Thirty-two students at the Ray kin High School plan to take the National Merit Scholarship Quallify ing Test Bill J. Hood, Principal,an nounced today. The test will be ad ministered at the High School at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 8. A students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1961 must take the test at this time.
The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test is a three hour measure of educational developmen and college aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills, and on
understanding and ability to use what can be learned, rathen than on sheer knowledge of facts.
The test is the first step in the sixth annual competition for Merit Scholarships provided by some 100 corporations, foundations, professional societies and individuals, a well as by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself.
Over $\$ 15,000,000$ has been awarded in the first four years of the program
For students taking the test on March 8, results will be reported to all participating schools before the end of the spring semester in
time for use by class advisors. The scores may also be used in many high schoois to help students make
