

## Fluor Corp. Starts On **Sheffield Gas Plant**

### THE WES-TEX UNION NEWS Copied From

Representatives of the Fluor Corporation and representatives of the construction locals met in a pre-job conference on May 10 at the Lincoln Hotel, Odessa, to discuss the starting of work on the gasoline plant south of Sheffield.

Ken Wesson, Labor Relations representative for Flour, said the job would start Monday, May 16. and is to be completed in December. The job will employ about 200 men at the peak of construction, and the installation of the 300 tons of pipe will be the largest item.

The main topic of discussion was the lack of housing facilities near the job. Bill Vann. Superintendent of construction in the Los Angeles office, said that he and Manual Passmore, project superinten. dent, had made a tour of the entire area making a survey of housing. The possibility of installing a trailer park near the job was discussed.

The plant is being built by El Paso Natural Gas Company.

keep in the refigerator until ready for use. When needed roll dough to 1/4-inch thickness, cut with pastry jagger and fry in deep fat at 375-400 degrees. Do not let dough rise before frying. Drain on absorbent paper, roll in powdered sugar. Dough may be kept in the refrigerator for several days and used as needed. We have kept it as much as two weeks in a refrigerator that stays very cold.

The French market might not agree with us but we think they are also good when kept over and reheated in the oven. The result. ing product is much more hard and crisp very much as a French dinner roll but we think they are good that way.

#### MILLER BUGS-

Having trouble with miller bugs? Sorry we can't give you a sure fire way of getting rid of them. That's one question the entomologists have not figured out vet. But, you can probably keep them pretty well out of your house by picking them up with the vacumn sweeper each day and being carful to keep doors and cracks closed so far as possible. They leave walls very difficult to clean and if they are not kept out it may cost you a paint job.


