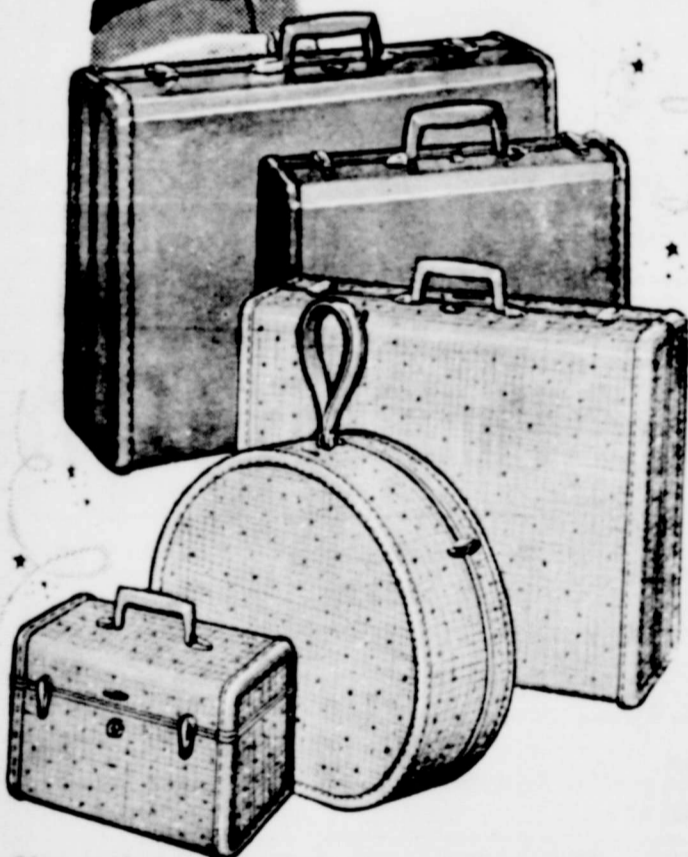

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# MY WORK IN THE 4-H CLUB

The primary purpose of the Upton County 4-H club has been, not to instruct boys and girls in agriculture alone, but to help them to become better men and women. It is doing just that.

I have been in 4-H club work for 6 years. In that time I have learned the responsibilities and handling money in large sums. I have learned that to make an investment such as showing and feeding stock pay off, you have to work for it.

I have heard some people say the only reason many of the 4-H members go to the stock shows is to miss a few days school. This is

not so. Whenever we send sheep or calves off to one of the major shows, they have to be in pens at the show grounds, weighed, and tagged by a certain date. This is usually two or three days before the show itself. Then, for the stock to place high at all, they have to be trimmed and retrimmed. Feeding, watering, trimming and just taking care of twenty-five or thirty lambs is the job of the boys who go to the shows early. Some parents may say they can't let their children join the 4-H Club because they wouldn't be able to keep up their grades. I believe that just the opposite happens. One of the requirements on making any show is that all grades be at least passing.

A boy or girl will work harder at school so that he may be able to attend these shows. Another thing, about 8 out of 10 Upton County 4-H Club members mean to attend college. All the senior boys who graduated last year are attending college.

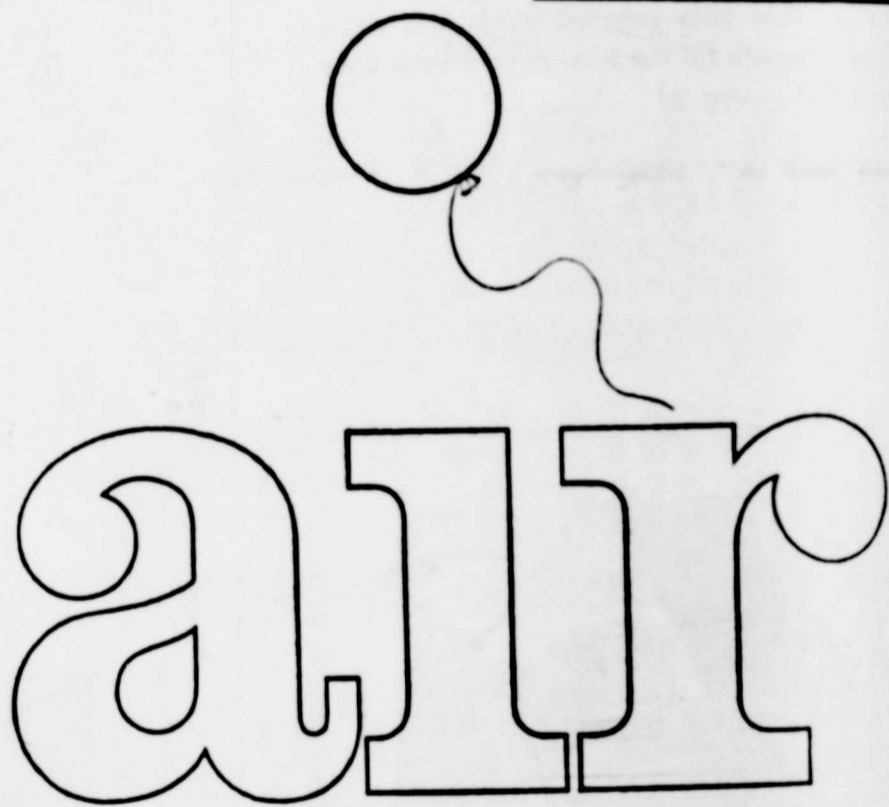

### BRIGHT LIGHT—

People can avoid eye strain by the lighting requirements. Comfortable and accurate is the opinion of Dr. Paulson, Instructor in Optology at Creighton University. He explains that seeing is a partnership between eye

power and illumination. Your illumination is up to you. The proper illumination requires: Proper candle power; Comfortable brightness contrast between general environment and work task (Watching TV in an unlit room would break this rule); Absence of glare; No shadow, and the Immediate task covered by approximately even amounts of light.
