Grandfalls Forfits; Red Devils To Play Andrews B Thursday

The once powerful Grandfalls Cowboys, formerly a tough nut for Rankin football teams, has forfeited the rest of their games for the season. A lack of players was given as the reason. Next year, the Cowboys will drop back to 8-man football.

With their withdrawal from the

district competition, plus Rankin's fine 26-6 win over Van Horn last week, leaves the Devils in undisputed possession of first place with 2 wins and no losses—at least, until the Wink-Van Horn game is played in Wink Friday night.

With their fine showing against the Van Horn Eagles, the Red Dev-

ils now have sports writers and fans looking forward to the Wink-Rankin tilt which will be played here next Friday week, Nov. 13. Once picked to finish little better than third in the District, the Rankin squad is now favored by some to beat the Wildcats and take an undisputed championship crown.

PLAY THURSDAY

Rather than take an open date which might cause a let down for the team, the Devils have matched a Thursday night game with the

Andrews Mustangs "B" team. This team is undefeated in play but has been tied once by Odessa high "B". They later avenged this tie by defeating the Odessa team by three touchdowns.

It is felt that this game will be to the advantage of the Red Devils since the Andrews squad will run on offense sometimes used by the Wink Wildcats, plus the fact that they apparently have a good squad and will provide first-class competition.

"We feel that this game will do our boys a lot of good and that we are fortunate to have been able to match a game with the Andrews team this late in the season," Coach Leach said this week. Leach also indicated that several of the Red Devil players would likely miss the game. Jack "Hard Rock" McCain, who is a tough one in any football game, failed to make the win column with his grades and will be out this week. Fred Aguilar will also likely miss playing.

Gametime will be at 7:00 p.m. and a full fledged program will be on tap with the bands and pep squads performing.

A line-up for Andrews was not available at press time.

Mrs. Theresa Hurn, 5th grade teacher, is one of the "old timers" of Rankin schools now in her 12th year. Born in Montague County in 1906, she attended public schools in Delhart and holds a B.A. Degree from Sul Ross. She is presently working on her Masters at the University of Texas.

Mr. Hurn has one daughter, Mrs. Donald Cox, 29, and two sons: Lt. Wm. T. Hurn, 26 and Herbert, Jr., 21. She is a member of the Methodist Church, The Rankin Study Club, Alpha Chi Scholarship Society and Delta Kappa Gamma.

"Rankin has an excellent school—has grown from 156 pupils to over 600 since I have been here," she said concerning Rankin Schools.

SCHOOL BEGINS TESTING PROGRAM

Ability and achievement measurement testing of Rankin School students from the 2nd through the 12th grades began November 3 with the 7th Graders taking the ability test.

On November 10, 11 and 12, the 2nd through 9th grade will be administered the achievement test. On November 10 and 11, the 10th grade will have the ability tests. Seniors have already completed their tests, having had the Iowa Tests of Educational Development on November 3 and 4.

"It is important to understand that such measurement is not testing for a class grade," Supt. Kenneth Welsch said this week. "However, it is important that as true a picture as is possible be obtained from each pupil."

Welsch further pointed out that all parents, pupils and teachers can help make the measurement more effective if all realize that a true picture can only be obtained if each pupil is relaxed and otherwise in a frame of mind that lends itself to revealing what the pupil really is.

No study can be done for these tests. The tests are not graded for class grades. The results are used for guidance purposes. The results for each pupil are expressed in a percentile and shall be available to parents.

Once the tests are completed and the necessary paper work completed, parents will be notified and they may then have a conference with their child's teacher concerning the results obtained. Announcement of dates will be made later.
