VOTING TIME—

Here it is April and comes Saturday, we will all be voting in the first of three elections that come almost together. With the schools, city and state elections all right here, the political pot ought to be bowling but instead—we are all still talking hospital.

For my part, I'd like to wind up that thing with this issue after pointing out that Rankin should be very satisfied with the present set up in that we now have our own independent board, administrator and such. That's the way it ought to have been in the first place and it's up to us now to see that it works out well. The new administrator is a man who has always been favorable to Rankin and who has gotten on well over here. He has had a lot of experience in the hospital work and—with a little time and consideration from us, the citizens of the community—ought to make a first class administrator. He will not please everyone all the time—nor would Florence Nightingale. So let's all make him and his family welcome when they move over here after school is out and try to help him in his job and to have a better hospital than ever.

As for the folks over in McCamey, let's let them work out their own problems and say good luck to them.

Incidentally, the new hospital board has requested that, whenever possible, the Rankin Hospital buy everything they can locally and all employees live in Rankin if at all possible. In fact, the goal of the board is to have everyone connected with the hospital living in this community. Mr. Fuege has said that he agrees with this plan and will do all he can to help reach the goal.

If that comes about, it will relieve still further another sore spot that has bothered the community—that of not having local employees staff the hospital.

All in all, I'd say things are in for better times in the hospital department.

THIS MAY BE THE ONE—

Last Friday night, the temporary board of city development, the city council and Commissioner H. Whe-

eler were on hand to interview an applicant for the position of full-time worker for Rankin development. He was chosen to be contacted out of about four applications or names submitted thus far. If he checks out all right in his home town, it is very likely that he will be hired for the job . . . in fact, may be hired before this issue of the News gets to you.

This man is not a "hot-shot" or super salesman. He seems to be a very ordinary sort of citizen and his record would indicate that he has only one outstanding quality and that is his desire to do the job assigned to him and do it well. He will be taking this job with no promises of results on his part and no assurance of a lasting position on the part of the city. It is understood that he either produces some results or the job will be terminated. Under these circumstances, he will be turning down a job with the State of Texas—something which is usually a life-time proposition so I'd say he has confidence in himself.

When and if he does come here, he will definitely be fighting an uphill battle. Our present attitude being what it is—his efforts will be looked upon as those of a man who "knows not whereof he speaks" and there will be some who will be gunning for him from the first day. Do you think you would give up your present job—whatever it is to take on such a one-sided task? I doubt it.

If and when the old boy comes out, let's go better than half way with him. Some of us have been here since the town was founded—some of us not quite so long—but look the place over and see what we have done with it during the past thirty or forty years . . . then let's at least give somebody else a chance.

He's going to need all the encouragement and luck that one man can have.

MORE CHEERS—

Now aren't you just a little bit proud of the Rankin youngsters who made such a fine showing in the Interscholastic League Literary Events last week? Sure—everybody is. Rankin is accustomed to win-

ning this event each year but not by quite such an outstanding margin.

It proves that the Rankin school system is producing some good scholars—about the best in their district and they deserve a round of hand clapping for their showing.

In connection with words of encouragement to students and their instructors for their showings in literary events, I should add to a statement made in this column last week concerning the debating team and one-act players. Head Coach Don Leach was omitted as one of the instructors in this department. Don has worked with this group along with Mrs. June Prentice for several years and helped last year to make the one-act play a state winner.

We have some talented students and some talented instructors to guide them—making winners and everybody likes a winner.

Last week The News carried an item on L. M. Parrish, candidate for the school board in which—due to a poor choice of wording on my part, may have been misunderstood by some readers. Mr. Parrish did not make the statement that he wanted to make a bunch of changes in the Rankin Schools.

I think they are among the very best and my only desire in seeking the school board is to do my part in helping to improve them even more. I think we have good administrators, good teachers, a good board and an all-around sound system. I'm offering

my services purely on a civic minded basis to help carry on and make whatever improvements can be made."

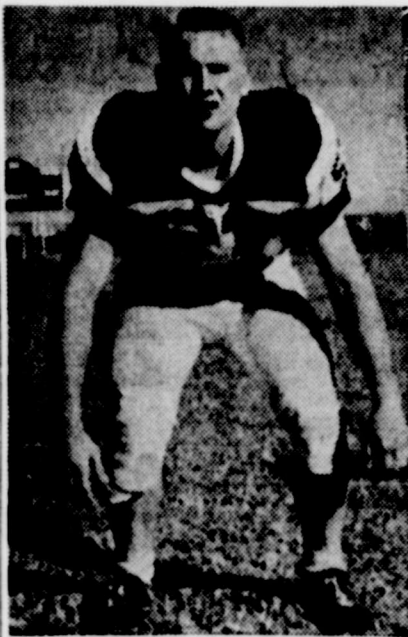

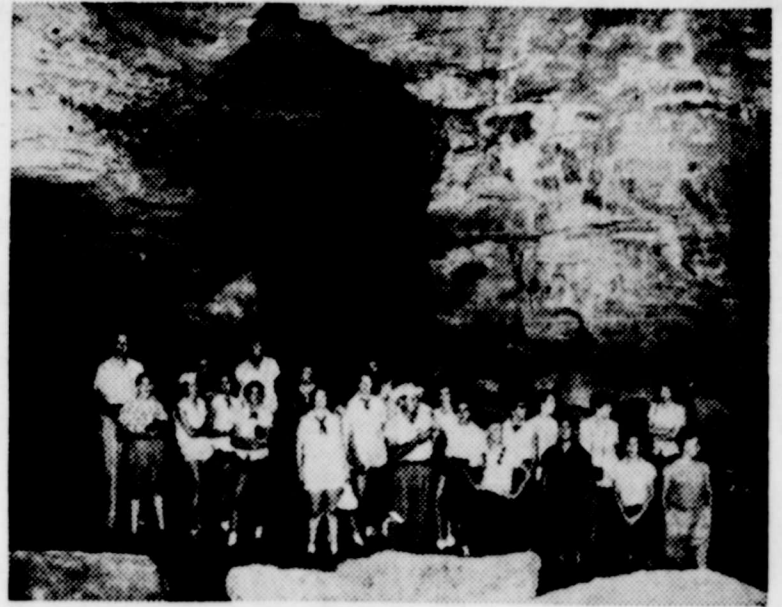
