Rankin Clubs Backing Cancer Crusade Drive

Plans for the Cancer Crusade in Rankin were revealed this week in which the Rankin Lions Club and the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority are cooperating in sponsoring the fund

raising. Lions Club members were already at work this week on the business district, seeking donations.

On the afternoon of Thursday, April 26, members of the sororities will stage a house-to-house campaign.

All contributions will go toward research work on the nationwide effort to stamp out cancer.

At the same time, the two sponsoring groups issue a warning to citizens to not overlook the seven danger signals of cancer and further pointed out that many cancer illnesses, if caught in the early stages, can be controlled. The seven danger signs are: unusual bleeding or discharge, a lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere, a sore that does not heal, change in bowel or bladder habits, hoarseness or cough, indigestion or difficulty in swallowing, change in a wart or mole. If any of these signals last longer than two weeks, one should see a doctor to learn if it means cancer.

Vergil W. Dobbs, Rankin High School science teacher for the past five years, has been notified that he has been accepted for a six-weeks Summer Institute program in physics and biology beginning June 6 at Texas A & M. After attending the first six weeks session, appointment to a second six weeks study is likely.

This program is sponsored by the National Science Foundation and is similar to the Institute which Mr. Dobbs attended at SMU in the summer of 1958, studying math, physics and chemistry.

Girls' Day Camp Set; Registration Open to All

Planning for the Rankin Girl Scout Day Camp continues to take shape according to local scouting officials. Enough workers have offered to help, so the next step is registration by the girls who plan to attend.

All girls 7 years old and who have completed the second grade, to 17 year olds, are eligible to attend. An invitation to all girls in this age group has been extended, whether girl scout members or not.

The week of June 6-10 from 8:00 AM to 2:30 PM each day is the time of the camp. Fee for each girl will be \$5 for the entire week of the camp. This will cover food, transportation, insurance, medical aid, and materials to be used at the camp site. Girls will gather at the Scout House each morning before 8 o'clock and will be returned there by 2:30 PM, so the parents can pick them up.

Registration forms are not yet on hand but will be available in the near future. They will be handed out to the girl scout troops and will also be available at the three school principal's offices. Forms must be received by Mrs. Bill Medley not later than May 15.

THE SCOOP by Scoop

A LITTLE HEADWAY—

A little headway has already been made in Rankin's efforts to improve its appearance. A couple of old buildings have been wrecked and now it has been learned that the old service station on the corner of Main and 10th will come down.

This building—having stood vacant for many years—belonged to Mr. Stanley Eddins, former Rankin business man and now a resident of Midland. R. L. Bell, the spark plug behind boy scouting in Rankin, recently asked Mr. Eddins if he would donate the building to the scouts if they would tear it down. This, Mr. Eddins agreed to do. So in the next few weeks, the corner of Main and 10th should be relieved of another of the old boom days buildings that have served little purpose in recent years other than to distract from the appearance of their surrounding area.

Mr. Eddins, a non-resident property owner, is to be commended for his willingness to work with the town on this matter . . . to say nothing of making a worthy donation of the materials in the structure to the boy scouts. This was the first time he was approached on the matter and he did not hesitate to consent. Mr. Bell, also, is due a flower or two for killing two birds at one shot . . . cleaning up the corner and helping the scouts.

If a non-resident owner like Mr. Eddins is willing to try to help in improving the town—can any local resident do less? And Mr. Bell and his boy scouts . . . or the girl scouts, or some other similar organization, can likely always put what little materials that are salvageable from such an old building to good use. If you have such, why not contact some such organization and see if they would not be willing to take it off your hands.

A PERMANENT BOARD—

From this meeting and the formation of the organization, will be selected a board of directors to guide the attempts for improvements. Every business man in Rankin ought to attend this meeting and

Needless to say, any civic minded person—whether property owner or not—will be more than welcome to join. In a program such as this, you can't get too many members. Make your plans now to attend and development. It's going to take the cooperation of a lot of people to make this thing work and if we are not interested in helping ourselves—who is?

They don't have it all completed as yet but it looks very nice just as it is.

THE JOKERS—

Last week, the Ralls Banner said somethink like this: "The only thing wrong with these political jokes is that one sometimes gets elected."

For all practical purposes, it now appears that several of these "joker" type politicians have been elected to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. Either that or the law is something to twist on the merest technicality. Last week, Rankin was host to the biggest murder trial it has seen in many a day. Apparently, the verdict came out to the satisfaction of all concerned for all is now back to normal. But I wonder what might have developed had the verdict been one of "Guilty". From past cases, it is very likely that the verdict would have been appealed and — if the attorneys for the defendant were on their toes—it most likely would have been reversed on down the line on some technicality.

At least some of their recent rulings in the Criminal Appeals Court would so indicate. As examples: The court reversed a murder conviction because the indictment which alleged that the victim was "stomped to death" failed to add "with the feet". Another case was reversed be-

cause McCulloch County was mis-pelled McCullough in an indictment. They have ruled that while it is unlawful to drive a "vehicle" under the influence of drugs, this does not apply to "motor vehicle". A case involving a pick-up truck was tossed out because a pick-up truck is a motor vehicle but not a vehicle. A dope peddler can not be arrested unless he has enough marijuana in his possession to make up a cigarette—just a few grains left in his pocket after he had disposed of the rest won't do . . . anyone might have a little marijuana in his pocket unknowingly, you see. That an indictment of a man who had thrown some furniture out into a yard, broken and torn it up, then poured hot grease on what remained was faulty because the indictments said the furniture was "destroyed". Judge Lloyd W. David-

son held that the furniture was not "destroyed but was "injured".

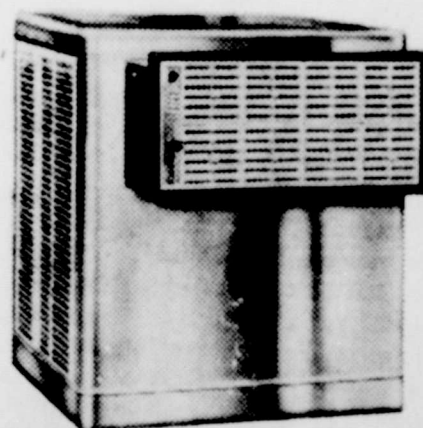

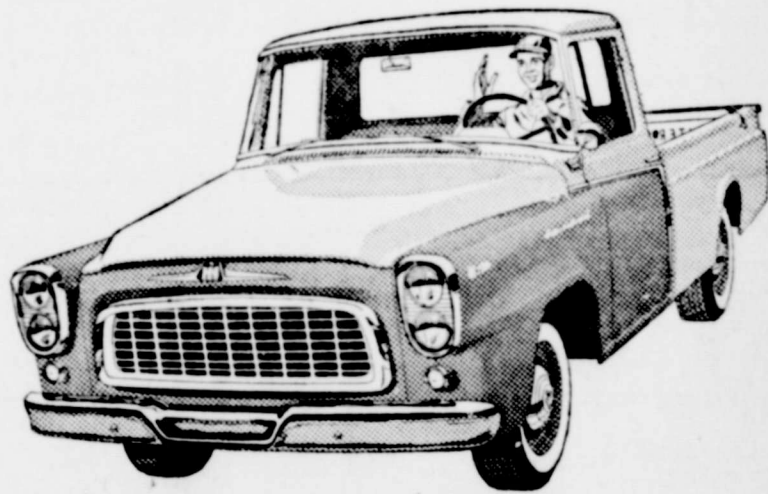

even worse—it showed an increase of more than 130 percent."

The why of all this? Just one thing—people did not take advantage of the protection available to them. So have you had at least one shot and preferably two before summer? The under 5 and over 15 are the most neglected groups. Let's not have a case of crippling polio in our county just because we have neglected to protect ourselves or our children.

SPRING HOUSE CLEANING—

If so and you have an automatic dryer the job can be lessened by using it. To clean slip covers for example, place slip covers in dryer immediately after washing, and regulate time and temperature setting according to fabric. While still damp-dry, remove from dryer and press out pleats and ruffles. Then replace on furniture where slip covers will finish drying to snug smoothness.

When curtains or drapes are not soiled, but require airing and dusting, use your dryer to "revive" them. Allow several pairs at a time to tumble freely. Remove from dryer and rehang. Use the same procedure to loosen wrinkles and remove musty odors from those just taken from storage.

For braided and rag rugs remove from dryer when still a hint of moisture and lay on flat surface to finish air-drying. Chenille bathmats and shag rugs may be completely dried and then replaced on floor.
