



ANNIVERSARY BANQUET

International Director To Address Lions' Fete

In the issue of the Friona Star dated Friday, June 27, 1941, "Uncle John" White, original editor of the Star, told about the Charter Night banquet by the Friona Lions Club under a front-page headline which read: Lions Banquet Successful and Joyous."

The text of the story is as follows:

The twenty charter members of the Friona Lions Club celebrated their Charter Night Tuesday night in the Friona Woman's Club house with a large attendance of Lions from all the Lions Clubs of the surrounding country, with their wives or sweethearts, and a full attendance of the local members, and their wives and a few invited guests, to enjoy a splendid program and a banquet of delightful menu.

After the banquet were all seated at the festal board, a few minutes were spent in singing songs suitable to such an occasion, led by Harley Bulls with both Lions and guests joining in the singing.

This was followed by reading or reciting the Salute to the Flag, and an invocation, offered by Rev. C. Carl Dollar, pastor of the local Congregational Church.

W.L. Edelman, president of the local Lions, who had called the meeting to order, and thus far directed the program, then introduced Lion Ray Moore of Muleshoe, as toastmaster, and Lion Moore at once took charge of the program, which ran as follows:

Two vocal solos by Miss Melba Welch of Friona.

Welcome Address, by Mayor F.W. Reeve of Friona.

Introduction of visiting Lions by the presidents of the various clubs represented.

Two vocal solos by Miss Georgia Nell Coleman of Friona.

Low Down on Scientifics, by Leslie Van Meter of Canyon Lions Club.

Two vocal solos by Miss Nancy Shackelford of Friona.

Address by Lion John P. Honts of Dalhart, now serving as District Attorney.

Presentation of Charter, by F.V. Wallace of Dalhart.

Acceptance, by Lion W.L. Edelman of Friona.

Vocal solo by H.B. Bulls. Adjournment.

The menu consisted of Virginia baked ham, vegetable salad, candied yams, creamed peas, apple sauce, hot rolls, butter, gold cake and ice cream and coffee.

The menu was served by the ladies of the two local Women's Clubs.

A great deal of merriment which is as it should be on such occasions, was indulged in by the Lions and their guests which interspersed and mingled with the rendition of the above program, which tended well to keep in a jolly mood all the banquetees, throughout the entire ceremony.

The highlights of the occasion were the vocal solos by the young ladies, the oration given by Lion Van Meter, given in Negro dialect; and which consisted of some of the most cantankerous caterwallings of the English language the human ear has ever had the pleasure of listening to. But the real event of the evening was the admirable and helpful and encouraging address, delivered by Lion Honts, who was pinch-hitter for Lion Elmer Elliott, past District Governor 2-T.

In this address, Lion Honts brought out the real purpose of the Lions organization and showed in a manner easily understood by all present, how being a Lion must make a man a better citizen, a better neighbor and a better husband and father, than he might be otherwise. In fact, it was shown that a man cannot be a good Lion without being the very best, in all respects, that it is possible for a man to be.

It was a joyous and meritorious affair, of which the citizens of Friona may well be proud and thankful, and all present apparently enjoyed it to the fullest measure.

Representatives were present from the Lions Clubs at Clovis, Muleshoe, Dimmitt, Canyon, Hereford -- this club having the largest representation present, almost, if not quite equalling the local members -- Dalhart, and Lubbock, and probably one or two other whom the writer does not recall.

The Friona Lions Club will celebrate its 25th anniversary tonight, with a banquet at Friona High School. The program be-

He holds the 100% Presidential and Secretarial awards, the merit award, District Governor Appreciation Award, International at President's Convention Award (4 times), Distinguished Service Award, International Citizenship Award, Extension Awards Bulletin Editor Award. He has been special representative in Texas and New Mexico and was State Secretary of Florida in 1956-59.

He is married and has three sons.

Twenty-Four Have Been "Boss Lion"

Twenty-four men have served the Friona Lions Club as president, or "Boss Lion" in the club's 25-year history. W.L. (Preach) Edelman, who was the club's first president, and held the position for two years.

Besides being charter president, Edelman has the distinction of being the only president of the club to serve more than one year. In the past 23 years no former president has been elevated to the position again, nor has anyone succeeded himself in office.

Of the list of 24 "Boss Lions" who have served the Friona Club, 20 still live in or near Friona. Three have moved to other communities, and one former president, H.T. Magness, is deceased.

Steve Boussett, another former president, has moved to the nearby Dawn community but is still considered as a "hometown."

Guest speaker for the banquet will include M.C. Lewis, Jr., of Hot Springs, Arkansas, a director of Lions International. Lewis was elected to the board of directors of the main organization at its convention in Toronto in 1964.

Other special guests will in-

clude Tom Kirkham, Austin, State Lion Secretary; J.W. Robinson, Jr., of Hereford, the outgoing District Governor; James Wheeler, Amarillo, another former governor.

Club officials have also been invited from Dimmitt, Bovina, Muleshoe, Austin, Levelland, Kress, Pampa, Dumas, Stratford, Dalhart and Amarillo. Joe Tooley, Pampa, president of the Hi-Plains Eye Bank, is expected to attend.

Any local resident who is a former member of the Lions Club but not presently a member is encouraged to come. A charge of \$3 per couple will be charged to help defray expenses.

Highlighting the anniversary banquet will be the appearance of the "Slumtown Symphony", a musical group from Lamesa, which has entertained at the Lion's International Convention.

Lion Charles Allen, a past president of the club, will serve as master of ceremonies for the event. Allen will also lead the group in singing a few songs at the outset of the program.

Following the banquet, the program will shift to the high school auditorium, where the Slumtown Symphony of Lamesa will entertain.

The group consists of Richard Crawley, Mrs. H.B. Miller, Jack Sander, Jerry Bartley, Bill Butler, Bob Crawley, Leon Brown and Jim Williams.

Following the entertainment Lion M.C. Lewis will give his address.

Special awards are to be presented at the conclusion of the program.

LIONS' CHARTER PRESIDENT

Edelman Serving As District Governor

"Preach" Edelman, it was said recently by one writer, has done lots of things in his life, but he has never "preached." Edelman brought recognition to Friona and its Lions Club by being elected District Governor of Texas District 2T-1 at the recently district convention at Hereford.

"Preach" has been a teacher, a school superintendent, an oil and gas distributor, and most recently, has been elected the city's mayor.

He has carried his nickname practically all of his life. As a young toddler, about two years of age, Edelman says he was given the nickname by a colored worker on his father's farm.

"He sounds just like a preacher -- even walks like one," the Negro man said. The nickname was later shortened to "Preacher," and all of his acquaintances know him that way. In case you've wondered, the

W.L. stands for Wilburn Lionel. Edelman and his family came to Friona in 1938, when he accepted the position as superintendent of schools at Friona. He served four years as superintendent at Friona, and has spent 15 years in the field of education.

Edelman was instrumental in helping to start the Friona Lions Club 25 years ago, and was elected first president of the organization. He held the position two years, before Frank Spring was elected to replace him.

He has served the local club in other capacities, having been a member of the board of directors several times. He had served as membership chairman for the Lions' district 2T-1 before being elected to the district's highest office.

Edelman was a delegate from the Friona Lions Club to the International convention in Miami in 1963.

Active in community affairs, "Preach" has served on the Chamber of Commerce, as its president; and is a past president of the Friona Country Club.

Edelman has been very active in agricultural affairs, especially concerning the cotton industry. He is currently a member delegate to the National Cotton Council from the Plains. He served as secretary-treasurer of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., during 1965-66. He also served as a director of American Cotton Producers, from 1957 to 1965.

While in the education field, Edelman served as president of the Panhandle-Plains Superintendents and Principals Association.

Founding Of Lions Recounted In Story

A story in the June 13, 1941 issue of the Friona Star tells about the organization of the Friona Lions Club. The story went as follows:

The members of the Friona Lions Club, assisted by a group of the Muleshoe Club as meeting held at the Friona Woman's Club house on Tuesday night of last week, duly installed the officers of the club that had been elected at a meeting held a week previous.

The Friona club was organized with a roll of twenty charter members, consisting of the following named men:

E.C. Boedeker, G.B. Buske, Roy Clemens, A.A. Crow, W.L. Edelman, E.W. Grason, S.H. Halls, C.C. Holmes, Ray Lamarr, O.F. Lange, C.E. McLean, Dr. J.R. McReynolds, H.T. Magness, S.H. Osborn, J.R. Roden, Glenn Reeve, E.M. Rushing, Frank A. Spring, L.G. Symphon and Elroy Wilson.

The following Lions have been chosen as officers of the club for the first year:

W.L. Edelman, president; E.M. Rushing, secretary; C.E. McLean, Tall Tooley, Frank Spring, 1st vice; president; Tim Magness, Lion tamer; Ray Lamarr and Dr. R.J. McReynolds, directors for two years; W.F. Boedeker and Roy Clemens, directors for one year.

The Lions have selected the first and third Tuesday nights of each month as their regular meeting nights, having held their regular meeting on Tuesday night of last week, June 3.

June 24th has been selected as Charter Night at which time the local club will receive its charter from the National Organization. Members from all the neighboring clubs will receive invitations to attend this meeting, and O.F. Lange will serve as Master of Ceremonies for the occasion.

Very active in community affairs, Messenger and his wife Narcia have held offices in Friona Country Club. He has also served as president of the Panhandle Foreign and Sports Car Club. Messenger was honored as Friona's "Man of the Year" by the Chamber of Commerce in 1963.

Messenger has also served as a district officer in the Boy Scout organization, serving as district committeeman. He is secretary to the soil conservation District's Board of directors, and fills a vital role each year on the Farmer County Junior Livestock Show, which the Friona Lions sponsor.

Messenger, one of the Friona Club's most diligent members, has just completed his tenth year of perfect attendance for club meetings.

Competition for the award was based on a point system, embracing such things as number of programs presented on the Eye Bank program, number of honor cards secured, and so forth.

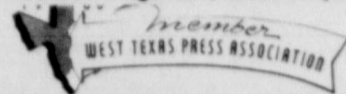

Friona's Lions cooperate with the High Plains Eye Bank, to secure pledge cards for eye donations in the cornea transplant program. They are constantly on the lookout for persons needing such an operation, as well.

The Lions help the community through a number of other ways. We hope their second 25 years in Friona is equally as fruitful and eventful.



Lions Are International In Scope

Lions International ranks as the world's largest service club organization. It has over 15,000 members. These come from over 100 countries.

New clubs have been formed in recent years at the rate of two per day.

Club activities usually fall into 10 groups; boys' and girls' activities, citizenship and patriotism, civic improvement, education, health and welfare, safety, sight conservation and aid to the blind, agricultural needs, and United Nations and international affairs.

Formed in Chicago on June 7, 1917, it held its first national convention in Dallas. By 1920, the association had doubled its membership and had spread to Canada. Other clubs were later established in China, Cuba, Hawaii and Mexico. Headquarters are still in Chicago.

Highway Patrol Lists Eight County Accidents

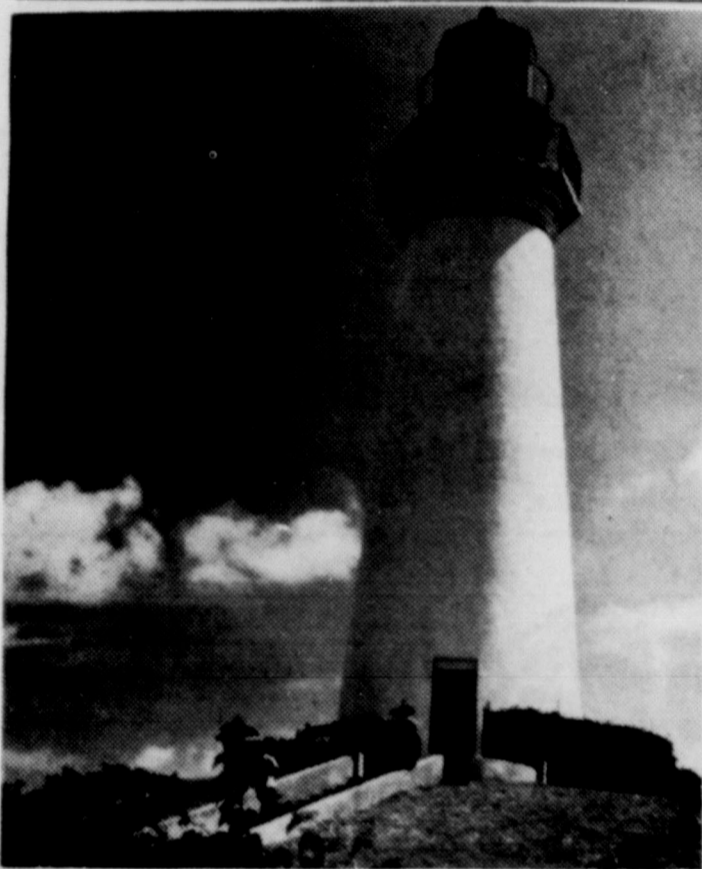
The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents in Parmer County during the month of May according to Sergeant W.E. Wells Highway Patrol.

The crashes resulted in ten persons injured and an estimated property damage \$5,350. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1966 shows a total of 37 accidents resulting in one person killed, 23 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$29,134.00.

The number of traffic deaths in 1965. "For the first five

months of 1966, 1137 persons have died in traffic compared to 1042 deaths for the same period of 1965", the Sergeant stated. This 10 per cent increase is very alarming, and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture.

The Sergeant appealed to the motoring public to assist in the reduction of this trend, otherwise, the death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 3028 deaths in Texas during 1965.

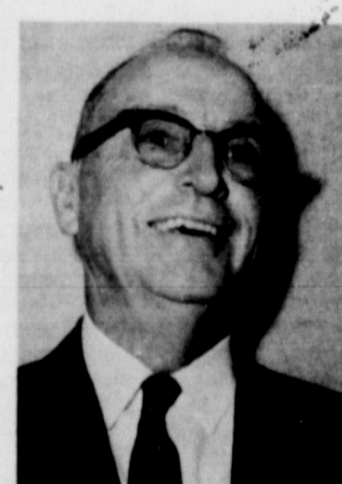

Lions' Activities In Friona Render Community Service

Fifteen community projects, most of them continuing, are listed as Friona Lions Club accomplishments of the past five years. Principal fund-raising ac-

tivities are spaced through the year. Foremost is the annual Maize Days carnival and municipal celebration, held usually in the second week of September. Sale of shave permits of Friona Lions defrays cost of a free barbecue which is a feature of Maize Days.

The annual mop and broom sale for the Caravan of the Blind is held normally in March or April, and the annual light bulb sale during the early part of November.

Community projects upon which funds are expended are headed by assistance to the Parmer County Community Hospital. Lions have furnished a hospital room, purchased a portable steam table, donated to the building expansion program and purchased a positive pressure breathing apparatus for the hospital.

Other projects include financial assistance in sponsoring and supplying equipment for Little League baseball programs, assistance to Boy Scouts

in Camp Don Harrington summer camp program, assistance to the Foreign Exchange Student program, establishment of a Student Loan Fund.

Also medical assistance to needy families continued purchases of eyeglasses for underprivileged children assistance in maintenance and equipment for Federated Women's Clubs, assistance to Friona High School athletic programs, annual 100 per cent participation in HI - Plains Eye Bank program.

Also assistance to the Chamber of Commerce particularly in Maize Days activities, sponsoring annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, sponsoring annual Soil Conservation award, assistance in furnishing the Friona Public Library, assistance in Texas Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville.

Of the original 22 charter members of the club, those still active in the organization are G.B. Buske, W.L. Edelman, who was the first president, J.T. Gee, Sloan H. Osborn, Glenn E. Reeve, Eric Rushing, and Frank A. Spring.

Others of the charter members included Willie Boedeker, T.J. Crawford, L.R. Dilger, Charles Holmes, Oscar Lange, and J.R. Roden. Organization of the Friona Club was sponsored by Muleshoe Lions Club.

Members who have served in offices higher than in the local club include Steve Messenger, who was Deputy District governor, 1963-64, Zone Chairman, 1962-63, and is now vice

president of the HI-Plains Eye Bank; Flake Barber, Zone Chairman, 1964-65; and W.L. Edelman, now serving as District Governor, after having just finished serving as Membership Development Chairman in the District Governor's cabinet.

The club sweetheart for 1964-65, Sheryl Long, was winner of the district sweetheart title, and competed in the state Lions Sweetheart contest.

J.C. Claborn, president-elect, was named "Man of the Year" for Friona by the Chamber of Commerce at its banquet Marcy 2. The former mayor, Claborn's work in the Lions Club was cited as part of his activities which brought him the chamber honor.

Twenty-one of Friona Lions Club's twenty-five past presidents still reside in Friona.

Eye Bank Is Major Project For Lions

Sight for those who are blind cannot be bought with money. Help must come from willing volunteers. This realization prompted District 2 T-1 Lions to take the Hi-Plains Eye Bank as a major district project. Many eyes from an Oklahoma bank were being sent to the Texas Panhandle for use.

Steve Messenger, a past president of Friona's Lions Club, has served two years on the Eye Bank's board of directors.

The idea was first broached during the 1958 convention at Doherty. In the United States, there are 80 eye banks and many of these are sponsored by the Lions.

During the 1961-62 tenure of Omar Hermismeyer of Amarillo, the district took action and seven clubs in Amarillo organized the eye bank. It was chartered under its present name in Oct., 1961. The District voted to accept it as a district project.

Since that time, thirty eyes have been received with ten being received locally. Amarillo is centrally located and serves as headquarters since its location and medical facilities make operations feasible. Over 2200 donor cards are on file.

Ed Skypala, immediate past president of the Hi-Plains Eye Bank, has a small sticker attached to his drivers license indicating that he is an eye donor. He said that the reason for this is to facilitate the immediate use of his eyes should he meet an instant death. Eyes received in this way are strong and make good transplants Skypala said.

All ages may sign pledge cards as all eyes are good for transplants, that is all except infants, Skypala pointed out.

The Eye Bank Association of Texas is now in the process of being organized and one of the projects intended for the organization is State Department of safety approval of the sticker idea for all donors.

Joe Tooley a Pampa druggist, is president of the Eye Bank this year. Paul Prawl, Morse is 1st vice president, Steve Messenger, Friona, 2nd vice president, C.A. Smith, Amarillo, 3rd vice president and Mrs. Betty Bullock of Amarillo is executive secretary.

Secretary-treasurer is Orby Hensley of Amarillo and Bill Gilbert of Amarillo is the Eye Bank representative on the Lion District Governor's Cabinet.

Medical Director is Dr. Coleman Taylor of Amarillo.

The advisory committee is made up of the past presidents.

Joe Tooley is also president of the Southwest region of the Eye Bank Association of America. His territory includes Wyoming, Montana, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas.

Examinations by specialists can predict to a fairly accurate degree whether eye transplant will be successful or not. Two Hereford residents have received transplants, one small youngster from a nearby town who was just beginning school received a transplant and very elderly people who have been blind for many years have received successful transplants.

One of the most touching stories to come out of the Panhandle work is the story of a young mother who lost her sight at the birth of her first child. She now has four children and can see again because she was the recipient of one of the most precious gifts to be given Skypala said.

He volunteers the services of any of the directors, past presidents or officers of the eye bank for programs to any group who want to know more about the eye bank.

Needs and supplies are transmitted across the United States by a ham operator network which broadcasts a 7, both a.m. and p.m. It is called the Eye-bank Network and has four operators in Amarillo.

This is only one of the projects of the Lions - the men who believe in putting work into that term "service club". No one is charged for eyes. Lions donate time and funds to keep the project going.

Friona Students On Honor Roll

Sixty-two students made straight-A (4.0) grades in all their courses during the Southwestern State College spring semester and are on the President's Honor Roll.

Qualifying for the Dean's Honor Roll were more than 700 others who had averages of B (3.0) or better with no grades of D, F or incomplete.

Students must be enrolled in a minimum 14 semester hours to be eligible for either honor roll.

A special event of each night's performance this year will be a 30 minute show presented by Hank Thompson and his Brazos Valley Boys. After each rodeo they will also entertain for your dancing pleasure.

An average of 102 books daily were checked out during the 5 days the library has been open this summer. Library days are Tuesdays, Thursdays,

and Saturdays. Each of these days the library is open from 9 to 12 noon and from 3 to 6 p.m. All ages are using the library with the heavy majority school age and repeat users. Forty-eight are new readers this summer.

Last week 150 books were added to the shelves by a summer loan from the Bookmobile. An additional 128 books were received from the State Library on loan for one year's renewal provided.

An increasing supply of books has enabled the library to extend loan of books to a 2 weeks

period this summer. The fine on over-due books has been reduced to 2¢ per library day. There is no charge to register or borrow books.

F-M STATUS LIFTED

Highway 214 Made Eligible For State Aid

New developments in the possibility of improvements for State Highway 214 south of Friona were announced this week by County Judge Loyde Brewer.

Brewer announced that the State Highway Department had lifted the "Farm to Market" status from the road, thereby making it eligible for state planning and assistance on im-

provements for the road. "This opens the way for an official request from the City of Friona and Farmer County for state programming on the road," district highway engineer O.L. Crain, Lubbock told Judge Brewer this week.

Brewer indicated that an official request from the Commissioners Court would be

practically a routine matter, and voiced his hope that the City of Friona would also cooperate on the matter.

The highway, originally a Farm-to-Market road leading south from Friona, is the direct link between Friona and Muleshoe, and the main route for much travel to the south, including traffic to Lubbock.

Although the state gave the road "token" designation some years ago as a state highway, and officially marked the road "State Highway 214", the road never has been widened from its Farm-to-Market days, and was still on the books at Austin as such a road.

"I remember this from past experiences with the road, and asked Mr. Crain if we could have the road's status changed, so that it could be included in the state's program of work at some future time," Judge Brewer says.

He continued that Crain referred him to the State Highway Department in Austin. Such changes must come from the state office, Crain advised Judge Brewer.

So, Brewer wrote a letter to the State Highway Department, and shortly was advised that a "minute order" had officially changed the road's designation on state records to show Highway 214 as a state highway.

"This does not mean that there will be any immediate action on the road," Crain told Judge Brewer this week. However, it opens the way for an official request from the city and county for improvements on the highway, the district engineer pointed out.

Traffic volume on the highway is plenty to merit its widening, the highway officials have admitted in the past. In addition, there are six places between Friona and the Bailey County line where water covers the highway anytime there is a large rain.

It is also hoped that one of the improvements will be the construction of an overpass on Highway 214 at the Santa Fe Railroad, eliminating the dangerous South Main crossing in Friona, which has been an almost constant source of accidents.

Church Choir Slates Wide Tour Of State

The youth choir of Friona's First Baptist Church is planning an extensive tour for the last part of July which will take the choir to east and south-central Texas.

The choir will sing in six churches and one college. They will spend one day sight-seeing in the Galveston area and will also spend a day at Six

Flags Over Texas. David Campbell, music and education director at the church, will accompany the choir on tour, along with other sponsors.

The choir's itinerary goes as follows: Saturday, July 23; Riverside Baptist Church, Fort Worth; Sunday, July 24; Tallo-wood Baptist Church, Houston; Monday, July 25; sight-seeing in Galveston; Tuesday, July 26; Central Baptist Church, Marshall; Wednesday, July 27; morning, East Texas Baptist College, Marshall; evening; First Baptist Church, Atlanta; Thursday, July 28; First Baptist Church, Cooper; Friday, July 29; morning -- Six Flags Over Texas; evening; McArthur Blvd. Baptist Church, Irving; Saturday, July 30; return to Friona.

The choir will travel by charter bus. They are earning money to pay for their trip.

On The Farm In Parmer County

There are two short courses coming up during the next month that will be of interest to some here in Parmer County. Both of these will be held at Texas A&M University at College Station.

The first is the Texas Greenhouse Vegetable Growers Short Course and Conference on June 27 and 28. The two day event will cover nearly every aspect of greenhouse tomato production. Many outstanding specialists in this field are on the program. During the past year we have had four different individuals come by and discuss greenhouse tomato production with us. If you have any thoughts about possibly going into this type of business, you should definitely attend this event. You could learn more in these days than you could in a long time of reading and visiting with some of the same people. For more information on this, please contact the county agent.

Over the past two years we have received many inquiries about improved pastures. A Pasture and Forage Short-course is scheduled for July 7 and 8 at Texas A&M. The program will cover most phases of grass and forage production. Both of these short-courses come at a busy time for most Parmer County folks but either one will give you an excellent educational experience as well as a nice trip into that part of Texas as there are several places of interest in that general area. Contact the County Agent for more information.

GRASSHOPPERS
Young grasshoppers are appearing in abundant numbers in several areas of the state.

Grasshoppers are relatively easy to control when they are young but become increasingly difficult to control as they near maturity. They are best controlled in their hatching areas before they begin to migrate over larger areas. Frequently, spot treatment of the hatching areas will prevent later widespread damage.

Eggs are usually deposited in late summer and fall in the soil in grassy, uncultivated

areas such as roadsides, fence rows, idle crop land and pastures, the entomologist said. The young nymphs, after hatching the following spring, feed in the vicinity for several days before beginning to disperse to fields, pastures and gardens. Applying control measures while population is still fairly concentrated will reduce later damage to pastures and crops. Several insecticides give effective control of young grasshoppers. Producers should pay careful attention to the label precautions before applying any insecticides to pastures and crops.

For control recommendations on grassland and specific field crops, contact the county agent. We haven't heard of any infestations in Parmer County as most infested areas are about 100 miles east of here. However, if you have an abundance of hoppers please contact the County Agent.

JOHNSON GRASS
This is a real busy time for our farmers. Too often many just can't find the time to rig up a sprayer at this time and spray the Johnson grass along their roads and ditches. We have seen much Johnsongrass that is beginning to head out. You need to get right on this job today.

We think that a methyl arsonate (DSMA or MDMA) sold under several different trade names is about the best chemical for this kind of work, considering cost. Apply five pounds per acre active Methyl Arsonate in 40 to 100 gallons of water per acre plus a surfactant when grass is eight to 12 inches high and actively growing. Wet all of the foliage good. Three sprayings may be required during a year to eradicate the Johnsongrass and temperatures should be 80 degrees or higher, when applying.

GRAIN SORGHUM
Generally speaking over the County we have a real good sorghum crop started. Recent rains have helped a little on our irrigation requirements but some areas have already got

the first irrigation applied to sorghum.

During the past two years we have seen a few fields where the heads did not completely bloom and set a full head of grain. We don't know exactly what causes this condition but high temperatures and sometimes lack of water have caused the same condition in greenhouse experiments.

The sorghum head is beginning to form about 35 days after emergence and this is an important time in the sorghum plants life. A good supply of moisture is needed about this time to insure a good seed head is being formed. If you have adequate water and are shooting for maximum production, don't wait until your sorghum shows a moisture stress to start your irrigation. These top sorghum yields just need a lot of water and don't let these rains fool you into waiting too long to start your sorghum irrigation. Check the moisture conditions in your soil and plan to irrigate when about 50 percent of the available soil moisture has been used.

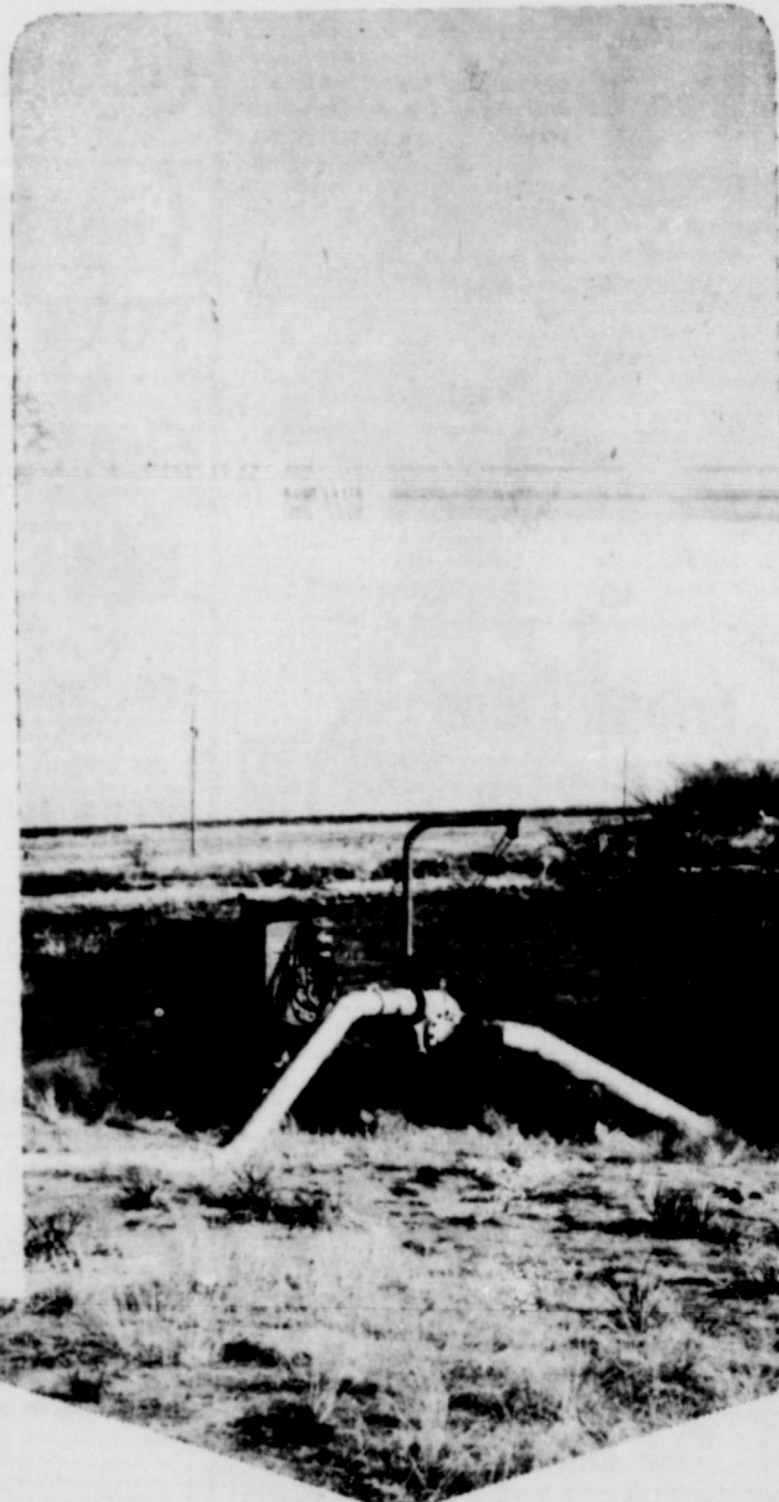

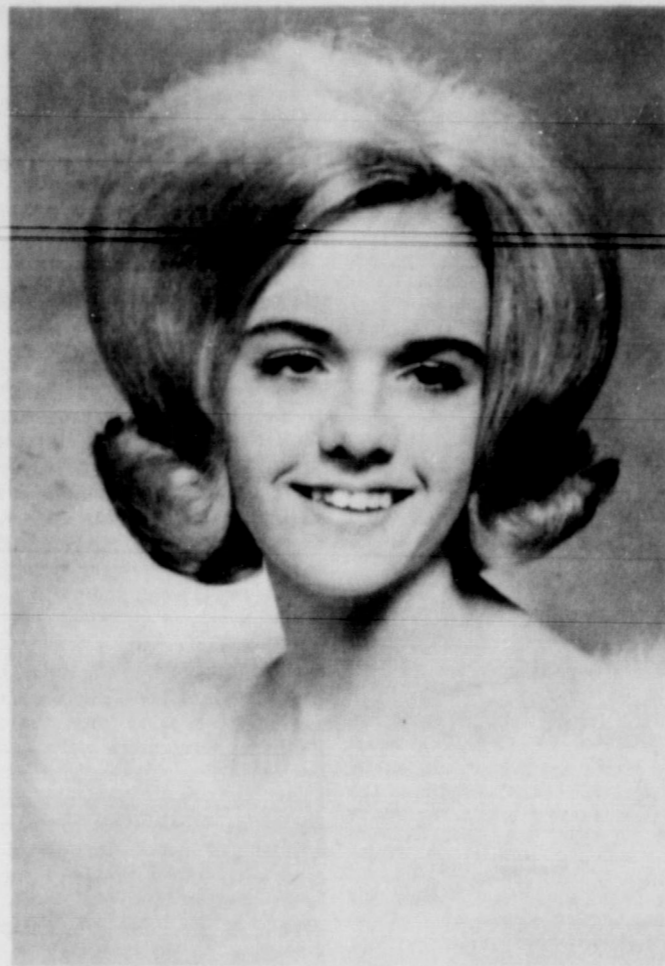

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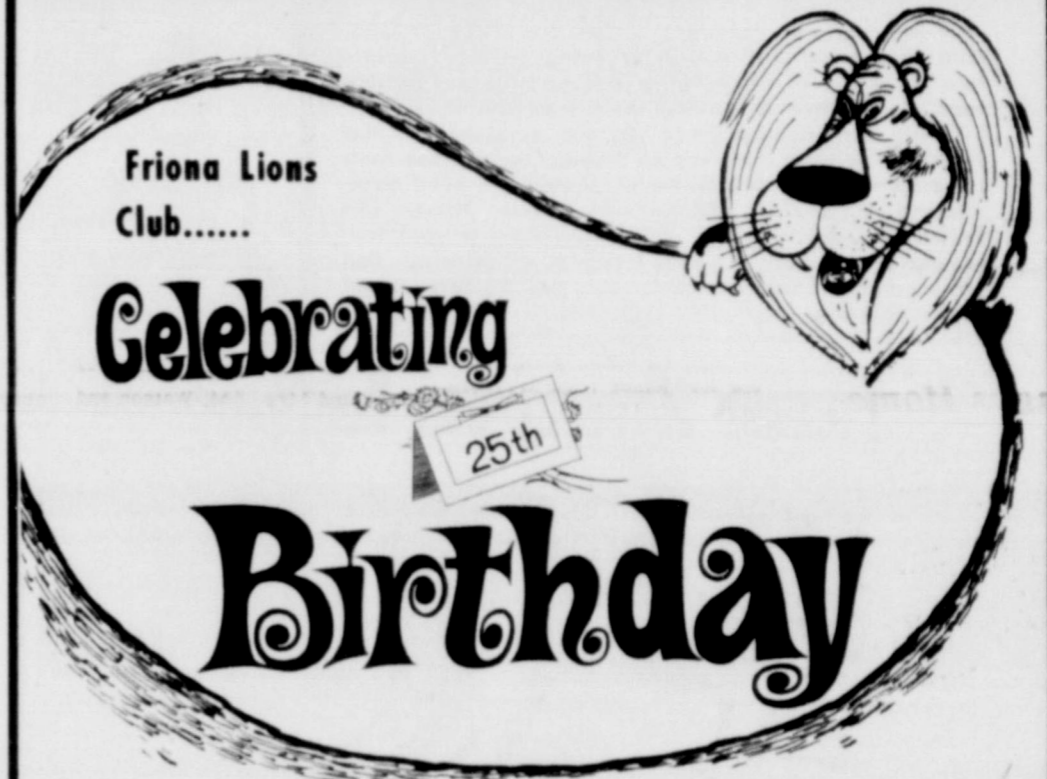

But the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association warns that there's a special danger when children can find and help themselves to medications which look and taste too much like candy. Here are a few further tips passed along by the drug industry, on how to use and store medicine safely:

- * Keep only medicines currently in use.
- * Destroy old prescriptions, because most drugs may lose potency or be chemically changed by time.
- * Read the label carefully before opening the bottle or box. Read it again before taking the medicine.
- * If you have more than one box of pills or capsules to take, preferably locked, out of reach of children.

Dale Blackstone, 4-H member of Lazbuddie has made a great deal of progress on his landscape project this year. He has put out peach, plum and apricot trees, rooted some hedge privet, put out roses and has a nice flower bed of many varieties of annuals and perennials. He keeps the lawn and has plans for a patio and evergreen shrubs for foundation plantings.

The Friona 4-H Club will have a workshop on lamps at their next meeting which will be the second Monday in July. A lamp kit has been ordered for those who need a study lamp and Ray Simpson, Educational Director for the Deaf Smith Electric Coop, will conduct the workshop.

Although we can't actually see improvements being made by our neighbors to the southwest from the office at the present time, we can smell the hot topping being put on the parking lot around Johnson's Food Store. Real soon customers of this store will have a completely renewed parking lot.

Another improvement that isn't visible yet is grass on the grounds of the new high school plant. Of course, weeds are very much in evidence. It seems that for every grass seed that was planted at least three unplanted weed seeds produced plants.

School workmen are busy all summer beautifying grounds around the school and generally do a bang up good job, so by fall the grass will probably have outgrown the weeds and a beautiful lawn will be the result.

Dudley and Jewel Robason of Siloam Springs, Arkansas, have been visiting their daughter, Patsy Talley, and her family. The Robasons are former Friona residents and have a host of other relatives and friends here also. Jewel is the daughter of L.M. Crow and a sister of Myrl Buske, Lillian Jones, Clifford Crow and Red Crow.

Since Dudley is a past president of Friona Lions Club, his arrival coincided with the club's 25th birthday. He was in the Star office a few minutes Monday and some of us learned more about the green bean canning industry than we had ever known before.

Robason and his son, D.O. have been dairy farmers, broiler producers and green bean producers. This year the Robason farm has about forty-five acres of beans almost ready to harvest. These beans are harvested mechanically and produce four or five tons per acre.

Most of us can't imagine canned beans on a ton basis, but Dudley says current price of beans ready for the canner is \$50 per ton. Irrigation is done from farm ponds with pumps similar to our lake pumps. Average rainfall is 46 inches plus per year, but additional rain in the spring and early summer is needed for best results.

He said, "A field man told me one day last week that an additional inch of rain before harvest would add about one ton per acre to our yield."

The Texas Highway Department has put out a very interesting and informative publication entitled "Texas, America's Fun-Tier." It has been compiled and published for free distribution and a copy should be in the home of every Texas family.

In addition to a large number of beautiful pictures of scenes all over the state, the magazine has a two page feature entitled, "Historic Eras of Texas." Students of Texas history could get much useful information from this source.

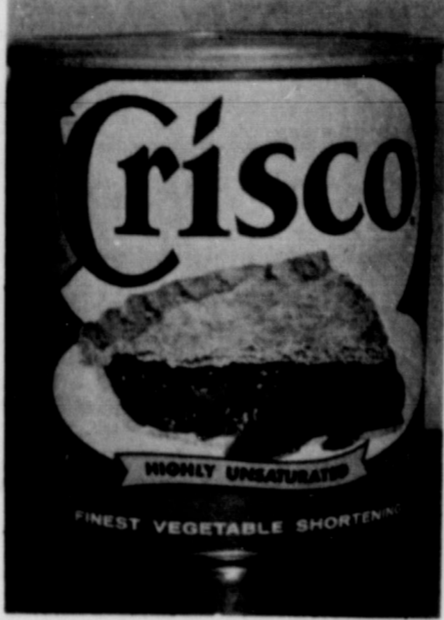

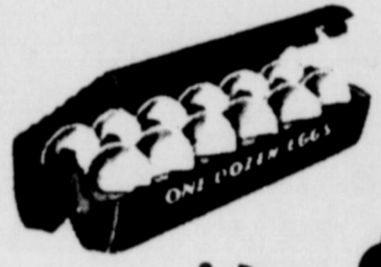


