 Fort Stockton became the first candidate to toss his hat into the politieal ring in Rankin for 1960 when he annuonsed today that he will seek re-election in nex: year's Democratic Primary as Judge of the 112th Judicial DistrictHe will seek his first full fouryear term in the office, having been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Judge Jim Langdon on January 1959.

A lifelong resident of Fort Stockton, Johnson had practiced law there for 33 years prior to becoming district judge. His 112 :h judicial district includes Pecos, Upton, Crock ett and Sutton Counties.
He was graduated from high school in Fort Stockton in 1918, recevied a degree from Simmons College, now Hardin-Simmons University, in 1922 and a law degree from the University of Texas in 1926
Johnson served two terms as Pe cos County attorney. He was mayor of the city of Fort Stockton from 1939 until resigning in 1942 and was 112 th district attorney for six terms from 1943 through 1954

He has one daughter, Mrs. Paul D. Dionne of Fort Stockton, and two grandchildren.

DENMARK - One custome in Denmark is almost unique to that country "Blowing in the Yule." A sunrise, while the people are a breakfast, the town band climbs the many steep ladders to the top of the church tower and plays four od hymus, one to each comer of he compass, so that no one is forgotten. Those sitting in their homes aways join in with the song as soon as they hear the first note As the fourth hymn ends, the deep voices of the big church bells commence to boom and Yule is under way.
FRANCE- In France at Christ mas time it is the rule of the famiy gatherings that all the quarrels of the year shall be forgiven and forgotten before the family has their celebration. While the feast is in progress, the older people usually tell stories of the doings of thase who, in the past, have brought honor upon the family name. After he supper is over, noels are sung. On December 4. the Feast of St Barbara, the women plant S: Barbaras' grain. On Christmas Day the plants are placed in a bowl on the table when the great supper is served, the growing sprouts being a symbol of the harves: of the New Year that is soon beginning
AMERICA - Most of the Christas customs in America have come from Europe: our Christmas tree fom Germany, our Santa Claus from Holland; our Christmas stockings from Belguim or France: Mer ry Christmas from England, and also our Christmas cards, plum puddings and mince pies. To the editor of The Rankin News:
First I wish to commend you most highly for having the "courage of your convictions," to write such splendid articles as that which appeared in your paper on November 19 in your "Scoop" column, anet Sins in the Welfare State".
You mention ONE woman in CaliCornia who receives $\$ 11,000$ for 19 children born out of wedlock-ac. cording to a report in "Human Events". IF there was only ONE such and sililar case, it would not be intolerable, but there are hundreds, yes, thousands throughout the country, and rapidly increasing day by day.
But even worse-if such is pos-sible-is the thousands of "workers" who work just long enough to qualify under this new law whereby the draw "unemployment" pay for 39 weeks. Then when the 39 weeks are up, they work again ONLY long enough to qualify for another "loaf ing period". One such family consisting of five young men, ages from about 18 to 25 , each with an automobile with which to run around in, and two women folks with a lot of ohildren to support, made a racket of this "unemployment" business. And it is said that there are literally thousands of such cases. Sin does not pay? Indeed as Tom Anderson, editor of Farm and Ranch says: "In the Welfare State it does!" Who pays for all of this? The American tax payer, of course.
But worst of all, says a promi-
quired in many things, and appreclation should be extended to them for this.
