As a result of the study, Rex burg's Board of Education adopted resolution on August 11, 1958 to he effect that (1) Junior and Senior students who drive cars to chool must make written applicaon to the School Board showing he reason or need to drive their cars to school. Those granted permission will receive student permits. (2) Students driving cars to school on the student permits must park them in designated areas (3) Students failing to comply with established rules and regulations will have their student permits revoked. If students persist in nonompliance, they will be subject to expulsion from school by action of the School Board.
Madison's principal. W. G. Nelson, strongly supports the action against unrestricted car use by highschool students. "We believe that estriction on automobile use will make for better attendance and loser attention to studies.
