Women's Golf-Bridge Tournament Saturday

Over 100 entries are expected in the annual Ladies Bridge and Golf Tournament here Saturday, April 18 as the women of the Rankin Golf Club stage their 18-hole handicap golf play beginning at 8:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

Indications are that there will be entries from Ozona, Odessa, Midland, Big Lake, McCamey, Fort Stockton, Crane and Rankin. Tee off time will be at 8:30 a.m. for the golfers which will be preceded by registration at 8:00. Bridge and forty-two players will register at 11:30 a.m.

Lunch will be served at noon with the afternoon activities set for 1:00 p.m. for both parts of the contests.

Entry fee will be \$1.50 for bridge and forty-two and \$2.50 for the 18-hole golf matches. These prices include the lunch.

In the golf play, Irma Jacot of Texon, playing out of the Big Lake club, will be the defending champion. In the golf play, a handicap is determined for the players and the low score is not necessarily the winner in the various events.

Prizes are now on display at the Rankin Golf Club House with awards for the longest drive, the best score of the day and the least number of putts as well as flight winners and runners-up will be given.

This is their fifth sweepstake in six year of the Regional Contests and has won them another trip to the Tri-State Band Festival in Enid, April 29- May 2. School officials do not allow the band to make the Enid trip unless they are sweepstake winners in Regional. In past performances in the Oklahoma band festival, the Red Devil Band has won top honors.

A wide variety of numbers have been arranged and a musical treat would seem to be in store for those who attend. Among the numbers will be a several solos. These will include Lonnie Farrell in a trum-bone solo, Andra Mitchell, clarinet solo, and The Dixie Land Quartet composed of Farrell, Mitchell and Elbert Basham and Martha Kennedy. All will be accompanied by the full band.

Open to the public at no charge, the concert will be held in the high school auditorium.

"We believe that we will have something for everyone," Fred Prentice, director has said.

"Everyone is welcome to come out and hear the youngsters as they put their best foot forward for the home folk," he stated.

Fred Prentice, director of the Rankin Red Devil Band, has been selected as one of 30 band directors in the US who will make a 22-day goodwill educational inspection tour throughout Europe and the Soviet Union.

This tour was arranged in conjunction with the U. S. State Department and is worked on an exchange basis. Departing from New York on June 4, the group will fly to England, Sweden, Finland, Russia, Czechoslovakia and France.

They will be five days in Moscow and will visit other Soviet cities.

In a telegram notifying him of his selection, Erling B. Hanson, delegate host, stated: "As one of Americas' outstanding band directors, you have been selected as a member of a special delegation of music directors and instructors."

In actions taken at their regular meeting last Monday, the Commissioner's Court let two contracts on bids for further repairs to the Upton County Courthouse. A Bid of \$1,690.00 was awarded to the Wallace Lumber Company for installing a jury box and judge's bench in the county courtroom.

The Rankin News received the contract on the furnishing and installing of new counters, fixtures and some movable furniture at a bid of \$16,940.00.

With the completion of this work, alterations and repairs to the court house will be completed with the exception of landscaping, much of which will be done by county crews in their spare time.

At the same meeting, the court set the salary for Chief Deputy Sheriff, S. O. Langford at \$425.00 per month and discontinued his car allowance.

Crackdown Aimed At Parties Responsible For LL Damage

Following a series of recent acts of vandalism at the Little League Baseball Park, officials of the league last week decided to turn the matter over to the Sheriff's Department with a recommendation that those responsible be prosecuted for their deeds. Several locks were broken, a number of windows smashed and cars driven over the playing area of the ball diamond.

"In the past, we have only warned those who have been caught on the ball park at unauthorized times, but now we mean to put a stop to this unnecessary destruction of county property," one of the league officers said this week.

"This baseball park cost a lot

of money and it belongs to everyone. A few have been responsible for a considerable amount of damage and we feel that in order to give the public protection on this investment, we should bring full charges against anyone who is responsible for destruction of the property," he said.

Most severe damage was inflicted on the playing field by the automobile tires which made heavy and deep impressions on the ground. A great deal of time and work will be required to repair this damage. It is understood that an investigation has brought several teenagers under suspicion.

TWAS LONG AGO—

Think you are an old timer in these parts? Figure you know all the places to go and be seen? Maybe. But it's doubtful if many

ever heard of Greenwood City, or Montrose—or East Upland, Benedum, Hurdle or Crossett.

These are all towns—or were at least intended to be—in Upton County.

East Upland was of course just east of Upland, former countyseat. Hurdle is listed on many old maps and was about half way between Rankin and McCamey, while Benedum is a newcomer that was plotted in the area of the Texas Natural Plant.

Crossett came the closest to ever making a success. It was located just West of the present city limits of McCamey and at one time was a going place with plenty of Saturday night life said to have been available.

Most interesting of the group are the two cities of Greenwood and Montrose. Files in the Clerk's office show plats on these old towns sites and record deeds of property transactions. Some property owners are still on the county tax rolls and pay from 10 cents to 25 cents per

lot for holdings.

Greenwade City was dedicated by a D. C. Nelson of Jones County in 1910 and consisted of a City Plaza surrounded by blocks of property laid out in a 13-block square site. All streets were named after states in the Union and deeds record that lots were sold for \$3.50 each. It was located on the Santa Fe just West and slightly South of McCamey.

Montrose was the real mystery. It is not to be confused with the Montrose Addition to the City of Rankin.

An old plot shows Montrose to have been laid out to contain 72 blocks alongside three main streets running North and South. The only thing that is not recorded about Montrose is its exact location although 13 property owners still pay taxes to the County on property they own. J. L. Manry at the abstract office says he has spent a good deal of time and money trying to locate this town but has not been successful.

So, if you don't like the way things are run in Rankin, McCamey or Midkiff, you can always move to Greenwood City or Montrose—they're nice and peaceful and you can be your own boss.

PAVING TIME—

Plans have been announced by the County for this year's paving program which will see most of the work completed in Rankin. If you have property that is to be paved and needs curbing before the work can be done, it would likely be a good idea to get busy for this may be about all of it.

And for those who say that the City of Rankin is not paying for any of this paving, we call attention to the fact that they have in the past and will again this year, pay one-third of the cost of the program.

That adds up to quite a few blocks of paving over the past 3 years.

EXTRA STUDY DISCONTINUED

An announcement released this week by Rankin High School officials states that: "The seeming unconcern by parents of failing students and by the failing students themselves has resulted in a discontinuance of the extra study sessions which have been in effect most of this school year at Rankin High School."

This program was originally aimed at additional tutoring for those who were failing the regular courses.

Last Wednesday at the session which was especially important because six weeks tests were given on Thursday and Friday of last week, eight failing students from a total of forty-seven reported for the additional study. This represented seventeen per cent of the failing group. This group was about thirty-two per cent of the student body.

Principal Bill J. Hood expressing regret that the response was so slight as to make further sessions unwarranted, said, "I can understand the failing child's attitude—if the attitude had been different in 95 per cent of the cases, the failure wouldn't have happened in the first place; however, I am unable to understand the parent's viewpoint. At the end of every school year, I have seen so many distraught parents of children who failed school subjects that I sincerely believed these parents would welcome any idea which might prevent the failing."

Teachers are still available at any time to those students who truly desire help and who ask for it.

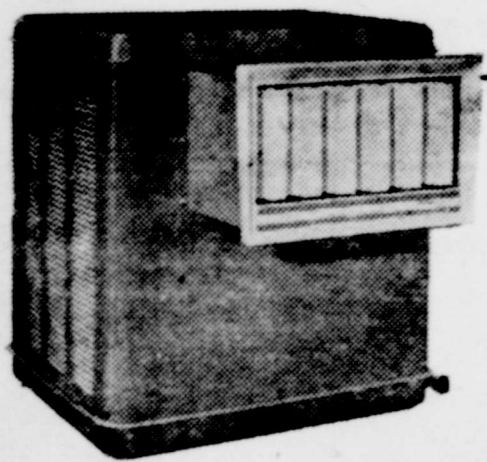

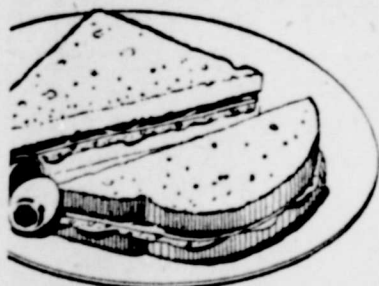

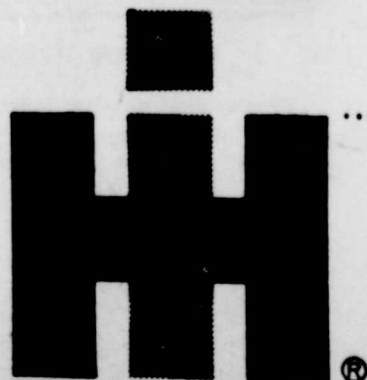

Present efforts of the Committee are directed toward raising enough funds to erect a marker at the site

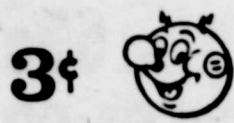
