## TURKEYS-

Turkey has become part of the Thanksgiving and Christmas tradition and we have some tips on buying from a real expert, Mr. F. Z. Beanblossom, Extension Poultry Specialist
First the size turkey depends on Frumber to be fed and the fami the number to fed and the families reaction to left-overs. You will need about three-fourths of a lb of oven-ready turkey for generous allowances.
Second, consider the quality. The best quality are Grade $\mathbf{A}$ with an even covering of fat, broad breast. bulging thighs and large drumstisks The turkey's give a maximum per cent of meat to bone and thus to dollars spent. You should avoid blemishes such as torn skin and Third, look for the inspection tag. Turkeys inspected under your US Turkeys Supervision will have a metal DA Supervision will have a metal or paper tag stating that it has been inspected for wholesomeness. This shield shaped tag will have U. S stamped on it.
After turkey has also been gradd by USDA, it will carry the letter, A. B, or C on this same tag. or may have a separate tag. Remember that the wholesomeness tag goes not identicate the grade. One must still look for the lettering. In cooking, we suggest fifteen to twelve per pound of the oven-ready turkey at a temperature of 350 degrees $F$. The larger the turkey, the less time will be required per pound. Good luck on your holiday eating!
