EXPLANATIONS OF BRUCELLOSIS GIVEN

## WHAT TO EXPECT FROM

 BRUCELLOSIS VACCINATIONVaccination is a valuable tool in your battle against brucellosis. But like any other tool, you need to know what it will and won't do when you put it to work in your heard.
Vaccination is like the brakes on your car. Their job is to slow your car down when trouble looms up ahead. Usually they'll help you avoid a crackup. But you can't always depend upon brakes alone to prevent trouble
vaccination will.

1. Provide about 65 per cent protection from infection under average field conditions.
2. Help limit the spread of infection within a heard, once it gains entrance, if a majority of the heard is vaccinated.
3. Gradually reduce the precentage of diseased animals in an infected heard over a period of years as older animals are culled and the number of susceptable animals is reduced.
4. Eliminate brucellosis from a small number of herds where natural infection is weak and management practices are good.
5. Reduce animal infection by about 80 per cent in areas where a majority of calves are vaccinated 6. Reduce herd infection by about 20 percent in areas where a maj ority of calves are vaccinated.
6. Mask or moderate the symptoms in some animals which contract the disease in spite of vanccination.
7. Cause a reaction to the blood test which will disappear completely in nearly all animals by the time they are 30 months old if they were vaccinated at the ages of 4 through 8 months.
VACCINATION WONT:
8. Eradicate brucellosis-it will help control it.
9. Provide complete disease immunity in any animal. If exposed to infection great enough and often enough, resistance of any vaccinated animal can be overcome.
10. Provide 100 percent protection from infection regardless of the number of times antmals are revaccinated. Revaccination does not increase an animals reststance to infection.
11. Prevent all animals from aborting once they become infected.
12. Interfere with normal reproduction.
13. Cause the disease in cattie or other livestock.
14. Cause millk to become contaminated with Breucella organisms.
15. Cause calves or older animal to become carriers or spreaders of bruceliosis.
16. Cure brucellosis-it will only help prevent it
17. Completely eliminate the danget of human infection.
18. Change the normal course of the disease in an animal already infected with brucellosis at the time of vaccination.
