Receipts by months were: January, \$1,150.20; February, \$776.22; March, \$1,448.84; and April, \$1,-098.80.. Amounts received each of the four months varied also over the 1958 figures which saw \$732.19 collected in January; \$1,256.40 in February; \$1.246.96 in March; and \$1,026.47 in April

Reflecting a truer picture as compared with a year ago, receipts from Box Rent was down for the first quarter of '59 by \$60.97. This represented a loss of revenue from some 75 boxes over the '58 figure.




