## Teachers Get \$300 Base Salary Boost --

# \$466,610.00 School Budget Approved For '59-'60 Term

## Mrs. J. R. Eckols Buried In McCamey

Funeral services were held Monday, June 15 at 3:00 p.m. in the Moore Funeral Chapel in McCamey for Mrs. J. R. Eckols, 78, mother of H. E. "Gene" Eckols of Rankin. Mrs. Eckols, who had been in poor health for a number of years, died Sunday, June 14 in the home of a daughter, Mrs. H. S. Lindsey, in Breckenridge. Burial was in the McCamey Cemetery.

Mrs. Eckols was born Dec. 8, 1881 in Gonzales County, later moving to McCamey where she lived most of her life.

Other survivors include R. C. Eckols of Jal, L. S. Eckols of Vidor, J. D. Eckols of Tremont and Rev. L. K. Eckols of Des Moines, Iowa, all sons; and another daughter, Mrs. Dee Seeley of Ackery; a brother; two sisters; nine grandchildren and one great grandchild.

A budget calling for total expenditures of \$466,610.00 by Rankin Independent School District in the 1959-60 school term has been adopted by the board. This is somewhat less than last year's \$467,097.50. From the 1958-59 budget, a surplus of \$20,000.00 was realized in operations for the year. This amount was applied to the 1959-60 budget.

Despite the lower expected operation of the school in the coming year, a \$300 base pay boost in salaries was voted by the board for all

teachers and administrators. This will make a teacher payroll of some \$232,315 for the year and an additional \$31,730 for administrative. Other salary costs will be paid for custodians, cafeteria workers, etc., making Rankin Schools one of the largest employers in Rankin.

At the present time, it is anticipated that a total of 39 teachers and principals will be needed to operate the three Rankin schools. These will include three principals, 23 elementary instructors and 13 secondary instructors.

Other instructional salaries will be paid to such employees as librarian, secretaries and clerical workers, a part-time special remedial instructor and substitute teachers. A school nurse will again be employed, 4½ custodians with a combined yearly salary of \$17,900 and \$10,900 for bus drivers and bus supervisor.

No new bus purchases are planned for the coming year in the new budget. Total estimated cost of the transportation program is set at \$24,840 for the year.

## EXPECTED RECEIPTS

Expected receipts as set forth in the budget will include \$45,024.00 from the State on the per capita, or the amount paid for each student expected to attend. This is figured on an estimated daily average attendance of 594 at \$76 each.

Other income will be \$1,800 from the County, the \$20,000 surplus applied to the budget and \$399,786.00 to be collected in local taxes. This gives a total of \$466,610.00.

## Mexia Services Held For Mrs. J. W. Brown

Funeral services were held Monday in Mexia for Mrs. J. W. Brown, mother of P. V. Brown of Rankin.

Mrs. Brown died at 6:13 a.m. on Sunday, June 14 in the Rankin County Hospital following a lengthy illness. Her husband, John W. Brown, died October 15, 1957. Also preceding her in death was one daughter, the only other child of the couple.

Mrs. Brown was 80-year-old at the time of her passing. She and Mr. Brown were married in Hubbard, Texas on January 1, 1907.

They had lived at a number of West Texas towns since that time while he followed the barber trade. She was buried in Mt. Calm cemetery near Hubbard, the resting place of her late husband.

Survivors other than the son include three grandchildren, Phyllis, Don and Jo Brown; three sisters, Mrs. Rozie Carter, Arlington; Mrs. Jim C. Jones, Dallas and Mrs. Walter Redding, Hubbard; and two brothers: Tom Clark of Fort Worth and Jim Clark of Corpus Christi.

Major John L. Green, son of Mrs. Ettie Hurst of Rankin, has been named administrator for a new \$120,000 hospital presently under construction in Las Vegas, Nevada. To be known as the North Las Vegas Medical Center, completion is expected by September 1.

Major Green is presently the executive officer of Nellis Air Force Base Hospital but will retire from the Armed Services in 1960 to assume his new duties with the Center.

\$30,000. The building has developed from a dream to a reality in the six months since the Permian Basin Council had its annual meeting November 8, 1958 in McCamey, authorizing its construction.

The lodge will be used as a dining hall and can accommodate a capacity of 150 campers. Kitchen equipment for the lodge, including a 10-burner range, two ovens, sterilizing sink, steel cabinets, deep freezer and ice maker, has been donated

by District I. District II purchased tables and benches for the dining hall. District III has donated the furnishings for the staff room.

Over-all size of the building is 5,000 square feet. It is situated near the entrance to Fern Canyon, with the expanse of front windows looking out on Mitre Peak, the peak from which the camp gets its name.

Local Girl Scouts participated in the cookie sale that financed the major part of the work.

**Upton County Light In Traffic Damages**

Upton County reported total property damages of \$1,120 in May due to Rural traffic accidents. This amount was the result of two automobile accidents on rural highways within the county during that time.

Of the 24 counties in District 4-H, Upton was among the highest in number of accidents and property damage sustained Glasscock County had only one accident but it resulted in a total of \$5,000 damages.

El Paso and Loving Counties reported no rural accidents nor property damage. Jeff Davis had one for \$60.00. Culberson led in both the number, 14, and amounts of damage at \$28,990. Midland County was second with 12 accidents and \$11,154.00 damages.

Total number of accidents in the district for May was 123 with 4 persons killed, 61 injured and \$100,081.00 in damages.

*Sally Lewis says...*

There's something about early spring days that gives us a new lease on life. The buds popping out on the trees, pussy willows heralding the forthcoming green season, and return of songbirds remind us of the gardening chores which should be done.

Many gardeners, both old and new, don't realize what "plant early" means. If quick and good results is what you're after, don't wait until the ground warms up before planting anything. Nature plants many seeds in autumn, especially weeds. And what vigorous root systems they develop! Many flowers and vegetables are as hardy as weeds. The earlier you get started, the better.

Remember to fertilize lawns early. Too many lawns suffer in mid-summer because of too little fertilizer applied too late to get healthy root systems established.

Then there are the areas where you don't want grass (and weeds) to grow—such as tennis courts, driveways, stone walls, etc. If you sprinkle the area with a solution of two cans of lye to 10 quarts of water, you can control such unwanted growth. Repeat spray to stubborn plants.

Spring is the best time to fertilize evergreens. Early nourishment produces harder wood, enabling the tree to better withstand cold during the following winter.

Add two tablespoons of vinegar to a quart of water and use this solution around acid-loving azaleas and rhododendrons.

Soap mixed with aphid-killing insecticide, such as nicotine sulfate or Kelthane, aids the killing power because it spreads the chemical over the foliage and makes it stick.
