By curtailing the growth of the mesquite, additional moisture is made available for the grass and quite often more grass is grown. Also, mesquite is so thick in some of our draws that working livestock is next to

Management of sprayed areas is important so that livestock will not overgraze the vegetation in them. The grass will be sweeter in the sprayed areas due to the additional sunlight it will receive and livestock will readidly overgraze these areas. It would be wise to spray an area completely through a pasture rather than just a portion of it from this point alone. Spraying of mesquite is just another method of trying to grow more grass-the ranchers' crop.


