CONFUSING SOMEWHAT-

Last week The Rankin News had an article stating that local ranchers were thinking about doing a bit of spraying on mesquite trees on their ranchland and that the Federal Government has a plan whereby they will pay half of the

Object of this program being to help the ranchers produce more in the way of wool and meat from less land

Now if I was in the ranching business and decided to spray my mesquite trees, I would take advantage of this offer by the boys in Washington to pay half of the expense. More than likely-just about anyone else would, too.

This seems like a sensible program and one that would be of benefit for the rancher and everyone else concerned since the more that is produced, the more there is available for sale and this-in an ordinary situation-would eventually result in cheaper prices due to the old law of supply and demand

But there is a strange aspect to the whole thing. While trying to help the rancher produce, the same Federal Government has another program that pays farmers not to produce. This same program also pays out a lot of tax payers money each year to buy up surplusesto keep the price high.

Seem confusing? Don't go away, there's still more.

Should one of the ranchers have a farm on which he raised-say, wheat-to feed his livestock and make them produce more- the government would tell him that he could plant only so much-not all, perhaps, that he would need-just an allotted amount.

And if he planted more than his allotment to feed his livestock to help produce more, he would be subject to a heavy fine. Yet, we have the mesquite-spraying allotment for the same reason.

The town was founded by J. W Taylor before McCamey was laid out by George McCamey, in 1924. Some of the business houses and their owners were: Crossett Mercantile, owned and operated by a Mr. Mathews. This was a general store and did a thriving business selling \$1800-a-day for some years. Mr. Mathews also owned a filling station and garage across the street from the store.

faith, wisdom and unremitting service on for scholarly, gentle John Kilian place second to none in the hearts of his people. They were the Wends, those Baltic Germans of Slavic decent, who abandoned their homeland or a new world wilderness in the lause of religious self-determination. In 1854, 558 Lutheran Wends, refusng to obey the Prussian decree of organic union with the Reformed thurch, asked John Kilian to become pastor and leader in their migration o Texas. On December 16th of that year they landed at Galveston and their settlement Serbin. At Serbin. kilian was more than pastor. he was squire, legal advisor, doctor, consultant and teacher. He established preaching stations at New Ulm and Roeder's Mill in Austin County, at Louis Settlement in Fayette County and in Bastrop. Through his efforts fraternal relations with the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio, and of other states, were established . . and today some 20 other congrega-tions look upon St. Paul's Lutheran Church at Serbin as the mother church.


