Increased Postal Rates Put Receipts Up From Last Year

Postal receipts at the Rankin Post Office climbed \$212.04 for the first four months of 1959 over a similar period for 1958 according to Grace Roach, postmaster.

The new figure was reached, not because of an increased volume of business, but rather was due to postal rate increases put into effect recently, she explained. Total receipts for the first four months of 1959 is \$4,474.06. This compares to

\$4,262.02 for the same period of 1958.

Receipts by months were: January, \$1,150.20; February, \$776.22; March, \$1,448.84; and April, \$1,098.80. Amounts received each of the four months varied also over the 1958 figures which saw \$732.19 collected in January; \$1,256.40 in February; \$1,246.96 in March; and \$1,026.47 in April.

Reflecting a truer picture as compared with a year ago, receipts from Box Rent was down for the first quarter of '59 by \$60.97. This represented a loss of revenue from some 75 boxes over the '58 figure.

Total box rent receipts for the quarter in 1959 is \$366.47 as compared with \$427.44 in 1958. Box rent rates were not raised at the time postage rates were hiked.

Rankin won the highest awards made to any Class B band and was above many of the larger class groups. A Total of 78 bands were entered in the festival and only 19 were awarded first places in concert. No first places were awarded Class B bands in sight reading and only 3 received the coveted first place rating.

The Enid Festival does not award Sweepstakes.

In twirling, Alta McAden and Darlene Workman were given second division ratings and Pam Simpson won a third in the Junior Class. In the marching contest, only two bands rated higher than the Red Devil group.

With the Enid contest, the local high school students completed their competition for the current school year.

NEVER MORE—

It has now come to light that there is a whole bunch of people in Texas who can neither read or write. And, of course, there is an organization that is dedicated to putting an end to this situation. Now that seems a shame for if one could not read—and did not wish to listen to a radio or look at a T V, he could go to bed at night and get some sleep without having to worry about the Russians, the stock market, inflation, strikes, intergration, proper living and all the many bugs that beset the educated among us. There was a time when it was said that ignorance was bliss but that is evidently coming to an end.

Among the more foolish things that those who try to stay informed must put up with these days are the weather reports of tornados and severe storms that are predicted in almost every newspaper and are repeated hourly over radio and TV. Such things ought to be outlawed. For what little good they do, these reports cause fifty times as much damage in worry and fretting about storms that seldom happen and almost nothing that the worrier can do about them. Automobiles are far more dangerous to human life and limb than weather will ever be.

THE CHICKEN OR THE EGG—

Along with the spring weather each year comes the news that union and management are at odds again over wages and prices. As a rule, wages go up and prices are raised. Within the last few years, it has become increasingly apparent that these two groups are going to have to decide on which is the more important; labor or management who provides the jobs. Frankly it would seem to me that one cannot get along without the other.

In any case, it has come to the time for looking at the hole card. Russia and China and their other slave-labor nations are beginning to make a sizeable gain in world markets with their cheaply produced merchandise. It is reported that Russian steel is fast pushing out the American product in such places as South America. Anyone can see

the number of foreign-made cars now on the road—made in such non-communist places as England and France and still selling at a lower price than the American car of similar size.

Such big firms as Ford is having cars made in France and are likely making a nice profit since the labor is cheaper; but they are being sold mostly to Americans who are going to run out of purchasing power one of these days if the trend continues.

Which did come first? The chicken or the egg.

PAY DAY SOME DAY

Last week a group from McCamey came over to the Commissioners' court and asked for something like \$40,000 to build another swimming pool and park. Since the county does not have about \$40,000 laying around that they don't need, such money will have to be borrowed in

the form of bonds if this request is met.

I do not raise the question of whether or not there is a need for another swimming pool and park in McCamey for such things as park buildings, baseball fields, dance halls for teenagers, golf courses, rodeo grounds, hospitals, etc. always have their champions who can at least give excuses for needing such items—the prime one being: "You did so-and-so for such-and-such so why not let us have this or that."

The question that I do put forth and one which was discussed at the meeting of the court is: "Who is going to have to pay for this?"

There was a time a few years ago when valuation in Upton County was climbing and all such projects were financed by the oil companies for all practical purposes since the bonds could be floated without raising the tax rate and by

letting the increasing valuation carry the load. Now there is no longer an increasing valuation in Upton County but rather the valuation is falling. With a large amount of bonds already out and a huge amount of money being spent by the county in operating such things as the park system, more money for more bonds could come from just one place and that would be the present tax payers, a group that is getting smaller each year in valuation. To get the additional money, a tax rate or valuation raise would be the only answer.

If this matter is brought to a vote and the majority want to go ahead with this sort of thing—fine and dandy but they should realize what we are facing. In their discussions last week, the commissioners suggested that they did not think 95 per cent of the people realized the financial situation of the County and the amount of money it takes
