR QUESTION

In a letter to county judge Bud Fisher, a copy of which was mailed to us, Congressman J. T. Rutherford stated that the Federal government is fixing to spend around \$10 million bucks on experimenting with converting saline or brackish water into fresh, useable water and that all of the loot has been designated for certain locations with the exception of one pile of \$2 million which has been assigned to "the Southwest Area of the United States."

Representative Rutherford further stated that it had occurred to him that Upton County might like to submit an application to the proper Governmental department to be

considered as a possible site for the plant which is to be constructed in "the Southwest."

We're sure a lot of folks will appreciate the fact that Cong. Rutherford has kept us in mind on this matter and that we will be given a fair and equal chance to try for the \$2 million jackpot if there are enough interested parties in the county to get behind the thing and work at it. On the other hand, we would imagine that if any such plant is built in this area, it will be on the Pecos river which could be termed "saline or brackish" and Rankin just doesn't happen to be too close to the Pecos River.

We suggest that all the fresh, hot blood of Rankin rally to the cause and try to get Congress to appropriate enough money to re-route the Pecos River through the city limits and then we could go after that \$2 million in earnest.

Sounds foolish? It is but we'd bet that a good many millions of our money has been poured into a heck of a lot of things more foolish than this in some foreign territory that we don't even know anything about.

We just must have a saline and brackish river or we're going to miss out on a \$2 million dollar gift from uncle.

NO UNION FOR WESTERN

We note that the employees of the Western Company recently had themselves a vote on whether or not they wanted to go union and turned thumbs down on the idea by a big margin.

Whether or not that was the best thing to do under the circumstances is a question which only time will likely be able to answer but we do wonder if perhaps their rejecting the union is not an indication that a lot of people—working people and employers alike—are not getting just a bit fed up with the high handed methods of operations and graft that seems to typify present day unionism. There can be no denying that unions have done a lot of good for working people and—where they have tried—done a lot of good for business.

But unless the big unions clean

up their front offices—and do a thorough job of it—we believe that public sympathy will turn against them and demand of Congress and our law-making bodies that the unions be put under strenuous controls.

In fact, that time is here now and people are going to have to start putting pressure on their governmental representatives to force them into action against unions. Those here in Rankin who remember the steel strike of the early 50's that wrecked an oil boom in Rankin can ill afford to continue to turn their heads on union methods that can deprive a community of its prosperity when a strike is called against an important part of our national economy—even if it is located 200 miles away.

About the only thing that the big steel strike got anybody was higher prices and cheaper money and Rankin has not yet recovered to the point it had reached prior to that time.

WESTERN WORKERS REJECT UNION

According to a news release this week from the head offices of the Western Company in Midland, the employees of that firm recently voted 224 to 45 against efforts of the International Union of Operating Engineers (AFL-CIO) to unionize the company. The union has suffered several other defeats this year in the drilling and servicing industries of the southwest.

"Naturally we are pleased with the results," said H. E. Chiles, president of the concern. "We feel that this election shows our employees are individuals and prefer to be considered as such. Like many companies in the drilling and servicing business, we have always tried to work with our people on a personal basis, and we believe the results of this and other recent union elections demonstrate clearly that oil field people like it that way."

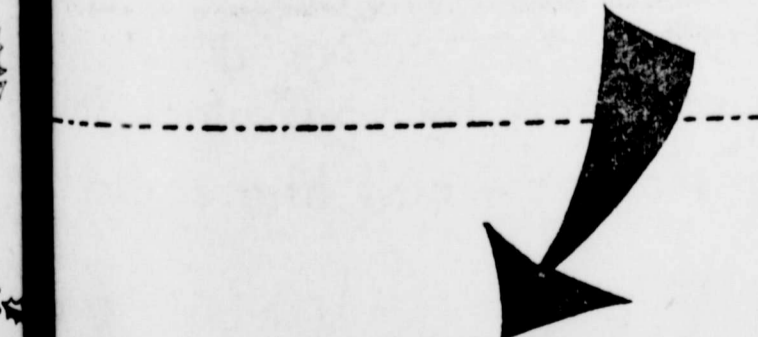

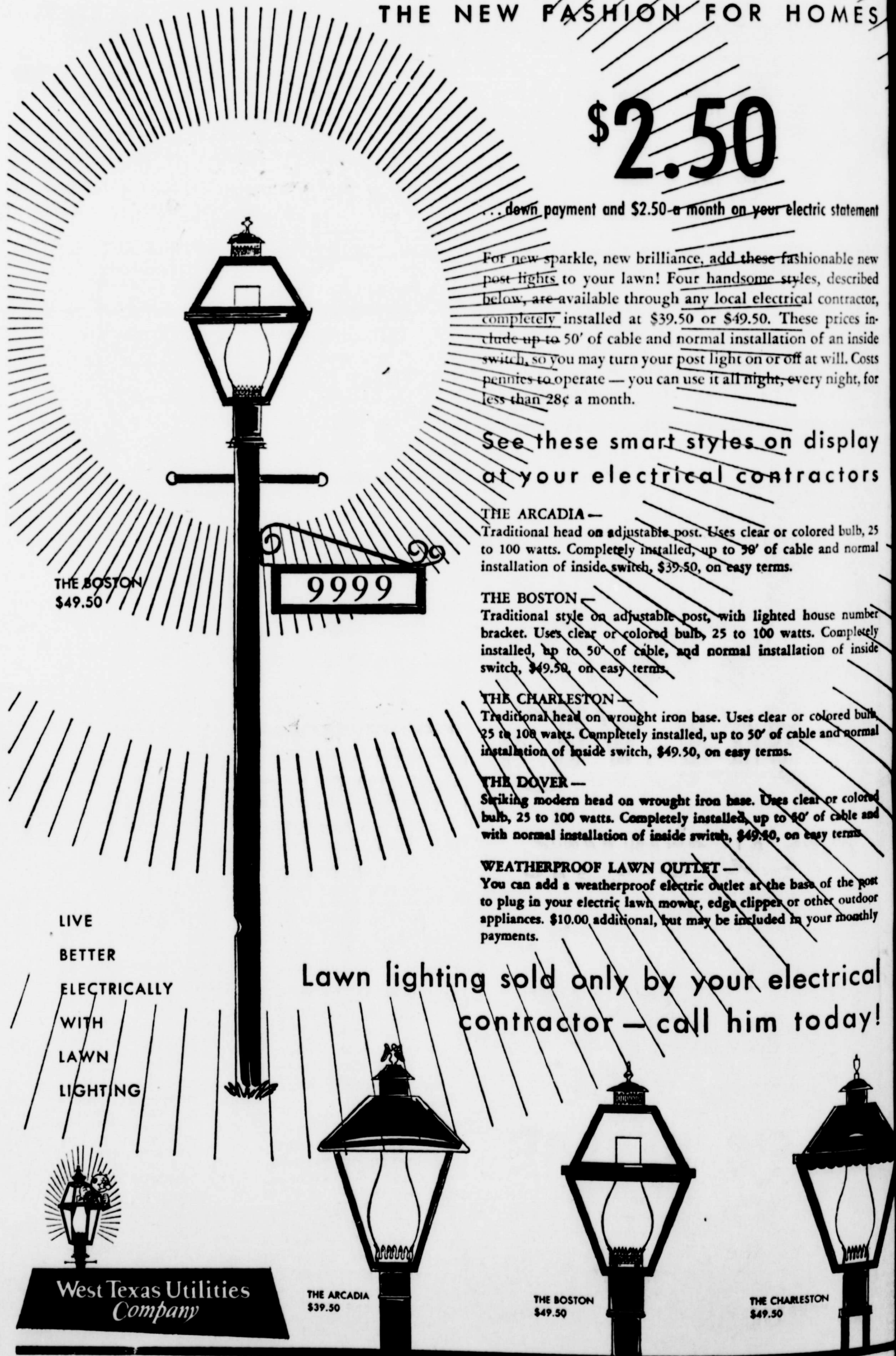

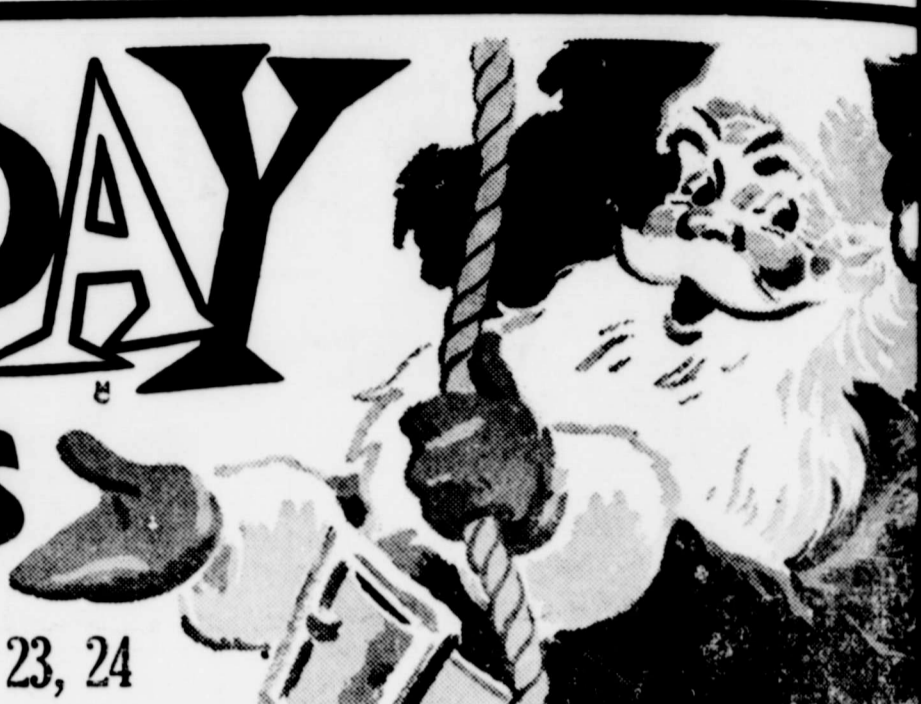
