

TAX FACTS

Claiming Dependency Exemptions

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

HEN you total up the exemptions on your 1958 tax return, remember that you are permitted to claim at least one exemption for every qualified dependent — and this includes

yourself. Count your exemptions carefully because each one takes \$600 off your taxable income. Take one for yourself and two if you are 65 or over. This rule applies to both husband and wife on a joint return, and an added exemption may be taken if either

is blind. In addition, you are entitled to one exemption for each person who fits the definition of a dependent, but the extra exemptions for age and blindness cannot be taken for a dependent.

To qualify for an exemption dependent must:

(1) Have received more than one-half of his support from you unless you file a Multiple Support Agreement (see below).

(2) Have less than \$600 gross income unless he is your child and under 19 years of age - or a student of any age.

his spouse.

(4) Have been either a member of your household or closely related to you, as defined in the

official instructions.

(5) Be either a citizen of the United States or a resident of the U. S., Canada, Mexico, Canal Zone, Panama, or (in some cases the Philippines).

Who Quelifies
Your exemptions usually depend on whether you and your dependents qualify under these rules at the end of the year. However, if your husband or wife died during the year you can file a joint return and take the same exemptions that both of you would have otherwise had.

If you shared with others in the support of a dependent, but none of you provided more than half, you may still be able to arrange for one member of the group to have the \$600 exemp-tion. You might agree, for ex-

ample, to take turns claiming the exemption each year.

The one who claims the exemption must have contributed more than 10 per cent of the support, and he must have been a member of the group who collectively provided the necessary "more than one-half support." Each member of the group must have been entitled to claim the dependent except for the support requirement.

Multiple Support Agreements In order for one person to have he exemption all other members of the group who contributed over 10 per cent must sign declarations that they will not claim the dependent. The Internal Revenue Service provides Form 2120 (Multiple Support Agreement) for this purpose.

> If you qualify as a "surviving spouse" you should not file a tax return as a "head of household." The tax of a surviving spouse is computed on the same basis at a joint return and gives the full benefit of income-splitting. A "surviving spouse" is one:

> 1. Whose husband or wife died in the preceding two years (1966 and 1957).

2. Who maintains a home a legally qualified dependent (the dependent in this case must be a son, step-son, daughter or stepdaughter).

Deductions That Cut Your Tax Bill

HE big question facing the small taxpayer at this time is whether to itemize deductions or take the standard

Before you give up and file a "short" form, take the time to add up the family expenses that could be deducted. If the deductions that could be itemized total more than 10 per cent of your adjusted gross income, it will pay you to file a "long" Form 1040.

Here is a list of the more im-

Here is a list of the more important items to watch for while you compile the list of family deductions:

Interest on Loans - The interest you paid on loans is deduc-tible. This includes any mortgage, automobile, appliance, home improvement or personal loans you may have had. Interest on installment purchases is also deductible. Evidence, such as a statement from the seller, should be obtained to show the amount of interest that you paid during

State and Local Taxes - Most taxes, other than federal taxes, are deductible. These include, state and local real estate, personal property, income, retail sales, gasoline and poll taxes. You can deduct auto license fees, but not auto inspection fees. If you don't have an exact record of some of these taxes, you can make a reasonable estimate.

Charitable Contributions -Gifts to charitable, religious, educational, scientific or literary organizations are deductible. books or furniture you may have | heading.

contributed to a local charity or church. The fair market value of these gifts is deductible.

Medical and Dontal Expenses

-Unless you or your wife has
reached the age of 65, your medical expenses are deductible only to the extent that they exceed 3 per cent of your adjusted gross income. Include in your medical deduction the cost of doctor, nursing, dentist's X-rays, and hospital services. You may also deduct premiums for health, accident and medical insurance.

Canalty Losses - You are enhome losses from fire, theft or storm. Damage to an automobile is deductible if the accident was due to faulty driving but not negligence on your part.

Child Care Expenses — Wid-owed, divorced or legally sepa-rated taxpayers, and in some cases ony taxpayer, who must pay for the care of a dependent while they work can deduct up to \$600 of this expense. Check carefully the requirements in the official instruction book before claiming a "baby-sitter" deduc-




